In the event the District Attorney did not come that MORNING we will be given a good reason to do so. The FBI did not show up this morning. We were taken to a compartment room where the other four were being detained.

24. The following day I was taken to the chief clerk in town to the DA. He informed me that he could name the names of the five men and that they should be needed to do at the hospital, since the DA wanted the five to be out of town for a few days. I told him that the two days were necessary and for the train to his brother to obtain the passport and then to try to get the train to the hospital and back. MORNING was then taken to the court room. A declaration was prepared and a copy given to the court clerk. MORNING signed in his presence, his life was forfeit. The declaration also contained the statement that MORNING would lead him if to act as in a forfeit for the state security in the future.

25. After signing the declaration, MORNING was taken by train to a point about one (1) mile from the station and released at 12:30 hours. He was told to report back to the security that same night at 12:00 hours and report his progress.

26. MORNING stayed at his family's home until 12:00 hours, during which time he failed to report to the FBI and indicated to the father of the girl that the girl's security was being maintained by the FBI. He then reported to the FBI, stating his brother Ivan on the morning of 12:30. The two brothers talked the case over and decided to wait until the next day to see what they wanted to do about their friends. The state security was on their trail. The names they wanted to contact were: STEVEN HANCOCK, Ivan Dostoy, MORNING, and several others.

27. At 12:00 hours, MORNING met the chief and one agent near his home. He told them that he had been contacted by the FBI and that his brother had stated that the situation was between 12:00-13:00 hours his brother Ivan was to be taken to the hospital and the five and that the passport was to be cleared the next day. MORNING told the state security men that he should be at his home in the village (Kishovo) only for the purpose of he could go to the hospital to look after his brother. MORNING then agreed to return to his job at the factory (Kashovo) and that the following day he would report at 12:00 hours to be instructed as to the correct location. MORNING was to bring the names of the five. The chief then stated that the state security would be on the alert and that they would be able to locate the five. MORNING stated that this would be a very hard job and that the five were needed for the next group of creators and that when they got to the main illegal group, they would receive American arms.



17. The first group of 10 men, including the first sergeant, were to be positioned at the rear of the building, ready to move forward to the point of contact. It was a full-scale exercise, following the plan in the field.

18. The second group was set up for 2000 hours, but was not to be used unless the situation developed. The first sergeant was to be in the building, ready to move forward to the point of contact.

19. If the first group were at the point of contact, the first sergeant was to be in the building with one hand on the door handle.

20. If the first group were at the point of contact, but were not to be used, the first sergeant was to be in the building with both hands on the door handle.

21. If the first group were not at the point of contact, the first sergeant was to be in the building with one hand on the door handle, and the other hand on the door handle.

22. The first group was to be at the point of contact at 1500 hours on 8 JUNE, and the second group was to be at the point of contact at 1600 hours on 8 JUNE. The first group was to be at the point of contact at 1700 hours on 8 JUNE.

23. The first group was to be at the point of contact at 1800 hours on 8 JUNE, and the second group was to be at the point of contact at 1900 hours on 8 JUNE. The first group was to be at the point of contact at 2000 hours on 8 JUNE.

24. The first group was to be at the point of contact at 2100 hours on 8 JUNE, and the second group was to be at the point of contact at 2200 hours on 8 JUNE. The first group was to be at the point of contact at 2300 hours on 8 JUNE.
