Senate Hearings on Folklife Center1. National Archives Releases Strategy Plan -- On July 2 U. S. Archivist John Carlin made available to staff and subsequently to the public "Ready Access to Essential Evidence: The Strategic Plan of the National Archives and Records Administration 1997-2007." This draft plan may be seen on the National Archive's WebPage (<http://www.nara.gov>) under the heading of "What's New." Carlin has invited representatives of the National Archives' constituent groups to meetings during the week of July 15 to share in a dialogue about the new directions set forth in the draft plan. The National Archives' Leadership Team has worked for a year on the strategic plan. "Ready Access to Essential Evidence" is a 14 page document that addresses three questions: What is our situation now? What do we want to achieve? and What must we do to get there? Following discussions with staff and constituent groups, Carlin has indicated a revised plan will be distributed in August which will contain a section on the first steps to be taken in FY'97. Although only a few historians and archivists outside of the National Archives have had an opportunity to study the draft plan, some initial reactions have emerged. Many people are pleased to see the plan addressing the need to make changes in the appraisal process, to focus on the life cycle of records, to work more closely with agencies, and to promote what the plan refers to as "front-end records management." However, many have also expressed disappointment at the generic management tone and the lack of details. Specific concerns are: the lack of clarity as to what is really being proposed, the absence of any timetables for achieving specific goals, and the failure to deal more forthrightly with the resource issues. It seems clear that expanded initiatives in a number of areas will require a major decrease of funding levels for other activities. Some have also raised questions about whether the National Archives has the statutory authority for some of the proposed initiatives, such
