5. KDFACTOR-2 will continue to reside in the kowferal building, as part of his termination agreenent, until probably sometime in December when he will move to new quarters of his own. The KDLITERAL building $\square$ Unit 15) is part of the KDVAULT comeles of buildings which will be disposed of as reported in other channels. If this occurs before December, KDFACTOR-2 will move at the time of disposal.
6. KDFACTOR-5 and his family will vacate the kaissinthe apartment o/a 31 August. KDABSINTHE is located in a building owned by KDABBEY who plans to dispose of his equity in the property in the near future.

## PRODUCTION

7. KDLITERAL: Before being closed down, KDLITERAL, through KDFACTOR-2, was the source of within-the-compound photographic coverage of PCS and TDY MHHARSHers. He provided an average of three rolls of film a week and provided weekly written reports based on his visual observation of the target area.
8. KDABSINTHE: Operated by KDFACTOR-5; KDABSINTHE produced an average of six rolls of film a week and was our principal source for information on visitors to the MHMARSH installation especially "WOCORK-type" persons and political exiles. This segment of KDFACTOR was also our main source of information on MHHARSH license plates and automobiles.
9. In addition, KDLITERAL and KDABSINTHE both provided detailed "attendance sheets" on all Mifuarsh personnel. With the loss of this combined coverage, it will be difiicult to identity personnel assigned to the MHHARSH installation or to monitor their daily movements in and out of the compound. The two surveillance points also provided periodic photo studies of the sHHARSH installation itself with emphasis on coverage of the construction changes and modification or additions made to the communications antenna system.

## SECURITY

10. We were gratified to receive the very favorable Headquarters KDFACTOR security review which was forwarded as HMMi-19,061, 28 June 1972. There is no need for further comment.

## PROBLEMS

12. KDFACTOR Project termination costs have been charged to FY 19.72 with the exception of rent payments and utilitj costs which are being charged to FY 1973. The breakdown of agent termination costs is as follows:

3. KDABSINTHE: Ceerated by KDFACTOR-5, KDABSINTHE praduced 100 rolls of film and cintinued to be the principal source for information on visitors to the NHHARSH installation, with special attention given to visits of "hocork-type" persons and political exiles.
This segment of KDFACTOR also continued to be the main source of information on MHHARSH license plates and automobiles.
4. KDLITERAL and KDABSINTHE both continue to provide cetailed "attendance sheets" on all MHLARSH personnel. Without this combined coverage, it would be difficult to identify personnel assigned to the MHHARSH.installation or to monitor their daily movements and activities. In addition. the two survellance points provide periodic photo studies of the muHarish installation itself with emphasis on coverage of any constructionchanges and any modification or additions made to the communications antenna system. Both sites are also available to service special support requests as required. During the period, KDLITERAL performed a number of special photo surveys and a three-week frequency sweep requested by woacre.

SEGURITY REVIEN
7. There were no :nown problems of security relating to the project. In response to Reference B request, we have reviewed all phases of the operation and belleve that project security is sound. The project assets have all been with us for many years and have established themselves as respectable long-time residents of the area. All five assets, four in one family and one in another, are extremely security conscious and have all been SGSWIRLed. The assets derive a substantial portion of their invelihood from their fRTRUST, $;, y$ employment and would thus lose a great deal if security factors ever necessitated a termination of their work for us. As an additional safeguard, the KDLITERAL and KDABSINTHE operations are compartmented from each other, and there has never been any indication that either segment of KDFACTOR knows of the other's existence.
8. The only termination of a project asset in recent years was KDFACTOR-1, who formerly processed the photo product from both surveillance points. KDFACTOR-1 was terminated amicably in March 1971. We still maintain periodic contact with him; and his brother, KDADAGE-14, continues to be one of our more valued MiHARSH access agents. KDFACTOR-1 is a reputable physician with a wide circle of friends, and on a number of recent occasions he has been very helpful when we have taxed his expertise in his field or requested background information on people in the medical profession. Although RDEACTOR-1 processed the photo product, he was not knowledgeable of the exact surveillance point locations. Delivery and pickup of the finished product was always accoplished by an outside case officer.
9. Contact is maintained with only two of the five assets. KDFACTOR-2 and -5 , both of whom are responsible for the operation of their respective basehouse's. Both KDFACTOR-2 and -5 are met weekly to obtain the KDLITERAL and KDABSINTHE product for timely processing and analysis by the Station. Meetings with KDFACTOR-2 are car pickups at periodically changed locations in the suburbs. Meetings with KDFACTOR-5 consist of car meetings early in the morning along his route of travel to his overt job. These meetings last only long enough to pick up the product, provide new supplies, and pay salaries. rents, utility bills. etc. Emergency contact plans are on file at the Station and have been forwarded to rieduyarters on both kncactop2 and -5. KDFACTOR-6, -8, and -9 are members of KDFACTOR-5's immediate family and could be contacted through him using his energency plan.
10. We have taken action recently to guard against the contingency that one of the present sites might be blown, and alternate

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means might be required to continue the KDFACTOR coverage.. In February 1972 an apartment became available in the same building complex which houses the KDABSINTHE installation. Through the cooperation of KDABBEY-1, we were able quictly to rent the apartment and install elements of the KDCALVERT team as residents. This location affords as good. if not better, vantage point for continuing photo coverage in the event the present KDABSINTHE location becomes untenable. We are also exploring alternate locations for KDLITERAL to solve the problem we face with this element of KDFACTOR coverage (sce below).

## PROBLEMS

11. The only known problem connected with the project is a product of mother nature which is threatening the effectiveness of KDLITERAL Coverage. Approximately two years ago HHHARSH personnel planted eight small trees along the edge of the terrace leading to the garden. These trees have flourished and now have grown to the point where KDFACTOR-2, the KDLITERAL operator, estimates he only has a year more of effective operational capability. We are studying ways of solving this problem and will forward a separate dispatch to Headquarters on the topic in the near future.

5. KDFACTOR-2: He is mot at 1630 every Tuesday by Bagaus. in several new widely spaced sites. Modus operandi is basically the same as that doscribed in the provicus operational roport for FERNALD, and after the meeting, KDFACTOR-2 proceeds to his cover job.
6. KDFACTOR-1: After moating with KDFACTOR-2, BAGAUS drives via round-a-bout route to a location sovoral blocks away irom the KDFACTOR-1 medical office, whero he leaves his car and walks to the office (taking counter-strvoillanco precautions on tho way). BAGAls. as Fernald previously, uses the notional cover of ofther a pharmaceutical"salesman for "Laboratorios del Norte" or that of a patient while waiting fin the outer office. The waiting period normally depends upon whether KDFACTOR-1 is in at the time, or whether he is in the middle of an operation at the hospitai. (Waiting periods vary from immediate admittance to the KDFACTOR-1 office to several hours). The average period is about twenty minutes: A decision was reached in the station to terminate this asset and to transfer this phase of the operation to the Station itself. in the interest of speed, security, and cost. This termination is planned for early March 1971, at which time, the processing will be done in the citalion.

## SECURITY

7. There have been no known security problems during this reporting period.

## PRODUCTION

8. KDLITERAL: During this reforting period, KDLITERAL through KDFACTOR-2 has again becin the principal source of within-thecompound photographic coverage of PCS and TDY MHHARSHERS producing 129 rolls of film. During the period covered, a great change of PCS personnel at the MHHARSII installation took place, and KDLITERAL played a leading role in assistang the Station in identifying the new members of the installation, through not only photographic coverage, but through detailed isual reporting also. In addition to reporting on the activities eif the different individuals in the target installation, KDLITERAL kas also reported on significant construction changes in the compound such a recent change in the antenna configurations on the rcof of the main building. During this period, KDLITERAL has boen speriffcally targetted against AEJEFE, on whom which a special report has been submitted.
9. KDABS INTH: Operating through KDFACTOR-5, KDABS INTH produced 158 rolls of film. It provided the $S$ tation with information on visitors to the MHHARSH installation, giving speciai attention to visits of "WOCORK-type" perse ${ }^{\text {ms }}$. KDABSINTH continues to fulfill requirements from the various sectlons of the Station who have requested fixed survellance of political exiles, otc., to determine if these individuals are in contact with the MHMARSH installation. This segment of KDFACTOR contint to be the main source of information on MAHARSH license $\mathrm{f}^{\text {lates }}$ and automobiles.
10. Both KDLITERAL and KDAPSINTH continued to prowide detailed "attendance sheets" on all MHHAPSH personnel. In addition, they provided reports on the activitjes and associates of IDENTITY who was on TDY $\square$ from 15 October through 4 November 1970. During this period both units wire also involved in surveilling the movements of an aEKICK techitician, (201-83S166) who periodically makes trips to olier Latin Amarjcan countries on short notice.

11. With the exception of the termination of KDFACTOR-1 (paras. 2 and 6) there are no further clanges contemplated in this operation during the next reporting period. It is expected that the termination of KDFACTOR-1 will iepresent about $\square, \quad$ in yearly savings for phat the previous two week photo

2. As far as the soeurity problem is coacerned, the gemerous
 whatever small temptation thero may have bern on his part to be indiscreet about his former nssocirtion. Althouph GheNDri his certain character weakne'ses wh'ch emerged as a lack of dedication and a feeling that he could get by with as little wor! as possible, the station believes that ho is basically not an irresponsiule person, and that he realizes not only that he has an obligation to respect security, but that ho alsu realizes that ho iars been trested fairly and w!th great patience. He has offored his services for the future, and he was told that we appreciated the offer and did not want to lose complete touch with him, but for now he should devote himself to gettiug a good job.
3. As for GERENDE's wife, LILMPTY-19, she also appeared to be grateful for the termination bonus which she had been granted (and which she was told had not been carved out of what was due GERHNDE). On the other hand, She has less reason to bo loyal to JKLANCE, and ser mental stability if somewhat open to question. Therffore, she poses a greater threat to LIEMPTY security than dues Gridide. At the same time, shc knows much less about Station operations ant personnel than does GERENDL. Furthermore, it is not likely that she would (a la Mrs. LIROCKET-1) go directiy to the Mminnshers with her information. What she might do is reverl to ter lawyer hat gbiendi iad worked for LNPURE and therefore had incore to which she mighi locl that she is entitled. Since GEFENDE is no longer employed and therefore no longer has regular income (except for monthly payments of the ternination bonus, which she has agreed in writing not to claim), this threet has also been lessened. Theoretically, however, she could expose LIEMPTY and LIFEAT tochniques (since she has been a LIFAT transeriber). but she could not, as lar as we knaw, expose any currently eraployed agents; with the exception of liEnIPry-1, who is married to GirRende's sister. (Nome of the above assessmeat ui the possible security threat posed by Libupry-iy is changed by her 8 July visit to JKLANCl: lleadquarters.)
4. There have been no changes in the functioning or activitics of the Licalif base house. In addition to the routine photos, "attendance reporte," and special concentration on the activities of various individuals (most recently AETURHKLY), LILMPTY-9 rosponded to a number of spot requests. For instance, it was LICALLA coverage which was instrumentai in helping to identify the AnGRIP officer who came to Moxico lity to ineet an linkead agent (see MrXICO CITY 2820, 30 march 1970) and to establish that the TDYer spent most of his time in the company of other AEGRIP officers. Also, when the AkKICK inspectors finally arrived early in April, I. IBMPTY-9 was able to establish that their principal "escort cificer" appeared to be "AFTUNNKY. LIEMPTY-9 was also alerted to watch for the arrival of the subject of DIRECTOR $0.12120,12$ June 1970 (and has not, as of this writthe, seen any sign of him). Perbaps the must useful contribution during the reporting period uas the updating of a sketch of the back of the mhinas: mimbassy. identifying the persons he most often sees at each window. Used in conjunction with the AEMIDAIFF debriefiug (and her knowledge of the inside), this !elped us come up with as accurate a view as we have ever had $0^{5}$ the location of various offices and officers within the shHarsh mobasisy.
5. There have alse been no charges in the functions or aclivitics of the lilyRtC base house personnel. plictos and logs of daily comings and goings were routincly furnished. the logs chte again proved their value by indicning that the subject of MEXICO CITY 3389, 8 June 1970, was probably lying whe: he said that he had meetings with acturnkey at certain times on certain dates.

The logs showed that AETUNKty aight have made the first meeting, but would certainly have been late for it. for the alleged second meeting, however, the log showed that AETURNKEY was in the MhHARSK Embnssy for the entire prericd of the mouthig (subject of yaxico CITX 3389 later amended his story to say that AsTURNKEY had not rade the sucond meeting). LILYBIC personnel were quack to spot the subject of MEXPCO CITY 3542, 25 June 1970, making visits to the MHHillSll tmbass;, and reported these yisits by phone ewon before the Station had learned, from Linivoy, of this person's teleplione call. Several other visitors of apparant wolddy nationality were a) fo routimely reported to local LN iRGO, along with a request for license plate resolution if a molady license plate is spotted. Late in Junc, LILYRIC was alarter to report the possible visit of a person who had made phone call to 201-087316, offering the latte: some "interesting faformation.". LILHMIC spotted and photographed a persun who may be idertical with the caller, and attempts are now under way to resolve this.
6. LIGMPTY- 4 continues to handle all photo developing and rinting (e:cept when cestain pints, are reeded gulekly), and in spite; of his leg ilfou:y, from which he is now recovered, he dir not miss any deadines. The fact that GaRkNDE has been term!nated is not expected tonfect his relationslidp with the station, even
 ectablished good raprort with him, and he hars stated that GiriznDE's g:eblems are not his and will have no effert on bis association.
7. The nuove recital of LJLYRIC and LICALLA pctivities would seem to indicate a heavy ci emphasis. Actually, this is not the case, Fhile CI is an important by-product, net only for ourselvas but also in support of ralk-in operations ran by other agencies, the day-fin day-nut bread and buttor photo and fixed surveillance information is of rreat importance to our positive operations. The drata base which has bevol huft un and matntained by hibluTi facilties, along with the services of LIMNVOY, LIFBAT, and LIEMBKACE, give the station an imelessive summont mnaratue whint is vital to our program.
8. With respect to the approved project renewal formarded with Referance $B$, we have the following comments:
a. Through an oversight, we neglected to report in Reference A that lohXXIC base house rent was raiser? as of 1 Jenuary 1970 to an anmal rate of $\$ 3,360.00$ (USD).
b. Licallit base house rent was raised, effective 1 July 1970 , to an annual rate of $\$ 1,373.00$ (USD). (Reference fhows that this figure has already been requested for FY 1971.)
c. As indteated in Reference $A$, salary increases for 11 reanining lisinr TY personnel whll probably be recomanded in the near future.
d. The GERENOE dark room rent (MEXI 137) is now being paid to LIEAPPY-4. Pending the completion of Gekhinds's new house the lab work was being done temporarily in lingity-a's office. With the suspension, and now the termination cophnmp, it became necesion felt it only fair to pay Litarpty-4 arrangenent and uso per montin), but ondy for the use of pis this fee ( $\$ 80.00$ for increased water and electric bills space but also for increased walting iror, his haviog to develop, (particularly the late photos, GERENDE was paid through December print, and dry the photos. GM-4 was paid retroactively for 1969, and in June 10 to 30 June 1970. It is planued to continue the period 1 january the monthiy payments, so this item shubit to restored in the next project renewal request.

9. The changes noted above do not involve large amounts of moliey, and are also to some extent vifselfing. Therefore, it is mot likely that these changes will require adiditional funds for FY 1971 over the mount apprcved.
10. As requested in Reference $B$, ícllowing are emergency commo plans as worked out by FNRiald:

SUMMARY

1. The LIEMPTY Project has thus far Eurvived the absence from duty of its principal agent, Raymond H. GERLNDE, as well as the threat to the security of the project represented by GERKNDE's marital probloms. Bruce H. FWRNALD has been handiling all project personnel since early December 1969, when GERLNDE was deactivated and placed on half-pay. No problems have resulted from this, other than a delay in the recelpt of photos (FERNALD is unable to meet LIEMPTY porsonnel as frequently as GERENDE was). The security threat will remain as loag as GERENDE's estranged wife has it within her power to expose GERENDE'S RVROCK connection and the type of worh he was engaged in, She has continually promised not to do this, and thus far she has kept her word.
2. The LIEMPTY product continues to be a valuable one for the Station. It continues to play an important Cl rolo (particulariy for LNERGO and LNREAD) but its greatest value, as far as the Station is concerned, is in the positive ileld. Two recent examples underline this: The early (and thus far only) debriefing of AEMIDRIFF was accoaplished almost exclusively by showing her photos of all mifharsh mbassy nersonnel and getting from her a character sketch on each individual. These photos were all obtained by LILYRIC and LICALLA. Secondly, LIEMPTY observations (as oppoged to

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photos) played an important role in our total coverage of AESEASICK during tho recent operational activity undertaken against AESLASICA. Ia short, Libipty remains a highly effective and highly useful support asset, whose product is obtained in ordor to be used operationally, not simply collected for the files.

## GERENDE

3. The GERENDE problem is unquestionably a serious one. We are forwarding under scparate cover copies of several memoranda prepared by GERENDE. Ono outlines the history of his marital problems, another describes the current legal situation, and a third outlines proposals for a settlement. There is no hope of reconciliation. The Station's position with GERENDE from the start hag bcen that he must agree to an amicable settlement with his wife in order to insure that she would not feel forced to take steps which would feopardize the security of Station operations. For this reason, the Station insisted from the beginning that any financial settlement with his wife would have to take into account the fact that he was recelving a certain malary from RVBOCK, and that he could not fairly kecp this salary out of the settlement on tho grounds that his wife could make no legai claim to that salary. GERENDE's wife was made aware of our position on this, and she was grateful, even though she realized that this arrangement was strletly informal. The Station felt that GERENDE could not be allowed to use his RVROCK salary as a wapon in the disputa with his wife, because if he did, she could hardly be expected to refrain from exposing his connections. Indeed, events have shown that GERENDE's wife is yindictive woman, and if it had not been clear to her that she, as well as GERENDE, would lose money if he loses his job, she might have blown the whistle long ago, GERENDE, for his part, would have preferred to keep his RVROCK salary entirely out of the picture. Eventually, however, he agreed that the Station position was fair, and he said he would conform.
4. The attached memoranda from GERENDE are, in the Station's opiaion, basically fair accounts. In the beginning, the Station Was incilined to give GERENDE's wife (LixipTY-19) the benefit of the doubt, largaly because her description of Gbrende's charactex weaknesses came as no surprise (particularly his tendeacy to procrastinate, even when his marriage was at stake). Early in the conflict, LIEMPTY-19 contacted RIZZUTO and asked point blank what she could tell her lawyer about gerende's salary. She was told she could not mention the RVHock portion under any circumstances, and that if she told anyone that GERENDE had any connectiop with LiPURE, the connection would be denied and GERENDE would be terminated. She appeared to accept this gracefully, even though it meant she would have to scale her support demands down to the level of GERENDE's overt income (GERENDE's monthly salary from RYROCK was over 7,000 pesos; he earned an additional 4 to 5,000 pesos teaching English, and he has since rented their house, for which he is receiving slightly less than 7,000 pesos monthly). Subsequentiy, LIEMPTY-15 was told thet the Station would see to it that as long as GERENDE continued to receive an RVROCK salary, he would give her the same.proportion of this salary that the courts determined should be paid from his overt income. This, of course, was strictly an informal arrangement, one which would stop the minute GkRENDE stopped recelving a salary. Latex, as LIkMpTy-19's position hardened and her vindictrvoness began to rule her actions, LIELPTY-19 was reminded by the Station that the longer it took for an amicable solution to be reached, the greater was the chance that GERENDE would lose his job. If she perststed in having him arrested (which she succeeded in doing twice), his job would be jeopardized. While she continued to repeat sweetly that she had no intention of causing his termination, and had never breathed a word to a soul about his RVROCK affiliation, her attitude was in fact jeopardizing his job and if he lost his job, she and the children, as well as GERENDE, would lose income. Her attitute is

Ho can spot unusual or atypical behavior, and when he is asked to put a certain individual under close serutiny, his comments can be very useful. Nowcomers, no antter what their cover. W11L frequently gravitate to their IS colleagues in the "safety" of the MHHARSIl back yard, thereby enabling us to make tantative AEKICK or AEGRIP identifications. TDYers can often be linked up with thair internal escort officers. In the case of specific targets, Licalia spocial coverage can sometimes give clues topersonal relationships which can be exploited. During the reporting period we had special coverage on AESkASICA (to deteraine any changes in pattern following the AbMIDRIFF defection and following the operation against him - - and in both cases Licalla did report some change in pattern): 201-305870 (for much the same reason, althougif here the evidence was not is clear): AEPOLIP (to gather information on his patterns and his associatious); AbTAKEOFF (for the same reason); and 201-838166 (to lind out if he did, in fact work in the "restricted area" and who his associates were. a requirement which was quickly satisfied). Also, Licalua has been asked to report on the arrival and activities of Toyers such as the ALKICK security inspectors (he is not, of course, told that "security inspectors" are expected -- he is told of the expected arrival of visitors, and he can spot a visiter or newcomor immediately), the possible arrival of 201-314616 and, currently, to attempt to Identidy, at least by association, the perscu who went out to meet an LNREAD agent (subject of MEXICO CITY 2741, 17 march 1970). Tho value of Licalla to the RiDTOP program in Mexico city can scarcely be overstated.

## LILYRIC

8. There have been no changes during the reporting period of the operation of the LILYRIC basohouse activity, except that Bruce H. FERNALD took over the handling of the LILIRIC personnel from GERENDE in early December. FERNAD normaily meets only LIEMPTY-13, at pro-arranged sites and times (also well ausy from the MHHARSH area), once a week for pick-up of the filas and reports. He occasionaily meets LIEMPTY-14 (LILMPTY-13's wife) when hikMPTY-13 may be out of town. The LILYRIC coverage is a fraily eaterpriae with the work equally divided among LIEAPTM-13, -4, 26, and 27, who split up the hours of duty so that there is uninterrupted coverage zondays through fridays from 0500 to 1800 hours, and 0800 to 1500 hours Saturdays. (Extra-hour or week-end coverage may be requested as necessary, and the LILIRIC personnel responded to the Station request for such extra corerage duriag the AEMIDRIFF and AESEASICK cases.) The family has continued to provide reports during the reporting period on all activity centered on the front entrance of the MHHARSH Embassy. Such coverage included, as in the past, daily logs on the comings and goings of yHHARSH officials, up-tc-date recording of MHLARSH license aumers, special activities and visitors (particularly Amertcans, of wice five were spotted and reported on during the reporting period), and some 3,500 photographs. As an example of the value of lillyhic coverage, within one week of the change of license plates at the mHHARSN Embassy (a biannual change affecting all of mexico, with new numbers bearing no relation to the old), LILYRIC had provided a complete list of the new numbers (along with the cars to which the plates are assigned). Among other things, this enabled tho Station to identify AESEASICK's companions during his iust few days in yexica. Without LiLYRIC, identification of the new license plates would have taken months and would have handicapped our operations. LILIEIC has also provided special coverage of the visit of a Latin frerican CP representative, and is currently watching for the two ABNICS security technicians, 201-314616, and the man who went to meet the Lirisid agent. Also, LILYRIC has reported on visits of Mexican stideats and the ideatity of the MHHARSH representatives who deal with then or hand out Iiterature to them. In short, LILYRIC's services, even though the
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12. Regarding the project renewal for. FY 1971, as 1 far as LICALLA, LILYRIC, and LIBAPTY-1 are concerned, no changes in procedure are planned. The product is usoful, it is as timoly as present circumstances peimit, and the porsonnel involved are doing their jobs well. The only change foresoen is an increase in salary for some, if not all, of these agents. The most recent salary increases took effect in may 1968. Likmpty-4 has not had an incresse since January 1967, and LiEMPTY-13 since January 1964. increase in cost of living alone would be sufficient justification to raise saiaries, but in the case of these agents their consistently excellent work deserves to be rewarded. These salary increases will probably range between 10 and 20 percont. $\because \quad 19$
13. As Cor other project oxpenses; LIEMPTY-10 and LIEMPTY-11 will no Ionger be funded under LIEMPTY, but have been cransferred to LIEMBRACE effective 1 July 1970. Real estate expenses should remain fairly constant, with perhaps a slight allowance ior inflation. The rent on GERENDE's dark room (MEXI 137) will no longer be paid'with his termination. MV-2823 will be sold or otherwise disposed of and should not be included in the project for FY 1971. Equipment and operational expenses should remain constant.

1. While thig. iss nos. Intended to be a full exposition of my personal and private life over vecent years, 1 would like to make known some of tho facters that have, from my poilit of view, led up to the present sitiation.
2. I realize that the interests of the organizatirn and the interest of the indivfdials who may have opportanity to come in contact with my casce Afrtate as little porsonal involvanent as possiule in the llves of agents. Indeed, the requirements of security, compartmentation and efficiency prescribe the modue operandi and, to a great extent the norius vivondi, of agency personael not only in the sense of earning a living but also in manner of living. Ideally, the less said ahout an agent's private life, the better, but, as the years ge by, changes may cecur which go unreported or unnoticed and which may bring about inexpected ovents and repercuspicms. When forson har, beer wortiag for the Station, as f have, © © ifiteen years with little or no pergonnel handling problems, no security flaps, no obvious problems on the Job, and something cones up like the ahrupt separation of my wife (LIMMPTY-19) and re witt the percousl and potential security riskr, it has, entallof, I feel that some explanation is necessary. Should it be in oreler, I woild like this explanation te reach not only my present case ofifcer and Chief of station but also the former Chief and officers with whom I have had the prifilege to work over the years.
3. I would like to give thanks, in advance, for the patience and understancing that have been shown me thus far. fhatever the cinal outcome, I know that pecple have been bend ing over backward to be helpful and patient in hopes of an early solution to the conflict.
4. Back in Septsmiser 1959, shortly after our wedding in late 1958, ry wife and baby girl, were moved, by the agency, into a

spacious, carpeted, furnished apartment near the dizTAG rmbassy, which served intermittently as a listening post-basehouse for the agency. At the time, LImpTY-19 was working as the manager of the hookstore at the University of the fmericas rind, at the some time, studying for a B.A. in philosophy. Thos. Were harpy tires. We received a twomonth leave, wert to Europe, the fome olympics and visited LiEiPTY-19's family in Holliand. Back in dexico, when the Dase was in operistion. stayod home a lot (one of the reguirements), mindeg the dial and tave recorders and the baby -- mil unfortunate reveral of marital rcles. After exactly five years the basehoise was closed down and we lest rent, LitMPTY-le's salary and my mother's salary which she had been receiving as part-time basehouse keeper. my mother and youngest 3 ister gave considerable help in taking care of the baby while Lifin'TY-1y worked and when we went to Lurope and left the baby with thera. This was during the first three years at the base until we had our second child, Chrisiopher.
5. We moved to a small apartment in boass and, to supplement $t$ he loss cf salery and rent allowance, the station began paying 1,000 pesor a month for the use of dark roon 1 had built on the roof oi the buildiag. we had au third child, Madeleine, unplanned, two months after settling in the two-bedroom apartment. The a partment need not have been so small hut we had shosca it for its Iocation and style and because it was to be a temporary stop until we could rind something better. We missed zolng to the olympics In Tokyo which we had planned to do (1964) and instead began aegotiatiag to buy a home brilding site at kio Escrndido but whea the deal lell thragh, we decided to go on leave to kurope again, this time with the two older child:en. leavins the baby with my sister. We visited with LIMMPTY-1g's parents in Holland (they had moved back to Holland after having lived in Hashington. D.C., since 1043) and the two childrer, stayed with then while LIEMPTY-19 and I made side trips. Traveling is LIfmpty-19's greatest love in life. Upon our return to Mexico (I came back twe weeks earlier), LIEMPTY-19 was so depressed at leaving furone and being bsek in Moxico she was onotionally and physically lnaccessible for ajout six weeks. She had not fully adjusted to living fa Hexico or to setting riown and beconing a housfwife. Our cramped quarters, way of living, lick of moaey, my job, my irregular hours and havits, my friday night poker ganes, the three children, all these got her dewn.
6. In the fall of 1965 after our return from farope I began tenchiag Englisi to beginnerf, in the adult education program at the American school in the evenings. This started as a two-hour a week monlighting expeximent but by early 1966, through student contacts made at the school, I had brancted ous to tearining at the offices of Carnation Milk Co., Singer Sewas Machine, and Richardson-kterrell Dres Co. for a total of about tweity hours per week. LIEPPTY-19, meantime, was working rart-time at the Hamilton Schoo: in lomars where the two older childrer were attending. The farily finances improved and I was able to coavince LIEAPTY-19 thet

the best thing to do was-to invegt in land and build a house big enough for our growing family which by now had a lourth child on the way. With three friencis as partners, I entered on a land-buying deal which turned out to be complicated as we bought the land in the form of company stock. The company was liquidated and the asscts were distributed, as land, to the four partners. I paid for our share with the proceeds fron the sale of a small lot I had been paying for since. 1955. LIEMPTY-19 was at first reluctant to tie us down with a house but when we finally got the papers and land deed straightened out, she threw herself wholeherrtediy into the groject and the building whtrh began in August 1967. While LiEMPTY-19 fiuparvised the construction, I worked during Septerder and october almost full-time for the olympic Organizing Committee and the group Arom Czechoslovakia which came to train in tie pre-olympics. My father-in-law deposited money in mexto to help us with tha majo: part of tre finanring oil the houme. Vie used $\$ 286,500$ pesos of tis morey and about $\$ 60,000$ that LLESPTY-19 and 1 had saved and got the house itnished enough to move in in March 1908. We were very short on furniture ind shortly after movinf, in bought theee bedroom sets, an autoradite washer and even a plano. Naturally, cash was scarce, dirt was plentiful. The yard was a pile of rubble, the carpentry work had just begun, there were no closets, the house was unpainted. Theveafter, we did things or the lacuse as the money came in: continued with carpentry, findshed the driveway, put in grass, built $a$ fence ind front fate.
7. Six months after moving in came time for the olympics and I worked, urofficially tias time, with the water polo team from Austrolia. LILarity 1 wroped for the month with the Dutch and Eelgian radio and Ty group. LIEAPTY-1g vas, once araia, caugh' up in the atmesphere of being among Europeans and doins somettuing exceting and out of the routine of home aud chiliren. She fell in love with the Australiar's as well, and for several months all she could talls of tias that we should moye to Australis. I gave it some thought but deciled that wo blad neither the money to invest nor the youth and echnical trainin's to make it as pioncers "down under" and, or the other hand, family, iriends, a house, and job seniority here in Mexicu.
8. Toward the end of 1068, LIEMPTY-iS decided it was time fo: me to move out of the master bedroom as she could no luager lace that aspect of our married life. For several months we tried this but it did not werk out fror re. One night in March 1960 after we retirned hone from a party, she ashed me to help her indress and when she, once again, reinsed to have any thing io dr with me, I got rough with her, prompting a decision on her part, which she had filready been podering, to visit her parents in holland as soon as possible. Her father provided the plane lare and she left in Arril for the United states to visit her brother and sister and folland, for rhat she said wonld be a five week trip. she stayed away ten weeks. The four efildren remained with me, the maid, and

I borrowrid from my iife insuradce pulicy and left with the three youngest children. Adriana had a touch of nepatitis and joince us three weeks latei. After spending the month in South Caroiins, we returned to sexico to find that LixurTY-lo had very much enioyed her solitude. he had alrfady talked about divorce before her trip to Hollned $f$ n the spring. I had told her that I would nut corsider parting with the children and she sald she would consider leaving them to me if I would settle the debt to her iather as well as sive her a substantial share of what she considered was her part of the house. The title of the house was in my name and had been since the buying of the land. LISMPTY-19 sid I could moitgrge or sell the house but that ihe money was what she was mainly interested i: I told her that the sale of the house vas not finarcially wise in $\because$ its unfinished state and tiat the house and land are very lifely to appreciate sharply over the next three or four years considering the housing developmints going on in the area. ddded to this was the seftimental attachment to the house and area. A mortgare, on the other hanc, ior the amount of rer fiather s ican plus what she was asking, was something I could not afford considering the more than 12 percent cost of such a mortgage in Mexico.
10. At the same time, duing September 1969, that we were going through the ajovementioned discussions, LIEMPTY-19 wrs taking a course at dapan Airlines to become a tour guide ard group leader for $\mathrm{F}^{\prime}$ :ps to the orien' as early as November 1969 and, certainly, to Zxpo 70 in osaka during the sprine and summer a 1970 . She receised a diploma to that effect. I told her th.t if she wanted out ci the marrage and wanted to be free to travel it was all right by me but that the children would stay with me and I would continue to repay he* father at the arreed rate ( $\$ 2500$ per month and 5 percent per yfar). She then sought lefal advice from ar old friend, Dutch lawyer Guillemo Floris Margadant who, in turu, steered hor to a young woman lawyer, Dra. Berta maytinez, who must have advised LIEXGTY-19 that unciex the local legal systen the only way to try for a sizrble cash settlement and considerable support was to hans on to the children becarse LIEMPTy-1.9 made a radical "about-face" in her attitude conce:ning them and she now said that she could not


"abandon" the children. I refused to visit her luwyer with her saying $I$ mas not interested in getting divorced, whereas she said that her aind was made up and that we wodld have to spilt up.
11. Things cfre to head on the night of 12 Noverber when I got home around 9 Pu and she sug;erited we have a trink ind talk things over. I mixed sme martinis and she began laying down the terms under which she thought rie should get divorced, i.e. I should move out of the bouse, mortgage to pay back her father ${ }^{\text {f }}$ money, grant her custody of the children and support of 2,000 pesos per month per child $(\$ 8,000)$. I said I \%ould not yet divorced nider those conditions and we discussed and argued in the kitchen for about three hours, killing bottle of gin in the process. We want upstairs and when 1 tried to make up to hex she tried to rouse the children, unsuccessfully, and then tried to leave the house which I mould not let hor do. She got hysterical, ploned a neighbo: Uta d: la hoz, then she rent into the front yard and awakened the noxt doon neighbors, Walter Hurley and his wife, and asked to go to their house. A few minutes later, Uta and her husband Guillermo came and LIGRPTY-19 wert with them to their home two blocks away. .bout a half-hcur later I walked up to Uta's to ask limmpty-19 to come home but wes told that she was busy phoniag her liswor and would not ieturn.
12. The following morning $I$ took the children to sshool as usual and my sisier Martia (LMEMPTY.4's mife) picied them up ard took them to her house where 1 joined them for lunch. Lishury-ig came by in the late afternoon while my sister was rat, piched up the children saying she was taking them home, failed to do so, then disappeared and was not to be found.
13. It was the subseruent action taken by LIEMPTY-19 in dropping her lawyers and taring on the services of Bernabe Jurado, the most notorious penal attorney in mexico, that led to the potential security hazards that ensued.

SUBJECT: GERENDE Status Report

The present situation of the marital conflict between GERENDE and his wife (LISMPTY-19) is as follows:

1. GERENDE is living at his mother*s apartment at 99 Carlog B. Zetina Street, Apartment 9. Ho has rented a three-bedroom apartment at Tornel 2 corner with Pedro Antonio de loa Santos where he-has stored the household effects and furniture removed from bis former address at Ladera 39, Lomas de Bezares.
2. The house at Ladera 39 is reated to an executive of Chrysior Corporation International, Dr. Leon MARKIEMCZ, bis wife, and fifteen-year old daughter, all of Argentine mationality. The monthly rent is 6,700 pesos $\mathrm{H} / \mathrm{N}$ and the contract is for two years, beginning 1 February 1970.
3. LIKMPTY-19 and the four children are apparently still lioing at the residence of the Netherlands' Ambassador, Barcn Schelto Van Heemstra at pena 360, Jardines del Pediegai. It seems fairly certain they are at that address from things that the two older children, Adriana and Chris, have said to GERENDE on the last two occaslons he has seen them. They have been there since 5 December 1969. LIEMPTY-19 has denied that she has ifed address and says that she is staying with "friends."
4. LIEMPTY-19 is continuing to use the services of Bernabe Juardo as ber lawy: and, through him, is pressing for even more advantageous terms in the divorce than sthe had asked in November. please see the attached copy and trasiation of the latest proposal made by Juardo on 4 march 1970.
5. The charges and accusations made by LIEMPTY-19 againgt GERENDE are still not completely resolved and are as follows:
rests Insults, threats and attempted homicide - this charge rests at the $5^{\text {© }}$ Juzgado Penal, $2^{\text {a }}$ Corta penal located at

showing up to date payment of the loan at the "Mega 31m." No further action has been taken by LIEMPf Y-19 or her lawyer on this matter but the charge has not finally been settied and is still pending. The charge is, of course, unfounded and is awaiting the proper "lubrication" in order to be filed away.
c. Neglect - this charge was made by LIEIPTY-19 in Decomber 1969 at the $7^{\circ}$ Juzgado Mixto de Paz claiming that GERENDE had abardoned LIEMPTY-19 and the children to their fate and that they were utterly destitute. GLRENDE was not notifiad of this charge and on 9 Fobruary after attending hearing at the Villa Obregon juzgado (see below), once out on the sidewalk, Judicial police agents detained GEREMDE, took him to the procuradurta and from there to Lecumberri. This process involved belag fingermprinted and mugged. The following day GKRENDE was out on a 2,000 pesos bond and three days later, 13 February, the justico of the peace (a woman) formally set GERENDE free for lack of evidence. GERENDE and Magallon went back on 5 march to plek up the bond money and see if Jurado had appealed but he had not and, apparently, that matter is closed.

6. On 14 November 1969, one day after LIEMPTY-19 disappeared from home taking the children with her, GERENDE brought charges against her for minor lesions and showed medical proof thereof. The hearing of 9 February after which gkillinde was detained, was called by Villa Obregon judge Bonfilio SEGURA. GERENDE reiterated the charge, LIEBPTY-19 denied it, the fudge ruled against her, ordered ber to prison but since the injuries were minor, it does not require privation of liberty and she must only go and siga-ia once a week.
7. LIEMPTY-19 is at present teaching school at the Edron Academy on Caleri. Street in San Angei Inn. The two older children are going to school there. During the latter part of November, all December and half of January, the children did not attend any school. On three occasions GERENDE has been to the school at 13:30 to try to speak to LiEBPTY-19 and see the children. LIEMPTY-19 has objected to this and the meetings have been short and fruitless except for GERENDE learning that they are atill staying at the Dutch Ambassador's. GERENDE's last visit thece was on 3 March (Tuesday).
8. After the Villa obregon judge dismissed himself from the divorce procecdings, according to standard procedure, the case went to Coyoacan and Xochimilco respectively where the judges, in turn, excused themsolves from the case and it has finally come to reside at the ist Juzgado Civil in the D.F. The judge is olda CORREA (woman) and has the reputation of boing tough and pretty straight. Sifce LIEMPTY-19 has not given an address where divorce suit papers can be served her, the suit has not yet been iaitiated on GERENDE's part. LIEEPTY-19, on the other mind, has not had


GERENDE served with papers though his current address is known. apparently becaưse she is still seeking a voluntary divorce aloag the lines and terms which are stated in the accompanying set of proposals. GERENDE cannot begia to accept these proposals in their present form as they are patently unfair and hardiy a point to beginniag bargainiag 1 rom.

The $10110 w i n g$ proposals were made to GERENDE on 4 march 1970 (Monday) by LIERPTY-19's lawyer, Bernabe Jurado, through mutual iriend, Licenciado Carlos Heyu, to wit:

TERMS under which the problem of [LiEMPTY-19] and [Raymond $\mathrm{H}^{\text {. }}$ GERENDE] couid be solved.

1. The right (patria potestad) to the minors would be kept by both the mother and father.
2. The guardianship and custody of the four children is entrusted to the mother. The father may visit the children once a week between 10:00 and 19:00 hours; he may take thers out once a month and will return them to the mother's address before 19:00.
3. The father 18 obliged to pay the mother the sum of 10,000 pesos $4 N$, in advance, per month beginning with the month of November 1969, since which time be has not given the mother or children any money at all.
4. This agreement will be raised to the level of a formal pubilic writ the day it is signed by both parties.
5. Both spouses agree to divorce voluntarily under the terms of this agreement.
6. Upon termination of the divorce procedure, by mutual consent, both parties will desist from the civil and penal actions that either might have initiated against the other.
7. Both spouses are obliged to attend punctually the meetings that the legal procedure establishes as well as grant the guarantees demanded by the public Ministry and acting Judge for the approval of this agreement and granting of the divorce.
8. In order that the father may visit his children and take them out, the mother is obliged to give notice of every change of address.
9. With the exception of the one day a week that the father may elsit the children and the one day a month when he may take

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them out, the father contracts the obligation of absolutely sbstaining from calling on the mothor's address, so that she may carry on her ilfe freely without neglectiog hor children.
10. Whilo the voluntary divorce is being processed, the mother and childron will live at and, an above stated, to satisfy their needs, the rather win maxe the first monthly payment of $\$ 10,000$,
11. Neither the father nor the mother may take the children out of Mexican territory without the muthorization of the other.
12. Since GERLNDE owes the parents of LIEMPTY-19 the sum of $\$ 286,500$ plus agreed-on interest, minus whatever payments he bas been able to make, the said GERENDE is obliged to mortgage the house at 39 Ladera, Lomas de Bezares in this city, procisely during the course of the divorce procedure by mutual consent as ostablished in the antecedent clauses and before the divorce is granted so that LIEMPTY-19's parents are reimbursed on their loan or on the outstanding unpald balance.
13. The expenses of making this agrooment a formal writ as well as the fees of $B$. Juardo will be paid by GERGNDE but these will be ilxed in an equitablo manner by Carlos Heyn to whose decision both will submit.
14. In case of failure to comply with any of the clauses of this agreement at any time or for just one time, either by GERENDE or LIEMPTY-19, both agree to expressiy establish the following sanctions and terms:
15. If GERENDE is the one who violates any clause just one time, he will forfelt the house at ladera 39 to the mother and children, LIERPTY-19, Adriana Juliette, Christophea Ramon, daria Madeleine, and Laurence Fernando, and said proporty will belong to the above mentioned persons.
16. If LIEMPTY-19 1s the one who violates the terms of this agreement for just one itme, she will lose the custody of children in favor of the father or whatever person he designates for the guardianship and custody of the minors.
17. Since LIEMPTY-19 has to establish an appropriate place to live, in the company of her four children, both parties agree that the household offects will be turned over by GERENDE, to LiEMPTY-19 for that purpose, us well as the automobile she has been usiag throughout the marriage.

3. After geveral larsely abortive attempts to get GERBNDE to follow up operational leads (and after noting, at the same time, fine job he did in recruiting LIRICE-13), the Station decided to preacint GERENDE with what amounted to an ultimatum: Following a gix-week leave at the home of relatives in the US, he was told that in recognition of his past aervices ho was being given a salary increase to. \$7,000 US per annum (which may not seem 1ike much unt 1 it is realized that GERENDE pays of OP car, to boot). He was also told that be would be given a number of ligads to follow up (in some cases persons to whom he had nitural nccess; in other cases loads which he would follow up under cover and in milas), $\operatorname{sig}$ wiell as agentg to handia (in alias). It would be up to him to"take advantage of this opportunity to perform up to his Level of husity; 1 he did so, Headquarters would be willing to work out an manity progran which would relieve bis worries about eventual retirement:, If he did not put out, be could expect to be terminated by the ond of FY 1970. GERENDE expressed his gratitude and his willimgnesm to put his shoulder to the wheel. and, in fact, he has doñe so. in october 1969 he took over the banding of LIANYIG-1-from OLiver G. SCANTLING, and the Station mea started to give him leads to hollow up. His periformance has lmproved In every waym-his punctuality ham improved. his written reports are continually improving; and he has made the efiort to devise approaches to the various leads and to start to follow up on them.
4. The station was therefore highly encouraged, until 24 October, when GERENDE reported that his wite wanted a divorce. The problem is basically one of incompatibility of personalities, exacerbated by the fact that GERENDE's operational activities resulted in his being home more often than a man who works normal office day. GERENDE'g wife had taken a long vacation alone earlier in the year, visiting her parents, and the leave taken by GERENDE, reierred to above, followed his wile's return and did not include her. Both times GERENDE had the four children. Thus the news of aivorce request did not come as a real surpisise. however, is that both parties want custody of the childrea, and the dispute becomes dally more bitter and more violent. The station has taken the position that security of GERENDE's operations must be preserved at all costs, hopiag, of course, that the divorce can bo avoided. At this wilitag, the outcome cannot be guessed. If the bitter fight reaults in the surfacing of GERENDE's RVROCK employment, LILYRIC and LICALLA are faced with at leastame threat of expogure. The mHHARSHerg are quite aware that a LIYEIC-lize facility exists; whether they suspect LICALLA is a moot question. LICALLA is in many ways more useful, and the MHHARSHers could put it out of business very easily by making their wall higher. Little could, or probably would, be done to prevent LILYRIC from functioning.
5. Dther than LIANVIL-1 and the LIEMPTY assets directly handled by GERENDE (LILYRIC and LICALLA personnel and LIEHPTY-4) other Station assets whose security might be affected by GERKNDE's current problems include LIENTRAP, LIRICE-13, and the YCM OP. GERENDE is also aware of the fact that some sort of operation, presumably technical, is or has been conducted from the LIMESA complex; he is aware of the existance and knows scme of the members of the LIEMBRACE tean (LIEMBRACE-1, -2 , and -4 , among the curreatly activa), and he knows of the existance of LIENVOY and LIFEAT. His wife is LIEEAT-19 and, has been a substitute transcriber as late as Iate 1968 and his mother was LIFEUD-19 (a former LIFEAT basehouse keeper inactive since June 1964).: GERENDE also knows SCANTLING, Eavid M. Wricted, and Raymond L. RARCBNAS, as well as curreat Station officers Vincent P. Bizzuro and Bruce H. FERNALD (the latter in alias) He has also met Andrew E. PELLEMENT, who used an allas. Tin his 15 years, GERENDE has worked in almost every phase of the Station's support activities, and even though in recent years he has been pretty much restricted to LIEMPTY, his knowledge of activities and assets which are still current is considerable. It is too early to judge the outcome of GERENDE's problerus, but the Station is making every effort to see that security of operations is not affected by whatever decision is reached.

No such leads ware found for GEREXDE sicing the reporting period famong other reasons, we have to intention of glving GERENDr: a lead simply for the sake of Giving him somethice to ro); but as soon as suitable lead is uncovered, it will be passed. to GHRLNDE.
4. GKRENDE was particularly uscful during the olympic period. While he ild not fete job with the olympic Committec as he had hoped, his wife was eaployed as a tanslator by the European television networks who han come to cover the games. This, plus other personal contacts, gave GERADシ a certain mount ot access to olympic lacilities. Botin GERFNDE and his wite holped considerably in the distribution of AEFGGHEAD material, and GERHNDE performed a number of miscellaneous tatks mssisting the Station in various olympic responsibilities.
5. GERENDE has also boen used in support. of JNROD operations, such as making mail sick-ups and dolivering material and making phone calls to Aablission. Sollowing the frarsaw pact bowers inrasion ot Crechosiovakia, GESEND: was asked to cover a demonstration in front of the Soviet kmbassy, and he wrote a rood report which was used in Embassy briefings. Becently, Grrlinnt has cmuolled at the University of the arericas to work lor an m.A. la contemporary Bexican history. The Station will explore the posstbllity of hts getting access to persons or lujormation of Interest on the University campus.
L. ICALLA
6. LIEMPTY-9's vork (in the LICALLA base house) pas inhibited In July due to the construction of a maid's roon near his working quarters. During the reporiing period, however, he took n total of 2,217 operational ptotos. His repular reporting and commentary continued as in the past. LIEMPTX-y is a steady and dependable performer, and his uniete vantale point remans the source oi the most interesting and reveniog photos as well as often very informative reporting.

LILYRYC
7. LIEMPTY-13, $-14,-26$, and -27 have been able to keep the L.ILYRIC base house manoed on a regular basis frem 0800 to 1800 hours weekdays and OSOO to fon hours on Saturdays, with other hours coverable upon request. Fis has proven to be a 1 ar ineter arrangement than depending on LIMITaD for some of this coverage. In addition to the 6,703 operations photos taken during the reporting period and the daily ifxed surveillance reports, LILYRIC reporting is of considerable help in compiling current vehicle and license plates lists, pcs arrivais and departures, unus:al activities such as, denonstrations or protests, unusual or lengthy absences of personncl, etc., all of which have

MEMORANDUM FOR: Acting Chief, Diviäcon D


SUBJECT : Limeas/Limust


1. Some attention should be devoted, if it has not already been, to the dangers involved in this operation and particularly to what countermeasures the target may institute, or may already have instituted.
2. One current danger certainly exists, to wt, the existence of project Licalla base, which is in the group of buildings comprising the Limesa complex. One of the agents at Licalla base is known to one of the Lipstick agents arrested in the summer of 1958, and it is, hence, possible that both the host government and the target knows of Licalla. It is suggested that perhaps II calla should be terminated. The reason has been advanced that this should not be done since the agent would be suspicious and in any event hicalla might serve as a red herring for Ifmean. It is believed that the Licaila agent could be gotten out of this operation without arousing bis suspicion. The Station could mount an obvious tail on him; then be reported it, he could be told he had probably been made and that, hence, the operation should no longer continue. The agent has been a good one and could be used elsewhere on some other work. Licalla house is going to be repaired soon. This wight be a good opror. tunity to stop words there and let some innocent party rent it. That would be better red herring.
3. Concerning the manner in which Livest houses were acquired by the Station, it should be kept in mind that the purchase mechanism was identical with that used in Limited. The watchasan at Limited knew an American owned it and told this to what to him must have seemed a casual visitor to the premises when it was under repairs. He should, therefore, assume the targets know an american oms it and that it is blown. Therefore, we should also assume that if the targets have conducted any sort of an investigation of Limesa houses, they may well have discovered that the same ultimate owner is involved. So far as is known, the bank with fronts for the purchases has not been checked to see if any inquiries have been mede. We must agree the targets have the arability to find out who the front owner is--the bank-- and from there could possibly establish the identity of the owner, Limousine. Limousine and his firms have also been used as cover for other Station agents and operations apart from Limesa and Limited.

4. It ahould not be forgotten that a person tried both to rent and buy limesa properties earlier in the year after ve owned them. So far as we know, a check on this person was not. productive of suspicious data, but the question arises as to how thorough the inveatigation was. Posaibly the name the man gave whien making inquiries was false, meaning that in effect the right person has never been investigated at all. Knowing that the targeta have in the past shown some intereat in the inaesa buildings, it is not beyond the realm of reason that this man was sent by then. The atory he gave for wishing to rent the house--because it was hendy and close to a certain school--is identical with the story used by the Station to cover rental of Licalla almest next door.
5. Even granting that the true omership of Linesa has not been discovered by the targets, they have various recourses through which to establish the identity and activity of the occupants thereof. The following possibilities suggest thenselves:
a. Enter into 11 itigation with Limesa owner over exact boundaries or other pretext, demanding property be surreyed. on court order, Limesa could be inspected thoroughiy.
b. Undernine target alde of Limesa valls, leading to possible condemnation of property by local government or necessity various repairs, ete.
c. Sabotage of electricity (causing fire) or water or sewage, necessitating entry into Limesa or outside persons, who could be infiltered by target agents.
d. Remalig by vehicle, with similar resulte, police, pirenen, etc.
e. Complaint to medicel authorfities on filth, refuse. etc., leading to inspection by health authorities.

1. Various sther approaches might be discussed.
2. One general recomendation can be made: sensitive material should be used and kept in a. crypt, and a good one, rather than in the relatively insecure speciai room now planned as the operational room.
3. Beyond this, every effort should be made to see to it that the operators have good cover. The idea of clotising them in local clothing is excellent and shous right thinking in that ilrection.



## GERENDE

2. During the repoiting period, the case officer has been meeting GlREND: an average of three times per weck. Mectings are usually premuranted, at various sites and times. Heetinces asciage 20 to 30 minutes. GLRENDE turns over to the case officer nopditives, prints, logs, and other reports which he has picked up from the base houses since the previous meoting, alon; with brief contact reports on his meetines with base house representatives. Reports on other operational activities are also turned in and discussed, and GkRLNDF is given instructions, notes for the base houses, and negatives for any enlargements which may be desired by the Station. Also, LIENVOY tapes and transcripts are cxchanged at each meeting. (The departure of LiACUTB-1 at the end of April 1968 left the station without a BEDOX transcriber. As a temporary solution, pending the return of IIACUTE-1 or the recruitment of another BEDOX transcriber GERENDE's wile, LIEMPTY-19, has been hired at the rate of 31.50 pesos per hour to transcribe the Spanish language portions of the tapes. She does tho work in her home, and GERENDE transports the tapes.)
3. GERENDE has the diroct afent-handiing responsibility for the following LIEAPTY agents: LIFAPTY-4 (photomprocessor; met twice per week) ; LIFMPTY-6 (LIMITED; met onco per week until termination) ; LIEMPTYs $13,14,26$, and 27 (LILYRIC; LIEMPTY-13 normally met twice per wook -.. in his absence LIEMPTY-27 makes meetings); and LIEMPTY-9 (LICALLA; met twice per week). Ilo is responsible for directink their work, paying them, and handing all oi the administrative problems which may develop. To judge from the results, GERENDF has excellent rapport with these agents ana is able to mot a consistently high periorance rate from them -- particularly LICALIA and LILYHIC personnel.
4. As noted in reference, GEIRNDE was amployed by the Merican mbmavil, committee, which we found a uselul side benefit. His MHRAVEL aetivity during the reporting period has been minimal, but we expect it to start picking up again. gerende has conducted a few discreet inquiries and investigations for us within the MmaYRi, complex, and we have instructed him to try to fet an assignment which will keep him as close to the fuSTEAL delegation as possible.
5. Referonce also pointed out that GERKDDE had performed nicely in the cultivation and doveloment of an operational lead, and that the station planned to rive Gerandm more of the same. Furthermore, GETANDE's standing assigments (bIEMPTY hase houses, mmavin activity, and occasional sumport os JMmod requirements) wero not challenging enough or vecunying enuugh of Germani's timo. Gimende is rather firmy committed to Woryen by virtue of the fact that he has worked for worime for over 13 years and has no other outside employment of nay consequence. By the same token, he was, throuth no fault of his own, doin! less work for forima than at any time in his career. GembNDE's operational exposure throweh the years dictated more and more restrictions on his activity, for sound security reasons. The solution to GhntNDE's problen (lacl: of a promisine future) and the Station's (not fetting its money's worth) seened to be to rive GlBREDD additional tasks which he could handle under suitable cover and with due regard to security precrutions. Since most of Geridnde's support activities had been against the FJSTEM, target, particular ears would have to be taken in commiting him further in this direction, It was decided, therefore, that his principal retooling would be in a non-FJSTEML dield.

i. In line with the above reasoninf, Gimindr: was introduced to Anarew $\mathrm{S}_{\mathrm{B}}$ Doschen on 17 February 1968 . The Idea was that GEMKRDE Would be trained to assist bocillik in some of his operations azainst Central Amerlcan targets. Grminnt: sprincipal duty thus iar has beeta to take ovor the handing of filfili-3, under mschas's elose sumervision and gudance. GERENDE has percormed quite creditably in this task. He scoms interested in the weri and has leamed quickly. on the other hand, an apparently ingrained hablt of procrastination has resulted in dilatory reportiug. If Gtilindy can overcome this (and woth case officers are workinf hard to teach GFibNDE the importance of prompt and completer reportings) there seems to be every reasion to belleve Gintinde will devulop linto a competent rgent hander.
T. Gusende was alao fiven the task of locating and developing (in alias) a rirl who, por LIfNVOY, was belug cultivated by AERODENT. Although GEBLENDF had to be continually reminded of tho assimnment, he did an excollent job of meeting the giri and faining her confidonce. It is quite likely that he could have recruited the firl as an access arent ngaingt AERODNT, but as this point was reached another operation against AERODENT was launched and it was not folt that attempting to recruit the cirl would scrve any useful purpose, for the time being at lanst (amone other thines, thero wass no indication that sho had had any contret with AERODFNE for some months). The only flaw in GERBNDE's pertormance was tho time it took him to get around to doting the jub. It should be mentioned, howover, that at the same time GERFNDE had a muber of pressing personal matters to nttend to, including overscelng the completion of his new house, which he iinally moved into on 10 march 1068 , even though construction is still not ontirely completed.
3. Amons other assignments completed by GERENDE in the reporting perion woro tho renting of an apaxtment for use as a listening post; and initiating a relationship witn a fussian translater working for the MIRAVEL committee.

## HCALLA

9. The star of the LiEMPTY show, as far as quality of performance is concerncd, continues to be LIEMPTY-9. His favorable location and his perceptiveness continue to result in revealing photos and equally revealing commentary. In addition to the $2,90 s$ operational photos taken during the reporting period, he fas providod dally, weekly, and monthly summartes and notes, semi-monthly attendance reports (of FJSTEAL personnel spotted by him), various special reports, and special intensive coverage of the following: 201-120123; 201-107668; 201-271103; and $201-305570$. As of 1 May 1968 LIEMPTY-9's salary was ralsed from 4,000 pesos to 4,500 pesos per month. LIEMPTY-9 was also given permission to have a mald's room constructed on the roof of his apartment. The original maid's room is LIEMPTY-!'s photo point. The zaid, who has been with the family for 11 years (since she ms 10) elcher sleeps in the hall, where she is in the way, or in the bedroom of LIEMPTY-9's nine-year old son, which LIEMPTim feels is befinning to be not a proper arrangement. The room will be built at a point on the roof away from the FJSTEAI installation (so as to arouse as little suspicion as possible), and the fact that the maid will be seon going in and out of the reca regularly should quiet any suspicions which may arise. Construction work put LICALLA out of action starting 24 June, but it is expected that the work will be Pinished by 20 July.

## LILYRIC

10. LILTRIC's pertormance cuntinues to be prolific .

8, 568 operational photos in the reporting period. Again, it

mould be pointed out that this blanket coverage is useful insurance that all activity is caught. Combined with the dally fixed surveillance reports on all members of the EJSTEAL installation, the station can safely fifty that lis coverage of F.STEAL. installation ingress and egress is complete durius working hours (and nay extra hours which tho Station wishes covered). Since $l$ hay LILYRIC has been on duty 57 hours per week: 0spo-1800 weekdays and osuo-1500 Saturdays. Commensurate Which their new schedule (and the return of 1.1 Em (ay-2e to the active roster), the total monthly LILYFiC salary has sone from 4,900 pesos per month to 6,000 pesos per month (LIEmins 13, 14. 26 , and 27 , are of course, father, mother, and two sons). The fixed survolllnnce reports are used on at daily basis, since the Station constantly has operational interest in knowing whether a particular FJSTPALFR mas "An" or "out" at articular time, and if out, who he went with, what time he left, etc. In addition, LILYRIC has standing instructions to notify GERENDR (and GERENDE the Station) immediately when Americano appearing visitors come to the FiSTEAL installation. Eight such visits were noted in the reporting period, along with number of other visitors who, for one reason or another, attracted the special attention of LILYRIC.

## LIMITED

11. LIBMPTY-6 slowed down noticeably in the reporting period. He was ill several times, his surveillance reports were ocamsionally inaccurate, and his photosiaphle work was poor. With the assurance that LILYRIC would be able to take up the slack (and gite us better coverage for less money) the decision mas made to terminate the LIBITFD base house. While we are thereby denied some of the flexibility which we have had in the mast, it is likely that LIMMPrY-6 would slowly have faded out of the picture anyway. While ho was in there, he produced 911 operatonal photos, as well as daily fixed surveillance reports. Following his termination (a report oi which is being forwarded separately) LIMRTY-6 took a trip to Europe and has now started working full-time in tho insurance business for his sou-in-law, where he has gained a now lease on life. In other words, the termination couldn't have been more amicable. LIEMPTy-t vacated the LIMITED apartment (he said he could not afford to keep paying the rent) and it is no longer available to the Station.

## PHOTO LAB

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12. LIEMPTY-4 has continued to process all Levmpu photo work. In addition to developing sud making contact primus of all photos mentioned above, he made 778 enlargements of various shots. The photo lab is still in his office, pending the completion of GLRFNDE's house.

## LICALLA

4. LIMHTY-0, the uperator of the LTCALLA base house, provided 1,2 gs aperational photographs during this period. In addition, he provided fixed surveillance reperts, sighting reports, and spectal notes and comments. LIEMPTY-9 has proven hinself to be a roliable and perceptive reporter of the events he observes. For this reason, he has been asked to provide spectal coverage on various individuals of interest, or on particular days when covexage is desired. The Station has found the LICALLA reports to be consistently useful in deterinining the presence, activities, and gersonal associations of target personnel. In parit this is due to the location of the LICALLA base house, but it is also due to


## LILYRIC


5. The LILYRIC base house has been a prolific provider of operational photos, 4,014 havinis been subnitted in the period under review. Whife there 1 s occastonally sureriluons coverage of visiting sports and cultural delegations (and Liluric personnel have been: Instructed to be more selertlve in this respect) the blanket coverage afforded by this base house funiantees that nothing will be missed during normal working hours. The fixed surveillance reports are voluminous, highly aceurate, and quite valuable. On three separate nccasions during the roporting period LILMMIC alerted the station to the presence of Anerican visitors at the target installation.

## LTATTED

6. The efficiency of the LMITMD base house has sutfered a slow decline. LIEHPTY-6 has been out of action for short periods because of illness and a physical examiartion. The physical, however, showed that he 13 din rood health and we look for an improvement in his performance in the next reporting period. Lis survelllance reports are not entirely reliable due to a tendency to assume that the normal occupant of a certain car is, $\sqrt{-314}$ were in that car. his photos, however, continue to be useful. -nere provided in the period under review.

## LIERTRAP

7. As noted in HBNL-33279, 13 Cctober 1967, the hiENTRAP photo vehicle, operated by LTEMTY-10 and LIEMPTY-11, is now in direct contact with LIEMBRACs-1, leader of the LIEMDRACE surveillance team. This arrangenent, which began in aid-August 1967, has proved to be a very hapyy onc operationally. In addition to permitting more flexible use of LiENTRUP for station requirements across the board, it has left GERLNDE more time to devote to other duties (see velow).

## pHOTO LAB

3. LIEMPTY- has continued to process the photos taken by the base houses, and in addition made 269 enlargenents in the period under review. During this period, the phote lab was moved to LIEMTX-4's office because of renc:atione geine on in GERENDE's house. LIEAXTY-4 processes the photos after working hou."s, and keeps the equipaent and photos locked away during the day. As LIEMPTY-A's office is in his home, the equipmert and photos are not left unguarded over night.

## GERENDE

9. As reported in reference, GERENDE had been developing

a possible access agent to LIRING. This eventual culminated in an attempted recruitment of the prospect by GERFNDS. Although the attempt was unsuccessful, GERENDE exhibited considerable resourcefulness and operational skill in developing the target to a point where the recruitment attempt was possible. We plan to use GERENDE in similar roles in the future as opportunities arise, and for this reason we plan to document him with a set of false Mexican documentation as well as a set of false mexican documentation. GERSNDE is collecting exemplars and getting the background information needed, and once the necessary data are assembled, Headquarters (WOACBE) support will be requested.
10. GERENDE has continued to provide support for the Jurod operation as needed.
11. In September and-October 1967 GERENDE was employed by the Mexican HHRAVEL comittee. He was able to get assigned as aide to the DIzTAG delegation. In this capacity he was able to supplement very nicely the information and support being provided by Jeremy 5 . HODAPP. This foot-in-the-door came in very handy, and is expected to be even more valuable in 1968, if GERENDS can get the position again. While the job was rather time-coasuang we believe that it was well worth it.
12. In connection with his duties with marayal, as well as In connection with the fact that his MOFIRA activities are nearly $100 \%$ against the FJSTEM target, GERENDE was given a very general briefing on the Station's ReDTOP program. It is our hope fat, in having a better idea of what the Station is trying to do in this field, GERENDE will be able to make an even greater contrabutton to that program than he has in the past.

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3. All aseto involved in the Lumpry Project performed in a satlofactory manrier during this period. Erfoctive 1 July 1967 LIENPTY-h and LILMPCY-11 were given ellgtt adary increanes, because of their increased activity.
4. There vere no known socurity incldont afecting the LIEMPTY Project or the asedte. involved during the three monthe under reviev.

## LICASLA

5. Fhis besehouee, the operiator of which is LIEMPTY-9, provided 1277. frames ot operational photographi covering the pitio and garden are of PJivigal. LIDMPYY-9 also propared fixed-survelluance reporte, alghting roport: and mpecial noteid and comente.

## LILRIC

6. The LILIRC basehouse, which is starfod by LTMMPY-13, -14 and -27 , produced 2854 frumes of operstional photograph during the poriod. The LILYAIC besehoue operators continued to prepare $11 x e d-$ aurvelliance reporta on each nember of PJTTEAL and turned these in on a weekiy basis. LIEMPIY-a? resumed his duties on 1 July as scheduled and this basohouse has now roverted to its noreal hours of coverige. (See reperence relative to the absence of LIEMPIX-27.)

## LDMTYED

7. The LIMTTED Basehouse, operated by LIEAPTY-6, produced 279 frares of operational photographa plus weekly fixed surveillance reports or each of the members of FJSTEAL. The LIMITED basehouse wes closed from 17 through 22 July becauce of the 1liness of LIEMPTY-6. Luring this period LIEMPTY-6 did very litte radio-alerting for the LIEABRACE aurveillance team because of the variation of the survelilance tean's activitios.

## LIENTFAP

8. The LIEMMRAP mobile photo vehicle had decrease in activity during this period because of the diamantling of the old LIEMPRAP vehicle and the modification and installation of suipmont in tro now vohiclo. The old LIEMTRAP vehicle was used to cover photographically all of the residencea of opposition slements in Mexico City. As in the past LIENMRAP provided photographic coverage of addresses of the local Coumunist parties, residences

- . of members of other Heaisphere parties and several PBHUMEN targets. A total of 332 erames of operational photographs were provided by LIENIPAP.


## ghoto yas

9. LIEMPTY-4, the operntar of the LIEMPTY photo lab, processed all of the operational photographs mentioned above as woll as providing from 2 to 6 endargements of 299 frames of photographs of apecial interest taken by the benehouses. LIEMPTY-4 doas the photo processing on Tuesday and Thureday nights.
10. Raywond H. aERENDS started the devolopment of a possible access agent to LIRTNO and also continued to provide support for the JMROD operation. These task being aside from his regular LTEAPTY duties. GERENDE was on vacation from 25 May through 4 Jine 1967.
11. There will be ons administrative change during the coning period yhen Yingent P. RIZZUTO will samem the Gase officer rempnathilitios for GERENDE/LIDMPTY. No problems are envisioned in this change over. No other significant changes ar planned.

4. There wera no known socurity incidents durins the periad covered in tnis report, As a precautionary measure, the LIEMFTY basenousemeeners weiv instructos to unintain incrensed vipilance in their respective areas and killilnes and to be propared to evacuate any incriminatink equipment ani papers sa macent notice. This was done because of the renewed interest in the assessirstion of Prebident Keniody which in turn brought forth comiterts in the press atouit photorraphs taken of oswald during his visit to Nexico. On three oceasicns durine this perfod,
 This was done in order to try to ascartain if any FJSTEAL persomel were taking weasures te verify the activities of LIFPPTY-E. LIEMBRACE-5 reported that all of the meetings he covered appared to be clean of hostile surveiliance. (NOTE: Headquarters is aware of the interest FJSTEAL has taken in LIEMPTY-6. LIEMBRACE 3 doe not know the exact location of LIMMTED/LIEETY-C, although he is aware of the existence of this asset because of the radio alert syeter used by the survelilance team when vorking the FJSTEAL target. In orier to avold LIEMBRACE-3 Eurvelling LIEMPTY-6 to the exact address, LIFGSNCS-3 was instructed
 after Limmback- was convinced that there was no hostile surveillance and after they had departed the weoting area.

## LTCALEA

5. During this period LIEMPTY-9, operator of the LICALLA besehouse, provided 1112 frames of oparational photographs coverins the patio ani sarden area of FJISEAL, ALl photographs provided by LIEMYTY-9 were accomparled ty plxedsurvelllance roports, sighting reports and special notes. Liscriy-9 is a perceptive individual and his apecial notes and coments are considered to be of great value by the interested section in the Station. LiCAiJs coverage was suspended during the period 19 through 25 March while LIPMPTY-Q sas takine; a welldeberved vacation. The cover of the LICALLA basehouse appears to remain good, with no undue attention devoted to it by FJSTEAL persomel.

## LHYRTC

6. This basehouse, which is staffed by LIPMPTY-13, -14 sai - 27 , produced 2553 frames of operational photographs during the review peris. LIEMTY-13 is employed full-time and most of the coverage is provided by LITNPTY-14, and -27, although during this period, LIDMPTY-14 carried the largest stare of the workload. In March the hours in which LIEMPTY-27, a medical student, attended school were changed from the aftemoon to the morning. This schedule change will remain in effect until the end of Jane 1967. LITMPTY-14 does not hare the mental composure to remain on the job for the hours needed to provide full-ti=e coverage and her homekeeping duties often interfered with her working hours. In order to alleviate this problem, the working hours of LIENPTY-6/LDITED were increased and those of LILYRIC/LIEMPIX-14 decreased. No serious loss of coverace resulted from this temporary change in working hours. The salary of LIFrimy-27 was cut in half for the period of time in which he will not be providing contimal assistance to the project.
7. LILYRIC remins as the main source of information on solady and other foreign visitors to FJSTEAL.

## LMMMED

8. LTFAPTY-6, the sperator of the LMMPE basehouse, provided 684 frames of operational photographs during the three month period. LIN-Ft-c also spent a great deal of time alerting for the LIEMERACE survellipnce tean during this period becsuse of the ABQUALTYY-1 operation, LISMPTY-6 was on vacetion irom 3 through 23 April and coverage from this basehouse was suspended durint this period. As mentioned above, LIEMPTY-6 now is workins longer hours in order to relleve LIEMPTY-1H LIEMPMY-6 does not know why his hours were increased.
9. Ch ona जocasion durins this perio? l.TPMPT-6, while alerting the LIEMERACE team on an FJSTEAL target, noted that a WOLADY subject had ertered SJSTEAL on foot. He aleated the team and they were able to surveill the subeac: and identify him through recorts at the hotel where he was staying.

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## LIENTRAP

10. The LIENTRAP photo survellhance truck was targetted against a paxported corged doeunent processing center, menbers and addresses of the local Coumunist parties and their rront mroupsy members of other Hexisphere parties, BEDOX perbonnel in Moxico City and the diziAg Comercial orfice. In covering these targets, 948 frames of operational photographs vere produced. LIBMPTY-10 and LITMPTY-11, LIENTAP operators, serviced, on a thrice veekly basis, over 20 postal boxes which are used as accomodation addresses by the Mexico City Station, other fleld stations and Headquarters.
11. LIEMPMY-4 who operates the LIEMPTY photo processing Lab, processed all of the above mentioned operational photographs as well as providing from 2 to 6 enlargements of 227 frames of photographs of special interest.
12. Raymond $H_{\text {, }}$ OEREADE continued to prozide support for the JMOD operation as well carrying out his duties as the Principal Agent for the LIEMPTY Project:
13. OERRDDE is planing to take a 14 day vacation starting in late May. During his absence Oliver G. SCANTENN will replace GFRENDE as the Principal Agent and contact for LIFMPMY-6, $-9,-10,-11$ and -13 . The Station Caise Officer will be in contact with LIEMPTY-4. SCAMILING knows all of the assets whom he M11 handle and has worked with them in the past, but has not met LIEMPTY-4.
14. As approved by Heaiquarters, the present LIEMTRAP vehicle will be replaced by a new Ford "Econoline" truck in the near Nuture. Defore the old LIENIRAP rehicle is sold, it will be used to cover residences of the FJGTEAL/NYXIS opposition who are living in Mexico City.
15. No significant operational or administrative changes, other than those mentioned in this dispatch, are planned for Project LINPMTY for the coming period.

GENERAL

1. Project LIEMPTY is a support project kilich provides information of CI/CE interest on the EJGMEAL Instaliation, FJNmill personnel, visitors to PJSTEAL, both indigenous and foreling and photogrephic coverabe oit various targots deemed of interest by the several oparational aections within the Station. The Project has eight active ajents plus Raymond H. GLRENDE, Princifel Agent; two vehicien, GERENDE's ?PV and the LIENTRAP photo truck; a photographic. processing laboratory; and, three beschouses, LILMRIC, LIMITED and LICALIA. LIEMPTY-10 and LEMPTY-L1, operntors of the photo survelllance truck, also acquire ard service $P$. 0 . boxes used operationally by the Statian, Headquarters and other Stations.
2. On 9 Docomber 1966 Luke R . MARSCHLLEK (p) assumed Case Officer respansibilitiea for the LIENPTY Froject. MARSCELLEX was introduced to GERENDS in true rame and GERENDS is the only member of the bIEMPIY complex rinom MAASCHALEK has met. There were no problems during the change of Case officers and none are envisioned in the future.

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## COMTACT AND COMMNTCATIOAS

3. During the period under roview, 30 meotinen were held with Gerende by the Project Case officer. Meeting altes and times were varied to avold establishlne a pattern and most wootins were scheduled at the previous meeting. Several unscheduled meetines ware held dupine this period and vere arranged by the Case Orficor telephoning Objibib to establish the meeting tise and site. THes and sites are coded when diocussed by telephone and are arranged in such a wny as to appoar to be a nomal convarsation. Telephone calls to GERENDE are made from pay booths located away from the LNPURE installation.
4. OERENDE held twice weakIy, clandestine meetinga with LIEMPTY-4, -6 , $-9,-10,-11$ and -13 . These reghiar mectinss are all prearranced and are held at various aites and at various times of the day so that meetines correspond vith the regular habits and movements of the basehousekeepers and LILNTRAP operators.
5. All assets involved in the LIEMPIY project performed in a most satisfactory manner during the period under review. LIPFJD-4 has been extremoly efficient in developing and printing negatives provided by the other assets.

## PRODUCTION AND ACTIVITTES

6. LICALLA, Durins thio perlod LIEMTY -9, operator of the LICALLA vasehouse, provided 1,239 franea of oporational photomphs covering the patio and garden of the FUSTUL installation, the area where many of the officers, fandy members and visitors concregate. This coverace is especially valuable because the officers are usually at their lelsure and often gather into nuactional erouplnes. LIEAPTY-9 10 very observant and his comaents and notos are considered of great value to the Station. All photos provided by LIEMTTY-9 are accompanied by a fixed-survelllance report.
7. LILYRIC. This basehouse is staffed by LLEPPTY-13, -14, and -27 with LIETPIY-1/t and -27 provialne most of the coverage because of the All -time outside omployment of LIEMPTY-1\%. During this period the LILYRIC basehouse provited 2,716 frmes of operational photocraphs covering the only vehicle and pedestrian entranco into the tareet instalation. All photographs were accompanied by tixel-survellinnce reports on indiviluol menoers of the staff of the target inctaliation. The operntors aro ofton able to frovide the license plate numbers of vehicles used by visitors to the target installaticn, which In many ca:zes help to identify the viaitor.
8. LIMITED. The operator of the LMITED basehouse is LIEMPRY-6. The LnImed bacohouse also provides coverage of the only vehtele and pedestrian ertrance to the FJSTEAL installation, but from a different ansle, and the comants made relative to coveraze in the section on LILMIC also pertain to LIMTED. The LINTED bnsehouse provided 557 franes of operationi photorraphs durine this period. LIMITED alco seryes as the radio alert for the LIEMARACE surveillance team, although the practice of using a radio alert is beine decreased. On two occasions durine this perion LIEdiTY-c was elertins for the teem in a deception exercise, since the team was not yorking the FJSTeAL tiarget. Tals was done on instructions from the Station and LIEvery-6 was not told that these were deception exercises.
9. LIEmPRAP. Purins this period ns in the last reportins period, the LIEmRAP mobila gurvoillance unft was targettod mainly against the local Cormunist parties as well as members of other Heriswhere parties who are livin or are in exile in vexico. the hintrap opernters are insery-10 and LIEMPTY-11 and durins this period they produce? 564 Sranes of cperational photorrawhs. LIPMPY-10 and LIerPTY-11 also service over 20 postal boxes wheh are used es accomation adaresses by the Mexico City Station, Headgursers and other field stations.
10. Raymond H. GSpinde, Aside from his regular duties as the Frincipal Agent for the LIEMPY Project, GFlame also provided valuable assistence in the furtherance of objectives involved in the JROD operation, in this regand, Thoms $G$. URUULART, Headuarters officer, held approximately seven operational meetings with GEIEDD durins this reportins period.


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11. LTMMTY-10 and -11 were arronded sosimit interview on 8 December 1966. Finer very no outotanding probleas inateated in the results of the interriew of LIEMPTY-1i. The results oi Linspri - $10^{\circ}$ © interview vere discussed in Reforeas B.
12. A general security review of che hibyery Project wes formanded in Soference b
13. There vere no knom security probless or ineidents during this period witct may have jeopardized the operition or the assete involved in the Project. FSFEAL interest in LIEMFTY-G/hnUTED was discussed in Reference D and-appareathis is a contimuing matter.

PLANS
14. Daring the coming period no slignificant operstional or aministrative changes are planned, aince the Project is producing in a timely and antisfactory canner.


## Action Required: For Your Information

1. In Decemter 1966 Raymand $\mathrm{H}_{4}$ OERENDE, Principal Agent for the LIEMPTY Project, was asked to prepare a security reauma, including his opinions, on the serurity of the LILVBIC, LDMTKED and LICALAA Basehouses vis-a-vis Soviet knowledge of their existence. The following paragraphs contain a aligitiy edited varsion of abrbine' report, which was rocelved an 28 Decembr 1966. Station ccenents folloy GEREME's and are so noted.

## LILYRIC

2. In its present new location LILYRIC is the nevest of the photo beses under wy contral. According to LIEMPTY-13, there has been no indicstion of interest of any oort by the Coviets in the fanily's move to the noy apartment nor was there in the past any show of interest or pecular behavior on their (Soriet's) part with regard to the old base and tho possibillty that they wifght be under photo survelllanct.
3. The cover for the work carried on by thio basa is good since the wife, LIEMPTY-14, wo does wost of the tork has no trouble in Justifying her presence at home all of the time. The son, LIEMPTY-27 is a medieal student and attends his classes regularly and can justify his hours as study hours. (He contimes to be an excellemt student and was exerapted from oxaminations at the end of thia, his second year in medical schoci. Actually, he studies most oi the night). LIEMPTY-13 requires no cover as he has a iull-tine job as production manager for a large concern ard he usually wakes his meetings with GERLDDE on his way to or frum vork.

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4. The set-up in tha old as vall as the nev bege is the folloring The equipment - camern, scope and tripol - Ls mounted in one bedroom behind venetian blinds with one slat removed. This room 18 locked to keep servants or eny chance intruder froi entering. The operators do not spend all thelr tae behind the camera, but bo to the adjoinins bedroom where able and typewnter are set up and where the dally loge are transeribed, knitting done, or sone uther activity that doed not require. full concentmition is carried out. The curtaina and blinds in this room are kept partially or fully open to allow govd viadbility and provide nomal appearnince. Most of the dally novereont of the soviet personnel is followed from this roon and when it is necessary to take pictures of vieitors, unknown persóns or nouly arrived Soviets, the operators go to the other room and use the preset equipment.
-5. OERENDE's Comant. It seems to me that any careful obaervation by the Sovieta would have revealed the tell-tale position of the venetian blinds In both the old and the now bases. I have no doubt that the Soviets realize they are under photo surveillance. The move by the fanily from the old to the new building must surely heve been noted by the Soviets. Possibly the Soviets think the family is working with the local authorities due to LIMMPMY-13's former association with the Moxican Axmy.
5. Station Coments. The Station agrees with obravis that careful observation by the Soviets yould have revealed the uissing slet the venetian blinds and also the fact that these blime are soldon open. The Station also Esrees that the Soviets realize that they are under pheto survelllance. This was polnted out recontly when a Soviet shielded an LNEigo walk-in when they passed the front gate of the Bubnsoy and made a sifn to the walk-in indicating that they could be seen by someone watching with a telescope troa the bulldings across the street. Alco, as Heedquarters is avare, there have been numerous comments by residents of Mexico City to the effect that anyone enterin; the Soviet Dmbncay is photographed; however; seldom has it been rumored that the "Anericans" are dolng it, which misht indicate acst people bolieve the Mexican $O$ overment is doine any such photompaphing and thereby reatfirming Gependis statomont that the Soviets possibly believe the Mexican Govermment runs the base.
6. Gfven the assumption that the LILYIC base is blown, the station at this point doen not plan to terminate or revamp the LILMmic installation. Ans operational change by the operators would be spotted by the Sovietr and $1 f^{\circ}$ the Bnse were closed the Soviets would start lookins for a new installation. The HILYRIC Base is performins a useful function and it is believed that it will continue to do so. The Soviets nave had opportunities to complain to the Mexican Govermuent about boing monitored photogmanically and bave not seen ift to do so and it 18 belleved that they probably fill not do so unlesa there is a radical change in joviet and/or Mexican policy. The Station has instructed GELUNDE to take overy precaution during his meetings with LIFMY[Y-13 to assure that LIEMPTY-13 does not lead the Soviets to him and thereby jeoparuizins other operations, eapecially LICALLA.

LIMITED
8. The operator of the LIMITED Base, ITEMPIY-6, is, to kyowledge, tha oldest hand in the photo aurvelliance of the soviet target ard possibly the sost likely to be "burned". His residence for years at the former Base (now the site of the new LILMRIC building) and his move to the present base could not have gone unnoticed by the Soviets. His corgr is that of an insurance salesman, but he actually does not work at the cover and is at a disadvantage in trying to explain his source of incone. At times, in years past; he had to afford full-time coverage from the base, wich allored him ne time to encage in credible cover activities.
9. OERENDE Coments. I do not belleve that LIEMPTY-6/LMMTMED is a security risk; howsver, his present means of working trom an open door leading to his balcony probably can be opotted by the Soviets. LIEPPIY-6 is extrenely cautious about checking himself for survelllance when making meetings.

10. Station Commenta. The sama fintion comerits nindo in refererce to

 tase, In reparl to LDMTTFD, LICOwLl has reported thint tho Sovets are very intorestod in LIMADTY-6/LINITED and thnt co many Sovioto hnve talked to him (LICCWL-1) about LIEMFTH-6 that he 10 convinced that the :oviets have a "fear" and an "obsemoion" about LIFMITY-6. LICCHL-1 reported on " January 1967 trat the subjoct of 201-74h341 and the Subjoct of 201-7;6163 naked hia on 19 Dacember 1966 for full detnila known to him about Lif $14 \mathrm{TY}-6$ and Subject of 201-756163 went so far as to say that he belleves that LILNMTY-6 is "watching the Soviets".

## LICALLA

11. When the Sovete mased the helftt of the wall in their backyand about two years ago, they coild have blocked completoly the view of this base"s working windoi by makine the wall a fou inches hipher. Since thoy did not do this, it would aeem to indicate that they aro not awcre that their activitiea are beine monitored from this point. on the other hand, in recent monthe LIEMFTY-9, the operstor, has reported that activitios in the back yard heve been curtailed more and more. Por example, the women no longer

- consregate there dally, the school children enter their clabses by a route not visible to LIFMPPY-9 arm the trees and shrubs havo not been trimmed in yeers, making LILMPTX-9's viou poor in toct directions. LIHMPIY-9 gays that he has never noticed any undue interest in his house or hia activities by the Soviets. Accesa to the operating rocos can be soon from the window which? : 1, , LIEMPIM-9 bellevea to be the commo roon in the target inatallation.

12. The cover for this base is that of a normal residence. I.IEMMY-9's cover work io that of a car and insurerices salesman in a local automobile egency in the afternoon only. LIEMITY-9 does work in his cover. LIEMPMY-9's cover for the use of the operating roon is that he does accounting work for client firms. The door is kept locked at all times and LILMMTY-9 never allows the egryant to onter, even for cleanins purposes. The oquipnent is kept locked in a trunk within the roon shen not in uce and ail loga and photos are kept in a safe located in LIENTTY-9's bedroom closet.
13. GRRENDE Comment. I belleve the Soviete are aware of the photo surveillance being carried out by this base due to the pouition of the window and the curtains during the hours when LIEAPTY-9 is oporating.
14. Station Comment. The Station does not belleve that this photo base 13 known to the Sovietis. This belief is kered on the finct that the LICALLA coverase is excellent and there has been no indication that the Soviets act for tho benefit of obaervers while they are in the backyard. It is interesting to note that the Soviets made no effort to "protect" the LNERCO walk-in mentioned in paragraph 6 .above during a visit to the backyard and LICALJA dis obtain photographs of the walk-1n. The echool childiren ro lonper pass through the backyard because the location of the school was recently chanjed and the children now go by another route. The Station has instructed OblllNDE to tate every prom caution in order to protect the security of the LICALLA babe.
15. As a genemil comment pertainine to the security of the bases involved in Projoct LIEMPIY, it should be noted that the Soviets are amare of the fact that LIMOUSINE is the owner/builder of the now LILYAIC building. LIMCUSINE is also the owner of the LIMESA complex. through a holding company.
16. The Station realizes that most of the details reported in this dispatch are known to Headquarters; however, the Station wanted to make the opinions of the Principal Agent and the Station a mattor of record in a consolldated form.

## 2. AOFNE COMANTCATTONS, CONTACT AND PERHMANCE

Durlm the period under review, Ravmond $H$. GRREND was seen $2 \therefore$ times in rogular operational meatings by the LIMgTY Project case officer. Mo baste chanzes other than the regular proplanned variation in weetins sites and times were made in the Project comminication channels. The upodsted and revisod emergency coumpication syster for contact with arRbND (see HMMA-28335, dated 21 Pebruary 1966) reasins in effect. All reaular contact with the active LIEMPTY afonts (LIEarTs $-4,-6,-9,-10,-11,-15,-14$, and $-20^{\circ}$ ) was maintained via Raymond H . OBHENDE, CERENDE met each of the above cited agents, with the excertion of LIEMPTYs -14 , and -26 , two times anch week in clandestine meetings. The operational performance of all active LIEMPTY agents, including OERENDS was most satisfactory. The ferformance of LIMPTY-4 in emsisting the local wacre section yith its photosraphte processing was outstanding.

## 3.- ACCOMPLISHMENTS, PROORESS AND ACHI EVENEMTS

A. SUMMARY - Throughout the reporting period, the LIBMPYY Praject continued to provide the vast majority of the operational photorraphs and survellance reports used by the Station in its planning and operations acsinst the LDEERICK installation and personnol. The LIEMPTY coverage has proved to be a particularly reliable tool for: following the daily coaines and goings of the LIMERICK personnel: providing loeds to and confirming the identifications of new LIMERICK staffers and also visitors to the LDERICK installation; providing leads to the relative rank and the specifte intelligence service affiliation of varicus LIMSRICK officerrs; keeping the Station abreast of construction and physicel changes in the LIMEAICK physical plant; and providing a rellable check on various station and LNERCO access asents. nurins the quarter under review, Protect LIPMPTY besehouses provided 5,003 frames of operational photographs ( 109 rolls) as well an 1,290 paces of fixed survelliance reports covering the movemente of the LiMEPICX staffers.
B. LIENIRAP - Throughout this period, the LIEMTRAP aobile unit was again targetted henvily against leaders and meeting sites of the locel Comanist parties as well as other targets of opportunfty, particularly haitian, Chatemalan and Honduran Comuntst exile leaders now resident in Hexico. LIENTRAP provided up-dated and/or new Identification photogrepas which ere of walue to both the JigiagR and the Station recruitment/penatration program. This apparat provided a total of 237 operational photosraphs, while the personnel attached to this LTBNTRAP unit regularly servicod 23 postal accomodation addresses used by sexico City Station, Beadquarters and other fleld Stations.
C. LIMITED - During this quarter, the LDCIEED basehouse provided 724 frases of oparational film as well as daily physical surveillance reports covering the arrival and departure of all hmericx personnel and viaitors at the front gate of that installation during the evening and week-end hours. In addition, LIEMPYY-6, the LMMTED bssobousedeeper, working from his excallant visual vantage point, dispestched the LIEMBLACE surveillance traar via radio on eeveral LImarice surveillance operations.
D. LILHAIC - During thia reporting period, the LILYRIC basohouse provided 2,859 fremes of operational photographs covering the mame area and targets noted in the LIMITED section ebove, out during the morning and afternocn hours. In october the LILYRIC personnel (LIEMPTY $-15,-14,-26$ and -27) succesonnly coapleted the move into the new LIMOUSINS building. while sowe photographic coverage was lost during the wove, LILYRIC coverace at present is back to norwal (see also paragraph 4 of Reference A.).
E. LICALLA - Throughout this period, the LICALLA basehouse provided both physical observation and photokraphte soverege of the sarien and patio of the LIMERICK installation, an area whers many of the offieers, their fanilios and visitors congregate. In providing this coverage LICALLA produced 1,183 individual photographs (of which 80 vere color prints used in the Station's "ang book") ae well as regular dally reports on the sullent activities in this area.

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1. Identification of the above captioned license tag was made by JMwAVE security. They have furnished the following information.
2. The license tag is registered to Lewis Wolshin, born 1908; is residing at 684 SE 9 th Avenue, Hialcah, Florida. The tag was issued on a 1964 Ford. Wolshin's wife is Olga A. Wolshin; he has been employed as Pool Manager or Assistant Park Manager by Dade County, Hlorida, since 1953. A credit check was conducted in Wolshin's name, and a October 1964 report indicated biographic data as ilsted above. He had been known to the credit bureau since 1951, had satisfactory credit, and no derogatory information was avallable. Police checks in Miami, Florida, indicated the following arrest record:

## 2. AOENL COMUNICATIOHS AJD COHTACF

During the periot under review OFREDDR wa seen 35 efmes in regular operational meetings by the underodunet, and on 2 occesions by the local
 and ORADNE were attendad by the LIEMPIY Project Cems Officer and dealt wth the installation of new PAKO print dryer in the LIEMPIY photo laboratory. In addition, GERPNDE met iour times, for extended perioda, With LCFLUMGER examiner Daniel R. Hogrcibl when he servel as the intorm preter for the LCFLUTTER xaminations afforded LIEAPTIs, $-6,-2,-14,-13$, -26 , and -27 . No bade departures, other than the regular preplanned chenges in meating sites and timeg, were made in the rezular and alternate commundcations channols to GERLIDE. It ghould be notat that an up-dated and revised emergency commaication systen for cortact with OERENDE was fomarded to Headquartera as HMMA-20333, dated 21 February 1966. Thia plan includes both verbal and phyaical bona $11 d e s$ and supereades provious arrangementa.

## 3. ACCOMPLISHMMNS. PROOR:23. ACHIFYFMPIEO

a) SUMMAFY - Throurhoit tho reportins pertod, Project LIEMPTY contiruou to provide the vast majority of the oparational photorraphs and phyaicai suryelllance reports used in Hexico City 3tation'a operationa against the CIMENTCK installation arr persomal. The EIFMPTY corereee has proved to be a mont rellable tool for: following the dally movementa of LIMERICK personnel; providing leada to, and conifmine the identities of LIMERTCK ataffers and their viaitora; verifyine or providinz leads to the relative rank and specific inteliigence service connection of vaxious LMMERICK officers; keoping the station abreast of construction changes in the LIMERICK physical plant providing a check on reports of station and ODTNY access acents. During the three month period under review, project LIBMPI's basehouses rrovided 3,967 Prames of operational photorraphs (146 rolla) as well as 650 pagee of fixed surveiliance reporte covering this target.
b) LIENTTAP - Throsghout this feriod, the LIENTMAP zobile unit was targetted againgt leaders and meeting-aites of the lccal Commiat partiea as well as other tarests of opportunity, speciffcally the leaders of the strike group at the Kational University. LIEMTRA provided up-to-date photographs of sumerous Commist offlcials, which are of value to both the JMTIGER program and the Station' a recruitment/panetration program. This unit provided 330 operetional photographs, wile the personnel sttached to this unit also regularly serriced 21 postal accomodation addressee used by Maxtco City Station, Headquarters, and other field Stations.
c) LIMTED - During this period, the LIMITED basehouse provided 1,147 frames ( 45 rolls) of operational film and dally observation reports covering the arrivel and departure of IMERICK personnel ard Fisitors at the front gate of that installation durine the afternoon and rush-hours. In gddition, LIPMPTY-6, the LIMITED basehouse keeper, served as the redio dispatcher for severnl LIEMBRACE nurveillance operations.
d) LHiticic = hining this perion, the I,THYMIC basehouse provided 1,660 frames ( 56 rolls) of operational photorraphs, coverins tha ama area ant targets noted in the IJIMITED section, but durins the coominz and early afternoon hours. In addition, the LILMuC personnel prepared a detalled report on the daily comings and foinga of nach LDMCRICK ataffer and contributed the majority of this Project's physical curvelliance reports.
-) LICALLA - Throughout this period, the RICALLA basehouse provided photographic coverage of the garden and patio area of the LIMMRICK installation, an area where many of the officers, their farallies and visitors congregate. In providing this coverage, cicala produced 1160 individual photographs as well as regular, dally reports on the salient activities in this area.

1) LIBPPYY-4-All the imbrue cited operational rill (160 rolls, 4,297 frames) provided by the basehouedes and the LIENTRAP unit was developed and printed by. LIracy 4 at the LITMPTY photo lab. Ae noted in paragraph 2 above a mew ani-automatic PAKO print dryer was recently installed in the photo laboratory. With the installation of this dryer, the Station's modernization of the LIEMFTY photo laboratory has been completed. (See paragraph 5 of hath-27653, dated 17 November for the details of this program.

- Raymond H. aERENDE - During the reporting period, OERENDE nerved as the full-time LIEMPTY $P / A$, operating ae the cutout to the LIMITED, EILYMC, and LICAILA basehouges and bearing the agent handing responsibility for the related personnel as well as handing the operators of the LIEATRAP mobile unit, LIEMPTY-4, and LIEMPTY-19, a Station asset (translator) carried under Project LIFEAT. Oerende's overall assignment involved at least twelve clandestine agent meetings each weak, in addition to his meetings with the LIEMPTY Project case officer. It should be noted that OERENDE also made mmerous and essential contributions to the sensitive AMROD deception operation.

4. SECURTTY

There have been no known incidents which adversely affected the security of Project LIEMPIY. During the period under review, LIEMPTY $-6,-9,-13$, $-14,-26$, and -27 were afforded LCFLUTPER examinations, all with satisfactory results.

## 5. CRAMOHS AND PLANNTMG

As noted in paragraph 5 of reference $A$, Station is in the process of increasing the hours of both the photographic and physical surveillance coverage provided by the LILMRIC operations during the weak-days. At present, the LILYRIC personnel are providing coverage from early morning to late afternoon, while LIMITED is providing veek-end coverage. After the Liflince have moved into the new Limousine building, it is anticipated that they will be able to provide complete dawn to dusk coverage, the Station' ultimate goal.

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2. In answer to paragraph 2a, Oliver G. SCANTLING first contacted Inez PARADA de Moreno in early $195^{\circ}$ to fuifill a KUTUBE/D requirement. He visiced hei as an archifect uterested in viewing the LIMERICX installation from the bullding where she lives. He was sucially acquainted with her brother, a Catholic Priest, and knew the family to be unquestionably anti-Communist. However; it would be imprudent on the Station's and SCANTLING's part to assume that PARADA does not at less: suspect that some ant-LIMERICK intelligence service is involved. PARADA suggested during SCANTLING's initial visit that he couid return at sny time for further observations. This was reported by SCANTLING on 21 March 1957 and it does not seem appropriate to query him again on the pretest for his recent visits.
3. While HMMA-14093 corrently referred to LLMITED, LLLYRIC and LICALLA as "photographtc basehouses," the Station would like to emphasize that photographic coverage is only one of their functions (please see HMMA-12095. 4 February 1959). LIMITED is used as a radio dispatch base for artomobile surveillance teams in addition to physical surveillance of persons entering the front gate. Their photography is acgligible compared to their other dutles. The LILYRIC base performs the best photography of persons visiting the front gate, perhaps because the vantage point for taking the dictures is from the second floor and above the street trattic which partially blocks LIMITED photographs. LIL YRIC also does it:uividual reports on LMMERICK personnel entering and leaving the main gate, LICALLA is used almost exclusively to identify LIMERICK officlals and to support KUTUBE/D requirements in connection with the LIMESA/LLMLST Project. As an indication of the effectiveness of LICALLA photograpaic coverage, the Mcxico Station has all the LIMERICK officials identified. Before this base was activated more than twothirds of the LIMERICK officials were unidentified. In order to support other operations, it is considered essential that the Sation identify all LLMERICK officials. In this respect, LICALLA has provided most of the neeessary information. The retention of this base is also considered vital to the security of the LIMUST portion of the Llimesa Project.
4. The Station does nor agree that the color photography and moving pictures are a luxury. Color slides were made for identification purposes and have proved useful, particularly in identifying facial features and skin coloring. The motion pictures were made at Headquarters sugrestion (Please see HMMW-7687, 29 May 1959 and FLRIN-8438, 26 January 1960).


5. In concluston, the Station would like to point out that the "photographic basehouses" represent an integral and signlficant part of the Station's countercspionage effort against the LIMERICK installation. These bases do not produce Foreign Inteligence and should not be constdered in such a light.

On 13 October 1959 it was learned from source that the losal ODENVY chief got a priority cable from his Headquarters asking why data concorning the Mexican apprehension of the (KUBARK) truck and photographer had not been reported to the U. S. Ambassador lucally. The statement was made that "such nattera as this should be immediately reported to the Ambassador."
2. This cable resulted from the report the ODENVY office sent in on the incident from the knowledge they had-as repiorted in reference.
3. The local ODENVY chief replied to his Headquarters that he did not agree that matters concerning KUBARK operations should be reported by ODENV to the Ambassador.
4. Source stated that the cable was obviously a result of the KUBARK/ ODENVY headquarters "in feeling" which presently exints and which source believes is primarily (and principally) attributable to the article in TRUE mayaring of Sertember 1959.

## 5. Source is LIMEW.

6. It is requested that unier no circumstances should the information contained herein be dissensimatei in any form whatsocver outside KUBARK.

1. At 1110 hrs. . 20 September 1959 , while on an operational asuignment. LIEMPTY-10 and the LIEPTRAP vehacle were temporarily detained by the Servicio Secreto de Mexaco (Mexican Secret Survice). LIEMPTY-10 was huld under unofficial custody for approximately $2 \dot{\text { in hours before his releaso wata obtained. Ther }}$ follows below an account of the more important details pertaining to this incident.
2. LIEMPTY-10 was instructed on 17 September to case the arca surrounding the Theatro Iris, located at Donceles 36 , preliminary to undertaking a photographic surveillance of all persons entering and leaving the theatre betwoun the hours cif 0930 and $1200 \mathrm{hrs} ., 20$ September. In this ingtance, the Station's target was a proCuban rally spunsured by the Circulo de Estudios Mexicanos (CEM). The Station had received infurmation that many of the leading Mexican and Central American Communists sould attend this rally and that this was an opportunc time to establish which ones did attend and w collect their photoyraphe. 'fhe Stition did not know that the Mexican Secret Survice would also be covering this meeting for the purpose of preventmg a Conumumetingipired demonatration.
3. The Station was advised at $1730 \mathrm{hrs}$. , 20 September. by Raymond H. GERENDE (ps), the Principal A; ent who handeg LlemPTY-10, that L-10 was being held by the Secret Service. Immediately followin! this notification, Allen W. WAKE (ps) was requested to contict Philip K. TESSAROLO (pa) and request him to implemedit procedures throuth a criminal lawyer to effect the release of L-10. Te:SSAROLO was contacted and brieferi at 2200 hours and immediately befan atternpts to locate a reliable crmanal lawfer. Llowever, as sometimes happens an anergency situation, his two most appropriate contacts were out of tem. It was not until the following morning at 0700 KzB , that TESSAROLO located another reliable lawyer who agrecd to handle the case.
f. Since CERENDE gas known to L-10 and sunce the Station could not be sure how much $L-10$ might be fored to tell the Secret Survice. GEPENDE was given the followim; instructions:
A. To disconnect immediately the LIFEAT/LIVERY lines in the base where he and has aife nere hiving and to move all equipment to another safe location. It was believec appropriate to take this precaution even though L-10 did not know the location of the LIVERY basc, the telephome number of the base, or even that GERENDE was living at a place other than has mother's residence in another part of the chty.
4. To collect and deposit with his Cabe Officer any compromising papers prueently in his posaession.
C. To make a sucurity inspection of the outside piotopraphic lab at his mother's house.
D. To phon: L-10's wife and inform her that procedures were underway to obtain L-10's release and for her not to become apset and talkative.
E. io suspeni shl operational contacts until L-10 was released and the extent of compromise vas determined.



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L-10's atatement that he dut sume photurraphic work for OUACID. There was no Auwspaper or other publicaty fertaming, to L- 10 or LIENTRAP.
10. During his vigit to Sceret Scrvice lleadquarters WARE digcovered that L- 10 had not been booked or formally charied wath an therai act and that nether LIMON nor MENDIOLEA could recall L-10'r name. L-10 was not placed an jast during; the 26 hours he wat at secret Service lleadquarters but, rather, was permitty to remann an the Secret Service agents' duty roum. No bribes were necessary to obtain has relcase; howerer, per LIMEW's requatat, $\$ 500.00$ presoswere given to LIMEW to give to has source. LIMEW Bail that in addition to notifying him about L-10's detention, the gource was also respongible for all equipment and fim being returned intact to $\mathrm{L}-10$.
11. TESSAROLO yनa advised, as soon as LiMEW became involved in the casq, that the crimmal lawyer should not purbue the matter any further. Hwo bothes of ucotch whakey were given to the hawyer through TLSSAROLO for the fow tasika he had already performed.
12. After hig release, L-10 reported that he was not interrogated and that he did not reveal any data about ether operations he has worked on nor did he give the names of anybody connected with operational activitics. Dased on the developments in the case, the Station hat ao reason to loubt the veracity oi L-10's statement. $L$ 10 was xeprimanded for his ube of statemente to the Secret Service about being employed by ODACID, ide was told that the revelation of such employment wat to be made onfy by the Station and that henceforth he is never to uso such a cover story. L-10 wan aloo reprimanded fur his lack of judgment in remaining in an area where there was a strone concentration of police; it ia beliced yafe to abaume that L- 10 will never maise this same mistakf again.
13. In retrospect, it in interesting to note that $\mathrm{L}-10$ 's use of the ODACDD employment story as possubly responsble for his not bent interrogated and thus compromismeg other operations and individuals. This case has pointed out to the Station the degareability of having casual contactes in the Secret Service and oticer local police-type organizatices so that the Station, rather than ODACID and ODENV y . is the fir at to learn of ancidents of this type. Considering the multifarious activitues havdled by the Station, it must be assumed that the police will occasionally apprehend an agent and that the Station must be geared to handle such emergencies.
14. The Station ib allowing a one month's cooling off poriod for the LiENIRAP vehicie and LIEMPTY-10. The vehiche whl then be painted another atandard color and re-registered in the State of Mesico. After these security precautions are observed, the Station gees no reason why carcfully selected photographic aurveritance operations should not contanue with L-10 as a wiser and more pradent LIENTRAP operator.

It is to: SCANTLING's credit that he has not yet become involved in an incident which the Stat ion feels has compromised hita andor alerted the target of KUBA RK's many bperational efforts against them. The closest S CANTLING has come to being compromised and to being identified as a PJPR IME agent stems directly from the LIPSTICK burvelllance team flap of June 1953. The off ice used by the surveillance team was rented by SCANILLNG in his true name at the time that he was leader of the team. Not the sll ghtest indication, however, has been uncovered which points to SCANTLIN $\$$ as a target of investigation by a local police service. S CANTLING and the Station have been alert and will continue to watch closely for any sign of local police and other opposition int erest in his activities.
4. Operational Succoss and Lffectiveness - B riefly di scussed below are some of the many operationalactities in which SCANTLING partic ipated during the period covered by this repafte illice

 September 1958 follo wing the last faint gitmers of mounting the original LIMESA, MK LIGITIING ope ration th rough CASTRO. As late as September 1958 possibilitics still existed, or appear ed to exist, that CASI RO would complete his wo rk in the primary LIMERICK office and that it mitght be possible to install MKLIGHTING. While CASTRO, through SCANTLING, was the principal source of th is information, portions wer e also confi rmed by LiFEAT. Dur ing July, August and Septembyr 1958, SC ANTLING had approximat ely elgnt meetings with CASTRO. In late Scptember 1958 LIFEAT indicated that the LMMERICK target was using personnel und er the supervision of one of heir egular lo cal cmployees, Antonipe Z EPEDA, (201-239821), to complete some of the work CASTRO was suppose dio tinishrand that other contractors were doing jobs arou nd the ta rget area which CASTRO would normally lave been expected to do had he still been in the employ of the target. Also, LIMIT ED and LIF EAT confir med that the LIMERICK target had lost interest in CASCRO - he was not seen visiting the target in stallation nor did the target people attempt to get in touch with him. In view of this, SCANTLING ${ }^{3}$. was instructed to cease all contact with CAST RO as of 1 November 1953. i....
B. Pabromon rosas (201 $\because / 3$ - During the period covered by this cepori SCANTLING had two intervicws with MON Rosas. SCANTLING's most recent report was forwarded to Headquarters as an at tachment to HMMA-11143, 1 Oct ober 1958. Unumestionably the Station has identified Mon Rosa s as the technician who services LIMERICK safes and locks. SCANTLLNG will continue fis dev elopment of MON Rosa ( please see HMMA-11711, 10 December 1958).
C. Octavio *VIDALES (201-23) - SCANTLING's activities in comection with this LIMESA /MKLICHITNG operation wer e summarized in HMMA-11397, 29 October 1958; and prev ious corres pondence.
D. HERRERIA GABELICH - This is the firm that made the st eel vault door for the LIMERICK installation, SCANTLING made two visit s to this firm's work shop and succeed ed in obtaining enough information to make an

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accurate drawing of the ty pe door installed at LIME RICK. This drawing was forwarded to Headquarters via HMMA -11926, 21 January 1959.
E. Cas ing Report on West German Embassy - During June, July and August 1958, SCANTLLVG prepared a detail ed casing report on the new West German Embas sy, SCANTLING's engineering ablity enables him to prepare accurate drawings and sketches from a minimum of data. Also, his personality and gregar lous mamer permit him to visit the inside of such establishments, with an appropr iat e cover story, and retain minute details which lat er he commits to paper and emerges with a comprehensive floor plan and important canstruction data.
F. 'LIMERICK Consrruction - SCANTLING's long association with th is target from the casing sandpoint provides the Stat ion with an unpar alleled source of in formation abour LIMERICK conscruc tion activ ities, modifications and reasons for same. All of the LIMERICK cas ing reports on file in ieadqua rters are the protuct of $S$ CANTLING's unusual a bil ity and knowle dge. Consultat ions with Station Officers about LIME RICK construction have been of benefit to the Stat iondring th is reporting period and they wili continue to be of wor thwhile importance.
G. Routine Investigations and Surve illances - Although the Station has several assets capable of performing investigations and surv cillonces, SCANTLING is still used in situations requiring the utmost in discretion and clandestinity. His activities in th is comection are too numerous to list here; suffice it to state that he has contributed materially to the Stat ion's collection of operational in scrmation through his investigative efforts. SCANTLING's int erview of Paul Frederick Kir schho ff (201-43645) of LCMAYFOWL interest is an example of SCANTLLN G's use on investigations (see HMMA-11749, 17 December 1758).
H. ESGEM-15-SCANTLING served as the cutout with ESGEM-15 during the latter's December 1958 trip to Mexico City, In th is connection SCANTLING is a suppori asset wh ich is trustwo rthy and depenaable. SCANTLING never displays undue curiosity in operations such as the ES GEM-15 one; he accepts the min imum amount of information given and performs his duties in a pronessional and sincere manner.

1. LIEMPTY/3-SCANTLING handles the admuist rative mart ers connected with $L / 3$. Dor is A1. KllLGO provides oper ational direction to $\mathrm{L} / 3$. During this reporting period, the Stat ion had hopes of SCANTLING taking over the ope rational super vision of L/3's.activities. How ever, after a four-month trial per:od with both SCANTLING and KILLCO mieting with L/3, it was dec ided that it wo uld be desirable for KIILGO to continuc handing $L / 3$. L/3's unusual person ality and intel lect indicated that he could best be direcied by a PiBPRIME citizen. Thereforc, SCANTLING no longer attends KLLLGO's and $L / 3^{\prime}$ 's oper ational meetings, although he does continue to handle $L / 3^{\prime}$ 's administrative problems.
J. Raymond H. GEREYDE's Duties - Dur ing GERENDE's absence from



> Mexico City in Dece mber 1958 and Ja nuary 1959, it was con sidered app ropriate for SCANTLING to handle LIMITED, LICALLA and LIE NTRAP. Although this procedure defeats some compartmentation principles, it was the only maner in which the Station could maintain eff ici ency wiun the three operations listed above. SCANTLING has known the agents involved with LIMIED, LICALLA and LIENTRAP for several y cars. In fact, he was at one time the agent in cha rge of these three operations.
5. Operational Methods Evolved During the Period - The VIDALES operation (s ee parag raph 4 (C) above) tidicated to the Stat ion the necess ity for thorough brief ings and discussions with the agent making an approach to a targer. Th is can hardly be described as a new operational method, but it does serve to illustrate the minimum ef forts that should be followed. The forthcoming LINIMENT IV operation whe rein SCANTLING must recru it the landlord of the ta rget's building is of fer ing SCANTLLN G and the Stat ion the opportunity to prepare thoroughly for SCANTLING's recruit ment pitch. The excellent documentation prepared by KURIOT and the story being created by SCANTLING and the Station should increase the batt ing average on SCANTLIN G's cold approaches. (See HMMA-11365, 22 October 1958, and KMMW-7038, 21 November 1958, for additional details on th is Subject).

In a general sense, one other conclusion can be made about a ny Station's support apparatus - where technical and photogr aphic operations are poss ible, the utuity of the in formation obtained is enlanced consider ably by accurate, comprchensive and timely casing reporis. SCANILING, as previously mentioned, is an excellent asset for this type of support.
6. Administration - S CANTLING's contract exples on 15 February 1959. As of that date SCANTLING will have received an anmual salary of $\$ 3,600.00 \mathrm{U}$. S. for $t$ wo years. The Stat ion plans to raise his anmal compens ation to $\$ 4,000.00$ U.S. No other sgenificant a dministrative problems exist.
7. Outlook for Future Development - Station plans call for the continued ut dization of SCANTLING in the same maner as he is presently being used. The Station will keep SCANTLING as an independent asset and, it is hoped, resist the tomptation to make him a principal agent in charge of numerous sub-agents. It is belie ved that SCANTLING is the type of support asset that can be worthwh ile to the Station ior many years to come and that every cffor: should be made to protect his security and value to KUBARK.

## ACCOUNT OF DEVELOPMENTS - RAYMOND H. GERENDE SEGMENT

8. Agent intormation - Aside from the agent inf ormation given in HMMA-11368 22 October 195S, tie only si gnific ant development was GERENDE's December 1958 marriage to a U. S. educated girl of Dutch citizenship. The $\$ 300,00 \mathrm{U}$. S. for the purchase of two plane sickets as a wedd ing gift to GERENDE was designed to impress GERENDE with the fact that KUBARK thinks highly of him as an individual and that KUBARK has a great interest in his intelligence caree $r$. GERENDE is at the age and stage in life whe re he is beginning to wonder just what the future holds for him. In the near future, the Station will propose a salary raise for CERENDE

and request a new contract that provides for some type of $r$ eti rement benefit s.perhaps similar to the Civil Service Retirement progia on for KUBARK employees.
9. Security Developments - Again, the Information on this subject was covered adequately in HMMA-II365. GERENDE was relieved of his LIFEAT/BGMORNING and LIF EAT/ Cuban Exiles duties on 10 December 1958. This, of course, was in line with recommendations contained in HMMA-11308 and represents a definite security improvement. GERENDE wis told that LIFLAT/BGMORNLNG wa s being terminated because it had not been productive of enough significant information and that LIFEAT/Cuban Exiles was being terminated because the occupants of the target apartment had moved (Note: This was true where the Cubans are concerned.) Additional secur ity improvements will be made when Simon D. CLACKETT returns to Mexico and relieves GERENDE of respons ibility for the LIJERSE $Y$ sur veillance team.
10. Operational Success and Effectiveness - Bricfly reviewed below are the separate oper ationalactivit ies which GERENDE manage d during the period covered by this report:
A. LIMITED - This base functioned smoothly, securely and effic iently dur ing the period July through December 1958. The base oper ator, LIEMPT Y/ $\%$ demonstrated his usual comperence and devotion to duty. in addition to the primary objective of taking photographs of individuals of interest, $L / 6$ also prepared detailed daily logs on the arrivals and departures of all target per sonnel, weckly reports of workers activities at the LIME RICK instal lat ion, per formed three one -man surve illances of Mexicans working at LIMERICK in an effort to identify them by name and home addr ess, and provided SCANTLING with information on LIMERICK construction. Dur ing th is six-month period, LIEMPTY/6 took approx imately 800 photogr aphs from the LIMITED base.
B. LILYRIC - This base is operated by LIFMPTYs / 13 and 14, with LIEMPT 12 ser ving as a cutout between the base and GERENDE. LIE MPTY/14 does most of the photogra phy and reporting to $r$ the base since LIEMPTY/13 has a regu lar job and is not on the premises during regular daytime wor king hours, L/14 dev otes approximately six hours (0800-1 400) each day to photograplyy and the remaining time is spent preparing reports. The Base person nel compile individual logs on each target personality in dicating their arrivals and depa rtures from the LIME RICK installat ion (Note: These reports are filed in the app ropriate Station 201 file and are available to Stat ion of ficers in analyzing a target personality 's pattern of daily activity'. LILYRIC also prepared a weekly report on workers activit ies at the club and reports the lic ense plate numbers of all vehicles disciarging or picking up in dividuals at LIMERICK. (Note: These license plate mumbers are then checked our rhrough IIV ES TOCK/2 for the owne re names and add resses - in case of im mediate or lat er operational interest.) During GERENDE's recent absence from Mexico City, OUSLER met directly with LIEMPTY/12. Dur ing th is period approximatel $\mathbf{y} 2,000$ photograp hs were taken from the LILYRIC base.
C. LICALLA - While Lllyri C and Limited are excellent bases for piotographing individuals entering and leaving the LIME RICK instal lat ion, the LICALLA base is the Stat ion's best source of photographs of LIMERICK


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employees. LICALLA is so situated that photographs can be made of targes per sonnel in the garden ared of LIME RICK. LIEMPTY/9 is the base operator for LICALLA and in the Station's opinion performs his job in an outstanding maner. As reported in IIMMA-11368, LIEMPTY/ $\mathcal{\text { i }}$ is the brother of former LIPSTICK/47 (the first LIPS IICK surveillance team member arrested in June 1958). No repercuss ions, or indications of any impending ones, have resulted in this family relationship. This, certainiy, is the major security problem faced by L/9 during this reporting period. L/9 and his fa mily soon will have to vacate ihe LICALLA base for the period of time required to remotel it. The Station is quite sure that $L / 9$ docs not know that his covert employer owns the LICALLA base and the three adjohing houses and every effort is being made to preserve this secret from L/9. (Sce HMMA-12032, 28 Ja nuary 1959, for a more detailed explanation.) Of course, duting the remodeling of LICALLA there will not be any LICALLA reporting or photographs. In adition to taking appro ximat ely 2,500 photographs dur ing th is six-month period, the LICALLA base also prepar ed we ckly reports on LMERICK garden activ ities. These reports findicate which LIMERICK employens are seen together each day, which vehitcles different employees are accustonied to using, construction activithes and other matters which appear of significance to $\mathrm{t} / 9$.
D. LIENTRAP - LIENTRAP continues to be a worthwhite St ation asset. Approximately 1,400 clandestine photographs have been made of numerous targets during this reporting period and LIENTRAP type activities will undoubrad. remain one of the Station's best investigative asseas. As explained in the Fiold Pro ject Outl ine, forwardet to Headquarters on 8 October 1958, the Star toat is of the opinton that the LIENTRAP vehtcle should be replaced as soon as possible. Nearly four months have elapsed without receiving fleadquarters authority to replace the vehicle. The security situation is even more acute now than at the time of the request. LIEMPTYs 10 and 11 do an excelleat job on LIENTRAP ope rations.
E. LIJERSEY - This operation can be characterized as somewhat dormant for the July - December 1953 period. Because of GERENDE's other imporzant activities, he did not have the time to train and work with. the surveillance team, Also, the Station consider ed chat it would be stretching secur ity just a bit too far to have GERENDE engaged in surveillance at the same time that he was handing the photogra phic base houses and verforming monituring chores for LIFEAT/ BGMORNING and LIF EAT/ Cu ban Exiles. The expected arrival of Simon D. CLACKETT in Ap ril and his relieving GERENDE of LIJERSE Y will eabhe the Station to than, withina year, an ef fic ient mob ile surveill ance team. At pre sent, LIEMPTYs/15, 16 and 17 compose the LSERSEY team.

## F, LIF EAT - Untill 10 December 1958 GERENDE served as monitor

 in the basc house containin LIF EAT/ BG MORNLNG and LIFEAT/Cuban Extles. In addition to living in the base house, GERENDE also transcribed the majority of the BGMORNING and Cuban Exile tapes. He performed these jobs satisfactorily evea tiough his cfficiency was handicapped by numerous other duries. 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G. LIEMPTYs/4 and 5-LIEMPTY/4 docs a truly professional Job of dey eloping and printing the base bouse photographs. No significant developments occurred in relay ion to L/4 except that OUSL ER met directly with him durlig the December 1958 period that GERENDE was away from Mexico City. LIEMPTY/5, L/4's wife, continued doing routine translations in a very competent manner.
11. Administration - Other than the fact that LIJERS EY and the above mentioned portions of the LIPS CICK projects we re combined into this new project, LILMPIY, "there is nothing of significance to report to Ilea dquarters.
12. Outlook for Future Development - Although not meaning to be repetitive by discuss my again those recommendations made above, a summary of the Stat ion "s outlook on the future of the LIEMPTY GERENDE Segment is believed to be appropriate, With the arrival of CLACKETT in April, GERENDE will be free to devote full time to photographic base house operations. GERENDE can do a lot to professionalize these operations by preparing written communications procedures, by thoroughly debriefing base fou se operators on their methods of operation, by preparing detailed security reviews on each base and by supervising the trial of new photographic te cliques. GERENDE will continue to be used on occas tonal sensitive in vestigations to rent operational hotel rooms and to perform other services for the Station which will not impair the secur ty of his primary responsibilities. It is planned that CLACKE'I'I will put some lifo into the LIJERSEX surveil ane tarn and that the Station will soon have another first rate investigative group to support other Station operations.

## MEMOHANDUM FOR: CHH

SUEJECT , Development of Physical Survelllance Assets in Mexico

PEFEREMCE : WH/FI Memorandum of 14 October 1958

1. The gubject of the recrultment of physical suryedilance team in the United States for use in liexico as well as other areas within whis has lone been a topic of dizeussion at Headquarters. While it is palpably ridiculous to consider the use of surveillance team recruited and erained in the United States and based in Mexico, operationally in other areas in Latin America, there 18 some merlt, at least in theory, to the proposal in 2m of reference. Although one of the basic factors in the makemp of any surveillance team is that its meriber's must be indigenous to the area of operation, it would be possible to recruit such a team as surgested in $2 a$ and use this team in Hexico. However, I belleve this would be timeconsuming and very expensive for the following reasons:
a. Machine runs have already been made to spot andidates within the Agency of the Hexican/American type for the LIMESA/iIMUST project. with negative resulta.
b. In ordet to make it attractive to young men of the caliber dealred, we would have to offer some kind of career with a starting aslary of somewhere batween the GS 7 and $O S 9$ level. plus travel and allowances. Without attemptine to even estimate this cost ono can see that, the ligures for a team of iffteen would run into six digits.
c. It would take a minimu of three months $10{ }^{\text {a }}$ a recruitor to move into tha soutbwest aren and spot, contact, develop and recruit a team of ripteen.
d. Once a team of suitable candiciates was recruited it would then teke a minjmum of another three months to train these candidates in basie trade craft and survelilance techniques.

- Upon complation of the training period, the candidates would have to mo noved individually into the area of operstion to becme familiar with this area, tho language, peoplo, and atmosphere in general. ete. This would take another three monthe minimum.

1. After completion of the area familiarization periad, the tean would have to be assenbled and put through various survaillance axercises as a unit to check them out prior to actual operationat
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g. There would be other problems confronting such a team from a security standpoint, such as cover, credentials, which would always pose a threat to the operation.
2. To sum up, it would appear that the proposal in 2 a of reference is not ceasible because of the tine and expenise involved plus the always latent security hazard.
3. I agree with paragraph $2 b$ of reference. Not only ehould the personnel of the surveillance team se recruited at the atation, but as outinned in paragraph 3 it should be relatively easy to find suitable candidates. For example it is proposed under the sen LIEMPTY project (this consists of the remainder of the non-blown LIFSTing and the LIJERSEYs) to recruit a physical surveillance team. Two of the station's outstanding indigenous agents, Scantline and Gerende, are anter this project and both are capable of spotting, developing, and recruiting agents.
4. I agree with paragraph $3 b$, $a$, and $d$, and believe that Headquarters should make avery offort to find an exertenced end competent case ofricer to 1111 Clower's slot as the outside survelilance case officer.

## MEYORARDUM FOR: CNH

SUBJBCTs
Developant of Physical Survoillance Assats in Hexico

1. On 8 October 1558 a meeting of reprenentatives of SR Dipision and CI Stalf was held, attended by the undersigned, to discuas means for building up physical surveillance assets in Moxico. The SR and CI reprom sentatives pointod out that their currant and projected work on boworinn and their cases requires a considerable strengthening of physical surveil. lance assets, and it was the consensus that these assots would be used far into the future on Soviet targets. It was fur ther agreed that since the LIPSTICK operation has oncountered difficulties this year, new assete should be sought.
2. Various approaches to the problem were diacussed, the most viable of which were as follows:
a, Rocruiting of teams or basic elements for toams in the Hoxican colonies of the southwestern $U_{0} S$.
b. Diapatch of a nes case officer to Hexico with tho sole and specifle duty of developing and running the new teams.
c. A combination of $a$ and $b$.
3. Initially, it is bellevad the dispatch of a ney case offlcer to Mexico would be tho most succesoful and give the best fumediate results, for the following reasons:
a. Headquarters and Station records contain the names of aunerous cleared contacts or contacts who could be cleaved and through whom introductions could be made io parsons suitable for survaillance work. Hitherto thase hava not been fuily exploited owing to the heavy rorkload on Station personnel and the unimpaired functionizg till recently of the LIPSTICK group. Some of these contacts were felt out as recruiters and spottors in years past but the matter was never pushed sinces the need was not so groat as now.
b. A new case officer is needed because the present Station ataff is still too busy to devote the amount of time negded to build cavefully and train thoroughly the new assets.
c. The now assets will require the full time direction and coordination of a case officer who has no other respongibilities. In this connection, it would be advisable to try to select, train and utilize at least twelve rew agents as soon as possible.
d. In briefs a replacement of the farmer physical surveillance leader is indicated, but a more mature and competent case officer 1 is noeded.
4. Plan a, rejrutment in the $U_{0} S_{0,}$ should not bo dissaissed frob consideration, It would take longer, than the other plan but might be beneflcial in enabling the new agants to be trained in the U. $S$. Thoy would then have to spend time getting into Mexico and faniliarize themselves with operations and operational clinate there. This plan, however, presente a problem as to who is to do the recruiting and training in the $U_{0} S_{\text {. }}$. SR Difieion has offered to be of whatever assistance they can, but there is no indication they could do any better at this than wiD.
5. It may be of interest to you to know that the SR representatdves said the beat work done anywhere in the world on the BOMORNLN case, which bas wide taternational ramifications, wss done by Likarak-2 in kexico.

1. On 16 December 1955 the daily check of property which tins Station may desire to use for operational purposes(LiCNOL runt showed that a house adjacent to the LMEALCA target installation mas vacant. LIPSTICK -19 was contacted immediately to investigate the property. He reported that It was a one-story house(duplex) in very poor conidia won dolich was being repaired by the owner for rental. He further reported that from the maid's room on the roof a clear view of the entire LICEICK compound was possible and, if he had understood the LIMFRICK lasuisje, he would have bon able to understand several conversations which sere golds on between LIMEIICK of ulcers in the game area of the compound. LIFSTICK-19 also rem ported that from the roof of this house it was a distance of only approx istately Arty foot to the LMmuck building across init roofs with no obstructing partitions except for a small wall and several strands of barbed wire, all totalling about four or five feet high between the last root and the LIMERICK building.
2. Based upon this favorable report, reference a was sent immediately to Headquarters requesting authorization to rent the house. Two days later reference $B$ was received granting approval to rent the house. Consequently, LIFSTICK-2l (the only cleared married man available th the Station, with the exception of LIBalTY, wo would fit into the area) was approached and requested to rent the house. This fused a considerable problem to LIPSTICX-21, since the house has only two cedroomis and he already had two chiliren, and at that very time his wife was in the hospital givings birth to a third child. Further, he had a very: comfortable house (a duplex witch ne shared with ais brother-in-lay at a pre-devaluation rent) which he would never be able to again acquire after this operation was terminated. He did, however, agree to take the ko use and it was


apparent to all concerred that his decision was based upon loyalty to this Station and dedlcation to the fight quainst Comunism. It is hoped that this unselfian and dovoted act of LIPSTICK-21's will be maje a matter of permanent record.
3. The reason for Lipiutck-21 to move fron very comfortable quarters at leas rent into cramped guarters at a higher rental needed some explanation for ils frienda asd relatives. There is a very fine privaie school approximately one block from this house which LIPSTICK-21 had of ten mentioned as the best in tire city for his children, and consequentiy be told everyone that the reason for moving was to be as close as possible to this school so that his cniliren could attend. It should be noted in this respect that, in reality, LIPSTICK-2l had been sending his chiliren to one of the best public schools in Mexico Eity at no cost. Unier the present circumstances, he will have to pay tuition at the private school because It is the only docent achool in the area and it provides excellent cover for his residence in the area. It is requested that Headquarters authorizo this Station tc assist PIPSTICK-21 in the paymant of his chiliren's tuition for the above stated reasone. Approximate cost of the tuition wuil be $\$ 20.00$ U.S. per child per month, or a total for LTPSTRCK-21 of 120.00 US per month. Authorization is requested to assist Lipisichex-2l by payent of $\$ 30.00$ U.S. per nonth.
L. The house is ore of andies of one-story houses that extend from the LIfEitCK building to four-story apartment building on the far corner. The fronts of the houses are all diroctly on the sidesaik with the doors opening onto a ono-step stoop. Tre backs of the houses and the walls of the back patios all abut the compound of the LMmerick installation. The rear windows of the house face a patio which ends in a brick wall. This brick wall is not as hivh as the roof of the house, anding about. Rour feet below the lnvel of the roof. There are stairs mich ascend from this patio to the roof where the maid's guarters are situated. About halftay up these stairs one can turn and obtain an unrestricted view of the LIMEHICK compound. However, the madd's room offirs tae best operational possibillites since it provides concealment for the observer and his equipment, plus a more advantageons view. LI'STTCK-2l tolid his maid that she would have to sleep out at a local pension siace he peded her room for inis radlo experiments. This is a plausible story since LIYSTICK-21 is known to be an enthusiastic radio amateur.
4. The maid's rocm has a door that faces across the roors in the direction of the LDMiHICK installation and one window waich faces across the house roof toward the street. A view of the LIMERICK compound is obtained by an observer who is back in the room looking through the partly cpened door. Some better method of observation will be worked out winch will elininate the security hazard of a door partiallj opened at all times of operztion.



5. At present we p.ian to allow LIPSTICK-2l coasiderable time to get settled sezurely into his new quarters becore sidrtiny azy operational offorts. hitor this waiting period is ovor ana we feel that we can securely cumence ope: 'ations, we plan on usins tite base for the following - fforts:
a. A supplementaury photographic base. In wis connection the request for adilitional Exactas and spoting scopes previously made should be expedited. It is anticipated that much operstiont information will be develosad by this photographis work showint the variou associations betwear the people when they are at play in the carapound wich ean never be datermined from the LISTICX-LIMIED coverage.
$\because$ Visitars who seldoa leave the compound do eisase in social acivity within the compound add can be phetograwhei for possible identification ty the AEDIPPinas. Items which are losded into the automobiles for transportation to unknown points my be identified through this coverase. Purther, s:ould LISTICK/LINITED be teminated tor any reason, we would be able to continue sowe coverase from this base.
b. Coservation by LIPSTICK-21 of the buitines and the activities in the compound siil surnish valuable inicmation on the daily living habits of the residents and their guests.
c. The LIISTICK/LIDOMINO base, presently being occupied by IINCHFIN, is about 75 yards away from the LIMEXES target while LTPSTICK; bicalu is only about fifty feet. This base may assist the Headquasters technicians, who periodically use the LIPSIICK/LIDN:INO base, for reasons of proximity and the use of their equipment from a difierent direction. The exact use of tie LIFSTICNiLICALLA base in this respect mast be determined by the beadquarters technicians who are familiar with the equipment used.
