WASHINGTON (AP) -- As an investigator for the late New Orleans District Attorney Jim Garrison, William Gurvich hopped from one Texas airport to the next, seeking clues to support his boss's theory that a conspiracy was at work in President Kennedy's assassination, documents show. At his first stop, "Nobody knew anything ... so I rented an airplane," Gurvich told lawyers for New Orleans businessman Clay Shaw, according to a transcript. Garrison tried Shaw in 1969 on charges of conspiring to kill Kennedy. Shaw was acquitted. Garrison, Gurvich said, suspected that Lee Harvey Oswald and his associates planned a getaway by air after the Nov. 22, 1963, assassination. "I went to White Rock, I went to Dallas-Garland, I went to Highland Park," Gurvich recalled. "I

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
