	International. WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (UPI) The FBI has transferred an additional 10,119 pages of JFK
	documents to the National Archives and Records Administration, the bureau announced Friday. The
	documents, investigative files from the House Select Committee on Assassinations in 1978-79, will be made
	available to the public by the Archives' at its College Park, Md., facility beginning at 9 a.m. Oct. 2. The
	documents were transferred under the President John F. Kennedy Assassination Records Collection Act of
	1992. Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas in 1963. The materials transferred to the Archives Friday dealt with
	the select committee's examination of various conspiracy theories, according to the FBI. Among them are the
	files on organized crime figure John Roselli, the bureau said. The release of some of the material transferred
	has been postponed, either to protect sensitive sources, such as informants on organized crime, or because
	the FBI is awaiting a go-ahead on specific items from another government agency or foreign government. The
	bureau has now transferred 651,000 pages of its JFK files, and will continue to transfer documents reviewed
	by the now-defunct select committee and identified by the Assassination Records Review Board as

	of John F. Kennedy, and some say it's sick and exploitive. But that's not stopping visitors from taking the one-

	Ritting, 55, of Tacoma, Wash. The tour, thought up by Paul Crute, retraces the path of the presidential
	motorcade in a 1964 Lincoln restored to look like the 1963 model. Crute recreates the moment with piped-in
	sound effects and radio broadcasts from the day the president was shot. Crute, 34, gave up a career in sales t
	start the tour after seeing tourists wandering the assassination site. He makes maybe three trips on weekdays
	and eight a day during the weekend. "Being in touch with the fact that it is such an unhealed wound, that's
	kind of what motivated me to dream this up," he said. "It's sick," said Chuck DiDiovanni, a tourist from
