l. Subject was born in Vienna, Austria, on a January 1900, as
Hedwig TUEE, the descriptor of Philip and Rose (nee EURENSTEIN). She attended grammar school, high school, and dramable school in Vienna, and at
18, went to what was then Peland for a year to play with a stock company.

- 2. She toured Coordeslovatia the following year with the company, and ca returning to Vienna, not derhart RIGLES, whom she married in 1920. The couple went to Berlin where RIGLES was editor of a Communist paper. Subject played on the German stage for about it years. After three years of married life (during which time she had become a Communist and had been active in Communist Party work) she and RISLES esparated.
- S. Shortly thereafter, she fell in love with Dr. Julian BOMPERTS, an American citisen, who spent much time in Germany. 7. In October 1933 Subject came to the U.S. to renew her American passport. 8. while in New York, Subject was in frequent touch with William Joseph STREAR and Arthur MAITER, for whom she acted as courier to Paris in August 1934. On her return from France in the fall, she met neweral new Russian agents, among whom were Gerda FFA*KF TTTR, *RILL*, *RORIS* (FA*AFOFF), and *4770%*. Subject worked with these people until the summer of 1937. It was to *BILL* that Subject furnished the name of toel FIAL* in 1936 as a possible contact. *FORIS*, *RILL*s* associate in the U.S., was against immediate development of FI*ID, and no action was taken until Paul *A*SI*G contacted FIELD in Paris.

as confire between the 1.7. and that city and also furnished information about news of the day from the "New York Times". In the summer of 1927 RASTIAL returned from Europe, about which time he and subject received a letter from Ignata EUICO navising that EUISS had broken with the Russians. As they had worked with FEISS, they agreed that they too were through with Eussia. Soon thereafter, the RASSIFGS were contacted by "BURIO" and a "REALL" (Frs. Vacalli EUCIIIE) who tried to influence them to go to Roscow. Although the MASSIFGS suspected that Roscow wanted to liquidate them, they decided to go anyway, but traveled on their American passports, arriving in hoscow on 5 June 1937.

10. During their seven-month's stry in Moscow, they were interrogated about FIIVS and his esseciates. In June 1978 they left Eussia and broke with the Soviets. They have lived since then in New York City and in Pennsylvania. Periodically they have received visits and calls from verious Soviets indicating that the Russians are keeping a check on them. In 1946 the FIRIDs contacted the MASTINGS and were told that they (the MASTINGS) had broken with the Soviets and did not want to be molested by the FIRIDs again.

11. Subject has worked as a translator, boarding-brase keeper, shippard worker, and personnel supervisor. She has also worked for Jowish Charity from January to April 1946. Rost of her time is now taken un with the operation of her boarding house.

10. Subject's former husband, Julian GORPERTS, is currently running a book shore to 610 Fifth Evenue, New York, and is Financial Advisor to the School of Social Research. According to Subject, JORPERTS broke with the Communists in 1928.
