Discussion Between Chairman Khrushchev and
Kr. Drew Fearson re Lee Harvey Oswald - Memo to

Warren Commission

- I. This will amplify my telephonic remarks to you on 25 May, during which I informed you that Mr. and Mrs. Drew Pearson had had a MS-minute conversation in Cairo on 2h May with Chairman Khrushchev.
- 2. The CIA Chief of Station in Cairo has reported a comversation which he and his wife held with Hr. and Hrs. Drew Pearson in Cairo on 2h and 25 May. Mrs. Pearson is a cousin of the wife of our Chief of Station. Nothing in the cabla quoted below should be construed as obviating any desirability the Commission may feel about securing testimony directly from Mr. and Hrs. Pearson. We are forwarding it to you solely for the purpose of placing in your hands at the earliest measure the information which has been provided to us in this privileged fashion.
- 3. The massage from our Chief of Station in Caire reads as follows:

"Mrs. Drew Fearson provided on the svening of 2h May the first information on the Oswald partita of the conversation with Chairman and Mrs. Ehrushchev. Hrs. Ehrushchev opened the conversation by inquiring about Mrs. Esnmedy and expressing concern about and affection for her. Mrs. Fearson reasoured her, saying that Mrs. Esnmedy had borns up remarkably well and was in good health. (Most of this conversation was in English which Mrs. Ehrushchev speaks fairly well, with some assistance from Ehrushchev interpreter, who had served in the past as interpreter for the Fearsons and who helped arrange the meeting.) This lad into Mrs. Ehrushchev' inquiry about their mutual friend, the wife of Chief Justice Warran, and thence into

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mantion of the Warren Commission. Chairman Khrashchav than joined the conversation, expressing sorrow at the essessination and also inquired about Hre. Kennedy. Thereupon he ested Mr. Pearson, What really happened? Mr. Pearson said in effect that the whole affair had taken place just as had been reported in the newspapers and presumably by the Coviet Ambassador in Washington. Chairman Khrushchev was utterly incredileus and his attitude was characterized by Mrs. Pearson as being archetypical 'of every European I have ever talked to on this subject'. That is, that there was some kind of conspiracy to assessinate President Kennedy and then murder the assausin with the Dallas Police Department being an accessory. Mrs. Pearson got the impression that Chairman Khrushchev had some dark thoughts about the American Right Wing being behind this conspiracy although Chairman Ehrushebev did not articulate this in any clear fashion. Mrs. Pearson was a bit vague on this point in distinguishing between what Chairman Ehrushchev said and what she thought he believed. When Mr. Pearson said that we Americans are paculiar people, it understandable that foreigners had difficulty comprehending this fantastic episode, but in fact Cawald was mad, had ected on his com, ditte Ruby, Chairran Enrushebov said flatly that he did not believe this. He said he did not believe that the American security services were this inept. Hr. Fearson again said he agreed this was hard to believe but the facts were as they appeared. Mrs. Marushchev also expressed disbelief and reiterated her affection for Mrs. Lamedy. Mrs. Pearson repeated that the reaction of Chairman Khrushchev and his wife was one of flat disbelief and archatypical of the universal European belief that there was some kind of American conspiracy behind the assassination of President Kennedy and the murder of Oswald. Chairman and Mrs. Khrushchev could not believe that the affair had happened as it apparently did and Hr. Feareon made no headway whatever in trying to change their belief that something was not on the level. Chairman Khrushohev greated Mr. and Mrs. Pearson's efforts with a tolerant smile. The conversation than drifted into Chairman Enrushchev' friendly comments about President Johnson.

"On the morning of 25 May, Hr. Pearson referred en passent to the Oswald portion of the conversation,

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saying that Chairman Khrushchev was completely convinced that the true story of the Kennedy essassination has not come out. Hr. Pearson said somewhat ruefully, 'I couldn't make a nickel with Khrushchev on this one.' He gave the impression that Chairman Khrushchev' attitude was one of complete skepticism as to the public version rather than being one of holding concrete ideas as to exactly what happened.

"On the evening of 25 May, Mr. and Mrs. Pearson, in discussing the Ehrushchev talk, made another passing reference to the fact that Chairman and Mrs. Ehrushchev are convinced that the public version of the affair is not true and that nothing they could say altered this belief."
