**SUBJECT: DAS Attempt to Kailor the Cooperation of the United States for its anti-de Gaulle Activities**

1. In May 1961, an attempt was made in Lisbon, Portugal by two members of the Organisation de l'Armee Secrete (OAS) to enlist the support of the United States Government (specifically the Central Intelligence Agency, although the name was never actually pronounced) in their operations against de Gaulle. The attempt was made by Captain Jean Rena Soustre and Captain Guerin (fau). Captain Soustre identified himself in the OAS organization as coordinator of external affairs serving under Major Pierre Sergeant. Soustre said that he foresaw the U. S. role as that of convincing other governments to cease suppressing OAS activities in their respective countries, and later perhaps providing monetary or material support. Soustre said he intended to provide some information about the activities of his organization which would be of interest to the U. S. In answer to a question on his status in Portugal, Soustre explained that he travelled on various passports, one of them being a U. S. passport. He claimed to be documented as a naturalized citizen from Martinique. He stated that he had U. S. contacts who could arrange documentation.

2. The CIA representative told Soustre that de Gaulle was the Chief of State of an old and respected ally of the U. S., and that the U. S. had absolutely no intention of working with any person or group against the duly-constituted government of France.

3. Available information from both press and official French sources indicates that Soustre is the name of a former French army captain who escaped from a reeducation camp in 1954. Subsequent to

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his escape he was alleged to have been involved in an assassination attempt against de Gaulle. Souestre was born on 18 October 1930 in the Circonscription Department of France. Sergeant is also a former French army captain who has been reported to be the successor to ex-colonel Antoine Argoud, under whom he worked. Sergeant was born on 30 June 1936 at Sevres, France. Guardia is not identified.

4. The information on the demarche of the two CIA officers to the CIA representative has been made available to the American Ambassador at Lisbon.
