MALCOLM X

THE CRUEL and insane
assassination of militant
Afro-American leader Mal-
colm X, like that of the late
President John F. Kennedy, is
one more dramatic expres-
sion of the increasing at-
mosphere of violence sweep-
ing the United States of
America.

Voice of America and BBC
commentaries on the assassi-
nation in an attempt to cover up
this fact, repeatedly draw the
Scriptural lesson, "Those who
live by the sword shall die by
the sword"; thus Malcolm X
brought on his own violent end
as a result of his advocacy of
violence, it is maintained.

Let us set the record straight.
Malcolm X was never charged
with the commission or advoc-
acy of a single act of violence,
during his several years
of leadership of the reverse-
side Black Muslim movement
and during his leadership of his
own Organisation of Afro-Ameri-
can Unity, which he formed
when he broke with the Black
Muslims in 1963.

Further, Malcolm X has re-
peatedly pointed up the fact
that violence has been consist-
ently inflicted upon America's
twenty-two million Afro-Ameri-
cans from the days of slavery
up to the present and is contin-
ually being inflicted, and little
if nothing has been or is being
done to bring to justice or to
punish those responsible for this
violence.

Today, in Selma, Alabama,
scores of Afro-Americans have
suffered violence at the hands
of Selma's racist police and
2,500 have been jailed for insist-
ing upon their right to register
to vote. Neither local, state or
Federal authorities, even with
the New Civil Rights Law, seem
to be able to do anything to
stop this police violence. It con-
tinues at this very moment.

Thus it was that Malcolm X
declared in his Memorandum to
the Heads of State and Govern-
ments of the Organisation of
African Unity, at its First Or-
dinary Assembly held in Cairo
in July, 1964:

Out of frustration and hope-
lessness our young people have
reached the point of no return.
We no longer endorse patience
and turning-the-other-cheek. We
assert the right of self defense
by whatever means necessary
and reserve the right of maxi-
mum retaliation against our
most oppressors, no matter what
the odds against us."

No one should take comfort
in the fact that Malcolm X died
at the hands of another Afro-
American. The atmosphere of
hated created against Malcolm
X by the irresponsible U.S.
press and information media
and the refusal of the New
York police to provide Malcolm
X with maximum protection
advised promptly direct contact

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No one should take comfort in the fact that Malcolm X died at the hands of another Afro-American. The atmosphere of hatred created against Malcolm X by the irresponsible U.S. press and information media and the refusal of the New York police to provide Malcolm X with maximum protection against repeatedly threatened and attempted violence made possible this heinous crime.

Rather than placing their weight and influence fully on the side of those struggling for their civil and human rights, these information media were busy painting Malcolm X as some kind of wicked, power-drunk, immoral, fanatic extremist whose removal from the American scene would be a blessing.

Instead of protecting those Afro-Americans who are exercising their basic right to organize and protest against injustice, from racist hoodlums and segregationists of whatever color, police, North and South are busy clubbing, threatening and carting off to jail scores and hundreds of their darker brothers with impunity.

Malcolm X is dead. Yet, he still lives in the hearts of countless Afro-Americans — a martyr of the struggle. His death does not change the fact that Afro-Americans of all ages and walks of life are rapidly reaching "the point of no return." Unless a way is found, and soon, to end the daily violence suffered by Afro-Americans in their struggle for dignity, Malcolm X's in the tens of thousand will emerge **AND RETALIATE**.
