ROBINSON Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) -- An amateur film that captured President Kennedy and his wife, Jackie, in the minutes before he was shot was released Thursday by a federal board compiling a public record of the assassination. The three-minute, 16-millimeter film was taken by Dave Powers, a presidential aide who accompanied the Kennedys on the trip to Texas Nov. 21-22, 1963. Its release came on the day before the 33rd anniversary of the assassination by the Assassination Records Review Board. "It is not at the level of the Zapruder film, obviously," said Tom Samoluk, spokesman for the board. "But perhaps there is some historian who will find something of significance." Abraham Zapruder's amateur 8-millimeter film captured the moment Kennedy was shot and the events that immediately followed. Powers' film was discovered among boxes of his records and possessions, Samoluk said. The board had contacted Powers because it was known that he often filmed the Kennedys when he traveled with them. The silent, color film mostly captures the Kennedys arriving and departing from Texas airports and traveling in motorcades. Most of the footage is of the first day, when the entourage stopped in San Antonio, Houston and Fort Worth. On the day of the assassination, the film captured the Kennedys boarding the airplane that took them to Dallas. In a later frame, it shows them climbing into a limousine and begin the ride through Dallas' streets. Powers ran out of film minutes before the motorcade entered Dealey Plaza where the shots were fired, the board said. Another story Copyright 1996 The Associated Press. All rights reserved. ROBINSON Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) -- A newly released film shows President Kennedy the day before his assassination being mobbed by well-wishers as he and his wife, Jackie, drove down Texas streets in an open convertible. Taken by a presidential aide who accompanied them on the trip Nov. 21-22, 1963, the film shows people along the presidential route freely running up to the presidential limousine to greet the couple. "People will be interested in what the security was like during the course of the motorcade," said Tom Samoluk, spokesman for the Assassination Records Review Board, which released the film Thursday. "Certainly, it is a valuable addition to the historical record, because it is filmed up to a couple of minutes before the shooting," he said. The film's release came a day before the 33rd anniversary of the assassination. The board, an independent federal agency, is compiling a public record of the assassination.
