GURVICH'S BROTHER ON GARRISON, SHAW, JFK CASENew Orleans I read with great dismay the April 18 letter from Jim Garrison'sson. Over these great many years, I have had a great reluctance to commenton what occurred during District Attorney Garrison's JFK investigation. Since young Mr. Garrison's writings are so rife with mistakes, I feel aneed to put things in their proper perspective. My brother, William Gurvich, was not some private investigator. Hewas an owner of a large security and criminal investigative serviceemploying more than 500 people. Bill was recognized nationally and internationally as an extremely professional criminal investigator. Both William Gurvich and I were civilian investigators on Mr.Garrison's staff from the time he was voted into the office of districtattorney. No Gurvich volunteered, but we were summoned by Mr. Garrisonbased solely on our personal knowledge of David Ferrie and criminalinvestigation we completed that dealt with a number of Mr. Ferrie's acquaintances. To further correct the mistaken impressions of young Mr. Garrison, more than one Gurvich was asked by Mr. Garrison to assist him and his staffin their investigation. Many years have now passed, and I remain friendswith all the major investigators and prosecutors who worked in Mr. Garrison's behalf. While I still appreciate that Mr. Garrison's assistants have showngreat reluctance to malign the investigation, I believe the time to speakout has long since passed. There is no major prosecutor or investigator, save one, who did notspeak with me about the lack of evidence in the Clay Shaw-JFK case. I wasalso told by these assistants that Mr. Garrison was ruining their office's reputation and that they hoped my family's business would not suffer fromour participation in the Shaw case. Mr. Garrison pursued the case even though he had been advised bytwo polygraphers, Col. Roy Jacobs and Lt. Edward O'Donnel, that hisprincipal witness, Perry Russo, could not pass a lie detector test andadmitted to them that his story (Russo's) was not completely true. In spiteof this, Mr. Garrison continued to pursue a prosecution. The rest is history, and in 45 minutes the jury found Clay Shawinnocent. Mr. Garrison's investigation had nothing to do with the WarrenReport or the facts about President Kennedy's murder. I sincerely regretyoung Mr. Garrison's feelings on this matter. While I try hard to understand, I believe it would be extremely difficult for anyone to suddenly wake up one morning and find their fatheris not the hero he once thought. The world has found it sadly lacking anyevidence involving the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.
