#233 Re your letter

On the 9th I sent the ambassador to Harbin² to inform him what you told me. On the afternoon of the same day Harbin² informed me that the American Government appreciated Japan's offer very much and would like by all means to get her cooperation that although America was doing her very best to find the location of the Earhart plane, the last message from it stated its position was somewhere about two hundred miles north of Howland Island, and that thereafter, there was no news; that since the naval base at Honolulu has been made the search headquarters, Japan might get all the latest information Harbin², while she is cooperating in this search.
