SOURCE, SOURCE EVALUATION, APPRAISAL OF CONTENT:

A member of a group of Cuban emigres who have been trained in the techniques of information collection and who have provided useful reports for over one and one-half years, from CC-1859, Pedro Alejandro Angulo Moreno, M.D., a Cuban refugee who left Cuba on 24 September 1963. Source was a member of the Clandestine Medical College.

1. Because the Cuban Government has stated that, if civil war broke out, only the wounded among the pro-Government troops would be treated, the Clandestine Medical College (Colegio Medico Clandestino) has ordered its members to take over the hospitals in case of war.
2. Since early summer 1963, many serums manufactured by the Baxter Co. in Italy have been imported into Cuba.
3. As of August-September 1963, no Soviet-manufactured medicines were available in Cuba except for ether. The ether received was contained in old-fashioned bottles with cork covers, instead of in cans like those employed for U.S.-manufactured ether.

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
