Dear Chico:

Thanks for your letter of February 22. How we hope you are alive. I could only imagine that you were out of luck as that the phone company went haywire.

We all had a wonderful time at Luray, but the place is fairly cramped. Physically the hotel is utterly beautiful, but the help are all surly and the service is inadequate. Such things as the maître d' continually coming up to remind you that he does not share in the tips of the waiter. Big attraction is the gambling casino, and the planes shuttle back and forth from Miami to gamble. The last plane back to Miami leaves each morning at 3:00 A. M. There is a tremendous amount of construction, houses, apartments, highrises, etc. on Grand Bahama Isle. It is a flat island with scrub pine and there is no local color whatsoever. The water is much cooler than Haiti, but Ethel and I did finally leave her to amble leisurely. The roof was clearer and prettier than at Haiti.

As you probably know I received a wire from Boyer, but never did hear from Charles. I am much relieved that my failure to jump at Boyer's wire did not embarrass you.

Ethel's folks are now down here visiting us, but I am sorry to say that her father has a bad heart condition and cannot meet himself, even to the point of speaking more than 3 minutes at a time. Under the circumstances we are lucky to have them visiting.

Formal, oil and gas concession, refining, etc. all add up to the same thing. If I can find a way to do something constructive rather than silly, I would much prefer to do it in Haiti rather than Wink, Texas.

Give Paul Rosten our best wishes and urge him to drop by here for a visit if he goes back to Canada through Dallas.

There was a rumor of Dr. Strangelove here this week and I forced Ethel to see it. She agrees with me it is a work of pure genius.

Dear George,

Your letter of Febr. 17 is on hand.

In the meantime Haiti has been receiving further rather disturbing articles in the papers here, mainly by the New York Times and the name of Barnes. This does not contribute to business.

The summary of the mineral situation, contained in your letter of the 17th, has now been given to the members of the new group. The preliminary reaction and advice given me on the subject is that the matter may become of interest in due course, but not immediately for political reasons, and also, due to the fact that the new group needs time to start. Also, that I would do well in keeping in touch with you and you with me, so that we can tackle it when both sides feel the time more propitious for it. One of the members is familiar with some of the developments in Haiti in the past.

So I will keep in touch with you and suggest that you keep me posted on developments at your end.
