First, the members of the Review Board appreciate your interest in their work. It is encouraging to hear from enterprising young students who are interested in our history and specifically the circumstances surrounding the tragic murders of President Kennedy and Martin Luther King, Jr. As I know you are aware, our history is very important and we can learn much from the past.

Second, the Assassination Records Review Board was created as an independent federal agency to oversee the review and release of records related to the assassination of President Kennedy. During the last year, the Board has voted to release nearly 1,300 records. In addition, the FBI and the CIA have released another 1,200 during this time based on the standards set by the Review Board.

Third, the United States Congress did not include the review and release of records related to the assassination of Martin Luther King, Jr. The records of the House Select Committee on Assassinations on the King assassination have not been made public. If this is an area of interest to you, perhaps you would like to raise it with the members of Congress who represent you.

Finally, as demonstrated by their work, the members of the Review Board wholeheartedly agree with your opinion that the records related to the assassination of President Kennedy should be available to the American public. Many of them already are available at the National Archives and the Board is working hard to ensure that the rest are made public in the next two years.
