Lane Documents from Board Release of April 1996 Documents Suggested Talking Points 7/2/96

- 1. These records provide more historical insight into the actions of the FBI and CIA following the assassination,
- 2. The American public deserves to have as complete a picture as possible of this tragic event.
- 3. The release of previously classified information, like that contained in these records, adds clarity to the picture.
- 4. It is not the Review Board's job to make judgments or characterize the records. The American public can make their own judgments about the information that becomes available.
- 5. It <u>is</u> our job to make the historical record surrounding the assassination as rich as possible; that's what the United States Congress mandated that the Board do.
- 6. The release of records such as these add additional historical context to the events following the assassination.
