Reporter Fined Over JFK NamesNEW ORLEANS (AP) -- A TV reporter was held in contemptand fined \$100 Thursday for airing the names of witnesses whotestified three decades ago in Jim Garrison's grand juryinvestigation of President Kennedy's assassination. In sentencing Richard Angelico of WDSU, state DistrictJudge Frank Marullo said he was acting to protect grandjury secrecy. Last week, Gary Raymond, a former investigator for Garrison, was held in contempt by Marullo for handing the grand jury transcripts to Angelico. Raymond is appealing his six-month jail sentence. Raymond kept the records for more than 20 years after District Attorney Harry Connick -- Garrison's successor -- ordered their destruction in 1974. Connick had asked the judge to find both men in contempt, saying that the state's grand jury secrecy law was brokenwhen Raymond handed over the records and when Angelicoaired the names of some witnesses in July. Angelico's lawyer had argued that the secrecy law applied only to court officials and that Angelico had a constitutional right as a reporter to publish any information he was given. Garrison's investigation was dramatized in the Oliver Stone movie "JFK."

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
