L. NETRIEV, in a top secret lecture to a Soviet Military Intelligence course at Military-Diplomatic Academy, 1960, said,

"Case officers who use as cover, let us any, the Soviet Trade. Representation, TASS or Sovinformbure, can use their cover essignments as backstopping for non-clandesting mostings with certain aments whose particular activities officially associate then with the previously mentioned Soviet institutions. Engager. such non-clandestine meetings within a legal residency abould be restricted to a minimum both as to place and time. Meetings of this type should be carried out only in acceptional cases with tested and reliable egents in order to avoid provocation by the local commerciatelligence service against the Bovist installation being most as cover. Such mostings are held as a rule in the work offices of the case officer or of the agent during working bours. It is necessary that each sectings be conducted naturally, that they do not attract the attention of outsiders, and that the receipt and transmitted of intelligence matters, properly compuflaged, be carried out discreetly. In setting up such meetings, measures against topping must be taken. One must bear in mind that a meeting with persons outside official presises and during non-verting hours usually signifies a relationship between the two parties that is above and beyond addicial materials."

Alan, such contect in official installations may be caused by the agent's own carelessomes. Again Admiral EXCREMEV speaks:

"Some agents, because of inexperience or because of deliberate violation of the rules of security through peculiar personal rashmess,.... approached our case officers at places not stipulated as operational meeting sites, others telephoned the case officer at his Seviet installation and discussed personal contact arrangements, while others still showed up personally at the Seviet installation in order to contact the case officer."

ROSTIKOV, who was born on 17 March 1933 in Moscov, was assigned to the Soviet Embassy in Mexico City as Vice Consul on 19 September 1961.

A fluent Spenish speaker, he had travelled abroad at least three times before this permanent assignment; moreover, in 1959 KOSTIKOV applied for a visa to accompany Frenier Nikita Gergeya-vien KHRUSHCHEV's party to the United States at an official of the Soviet Ministry of Foreign Affairs, but we have no record of his having some to this country at that time. MOSTIKOV served as an interpreter at Entermational conferences at Madrid and Barcelons in 1950 and 1959. In late 1959 and early 1960 he attended Soviet exhibitions in Mexico City and Eavana; he is known to have been in Cuba from 6 January to T March 1960.

The physical description of KOSTIKOV quite accurately fits that of a Seviet case officer who nearly a year ago met in Mexico an FRI-controlled double agent. This double agent's Soviet case officer in the United States has been Gleg Panile-view BRYKIN of the Thirteenth Department, KGB First Chief Directorate, occupying the overt position of translator-trainer, U.B. Secretariat, Sev York City. SRYKIN was stationed in New York City from December 1960 to July of this year.

three times outside the capital: In March 1963 and mests for the first two weeks of September he went to Tijmena, Massacia, and Mexicali, estencially for the purpose of purchasing bottom. The U.S. Department of State, however, has reported that during these trips KOSTIKOV met local representatives of Mexicale Liberation Mexical and Central Compessas Independents, both large Communist from organizations. In addition, according to PSI sources, ROSTIKOV was accompanied on the September trip by Ivan Cavriloviah ALFERIEV, and he contacted in Ensenada several persons including Communist sympathizers who previously had been associated with Soviet officials stationed in Mexico City.

ALFERIEV, a PRAVDA correspondent is Merico, was in close contact with Cubea diplomats and local Communist leaders during a February 1962 visit to Quite.
