1. Reference is made to our memorandum of 17 July 1961, captioned as above, and also to Heron's letter dated 23 June 1961, addressed to the Director, National Security Agency, with copy to this Agency. Subject: Heron Ferguson MITCHELL, William Marshall MARTIN, MISCELLANEOUS - INFORMATION CONCERNING.

2. The following information supplements the material on Nicolas Georges DAMASCOU aka DAMASKOU aka DAMASKOS aka DAMASCUS, reported in paragraph 4 of our 17 July 1961 memorandum, referenced above.

a. Our representative in Melbourne advised that [redacted] Nicolas Georges DAMASCOU aka DAMASKOU, Greek national born 18 March 1911 at Alexandria, Egypt, arrived in Sydney, Australia, for permanent residence on 24 October 1946, aboard the S. S. SYRATIENAYER, traveling on Greek Passport No. 2063/1946, issued 8 March 1949 at Alexandria, Egypt. At the time of his arrival in Sydney, DAMASCOU was in possession of Australian Visa No. 433A, issued in Cairo on 12 July 1946. He was described as follows: single, 5 feet 10 inches tall, normal build, brown eyes, black hair, occupation "writer". He departed Australia on 25 May 1949 aboard the S. S. GORNSAY, destination not indicated, and as of 18 July 1961 had not re-entered Australia.

b. Our representative in Mexico City meanwhile had learned that Anastasia Georges DAMASCOU aka DAMASCUS, sister of the above, on 6 July 1960 applied at the Mexican Consulate in San Antonio, Texas, for a Mexican Tourist Card to enter Mexico to visit her brother Nicolas Georges DAMASCOU, then residing at the Hotel

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New York in Mexico City. At the time of her application for an entry permit, she made no mention of any wedding plans. The Mexican Government approved her trip on condition that she deposit with the Consulate a 10,000 Pese bond, as a guarantee of her intention to depart Mexico upon expiration of her tourist card. Mexican Immigration files contain no record of her actual arrival in Mexico following approval of her 8 July 1960 application. The most recent correspondence case on this case contained in Mexican files is dated 15 February 1961, reflecting that Anastasia DAMASCOSU again requested a Tourist Card on or about the date of the letter, at which time her address in the United States was given as c/o Mexican Consul, San Antonio, Texas. In reply to her second application for an entry permit, Mexican authorities again replied with a request that she post a bond in the amount of 10,000 Pesos, to guarantee departure from Mexico upon expiration of her tourist visa. There is no further information currently available on her further travel plans.

c. With reference to Nicolas Georges DAMASCOSU, on basis of the information reported in preceding paragraph, a recheck by our representatives with officials of the United States Embassy in Mexico City revealed that Nicolas Georges DAMASCOSU, born 10 March 1931 at Alexandria, Egypt, holder of Greek Passport 1961 issued in Alexandria, Egypt, on 5 March 1961 and valid to 29 April 1961, with address of 2 Elizabeth Bay Road, Elizabeth Bay, Sydney, Australia, was the recipient of a United States Visa on 12 October 1960. On his application, DAMASCOSU indicated that he desired to visit the United States for a period of four months, described as a pleasure trip to visit his sister. His visa application did not include any destination address in the United States. It was also noted that the visa card maintained on Nicolas DAMASCOSU in the Embassy in Mexico City contains a notation "To-688 to Immigration and Naturalization Service, Los Angeles, May 29 1961."

d. Through a reliable confidential source our representatives in Egypt had learned in the interim that Nicolas DAMASCOSU, who is identical with the individual described in preceding paragraph, currently resides in Los Angeles, California, at 1600 North Gardner, Apartment 12, and that he advised his mother and younger brother, still residing in Alexandria, that he plans to marry the daughter of an American official, who is not further identified. The same source also advised that Georges DAMASCOSU aka DAMASKOU, father of Nicolas and Anastasia DAMASCOSU aka DAMASCUS, died during the summer of 1956. Following the demise of the father, Angelina DAMASCOSU nee SAVOURAS, widowed mother of Nicolas and Anastasia

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DAMASCOU, in company of a younger son not identified by name, had planned to emigrate from Egypt to join her son Nicolas in the United States. However, prior to the realization of these plans, Angelika DAMASCOU suffered a stroke, exact details concerning which are not known, but she is reported as of this writing still to be paralyzed and obviously is unable to travel. No further information was available on the possible future emigration plans of Angelina DAMASCOU nee SAVOURAS and/or of the unidentified younger brother of Nicolas DAMASCOU and of Anastasia DAMASCOU.

c. On basis of the reported filing of an application for a United States Visa in July 1956 at the U.S. Embassy in London by Anastasia DAMASCOU, our representatives in London were requested to initiate a check of [redacted] in the names of Nicolas DAMASCOU and of Anastasia DAMASCOU. [redacted] advised that as of late July 1956, they held no traces on Nicolas Georges DAMASCOU aka DAMASCOU aka DAMASCUS aka DAMASCOU, but that although they had no traces on Anastasia DAMASCOU, they were continuing to check her possible residence in London during 1956, based on the reported visa application data. [redacted] advised that they held no traces on either Nicolas Georges DAMASCOU aka DAMASCOU aka DAMASCUS or on his sister Anastasia Georges DAMASCOU.

3. It is suggested that the indices of the Department of State, Visa Section as well as the indices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, Department of Justice, may contain further detailed information on the current immigration status, whereabouts in the United States, and also the contacts in the United States of Nicolas Georges DAMASCOU aka DAMASCUS, of Anastasia Georges DAMASCOU aka DAMASCOU, and any other members of the family who may have applied for entry visas from abroad.

4. With regard to Justo SIERRA Casares, mentioned in above referenced memorandum of 17 July 1961 as a contact of Nicolas DAMASCOU aka DAMASCUS, it is suggested that the indices of the Department of State may require additional information on his activities during his service at the Mexican Embassy in Washington, D.C.
