The Board continues to process the remaining assassination records, primarily from the CIA and FBI, at a rate that is consistent with the schedule that was presented to the Committee in June 1997. I would like to take this opportunity to provide you with some additional information regarding the Boards progress since our last report. At a September 17 closed meeting, the Board processed 1,716 CIA records and 1,211 FBI records for public release. The total of 2,927 records processed by the Board is more than any prior meeting. The system put in place by the Board to quicken the pace of records review in our last year is clearly showing very positive results. The results of the Boards closed meeting on August 5 were not yet available at the time of our first report to the Committee, so I would like to apprise you of them now. The Board processed for public release 133 CIA and CIA-related House Select Committee on Assassinations (HSCA) records, 220 FBI records and nine miscellaneous assassination records held by the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA), for a total of 362 records. As you can see, there was a dramatic increase in the number of records processed by the Board between the August meeting and the September meeting, largely due to the revision and streamlining of our review procedures. Since our August report, the Boards FBI team has reviewed an additional 30,000 pages of records from the FBIs HSCA subject files. The files that we have been working on include those of several major organized crime figures. The Board is pleased with the progress that has been made on these important files because they are complicated in that the documents still contain outstanding issues that will have to be dealt with by the Board, such as the equities of other agencies, information generated by foreign governments, and grand jury information. The Boards review of records contained in the CIAs so-called Sequestered Collection is also proceeding well. An initial survey of the Collection has been completed by the Boards CIA team. As a result of this survey, all folders have been prioritized according to relevance to the assassination. Our staff has finished approximately Record
