Kennedy. This is the second majorrelease of military records on U.S. foreign policy from the 1960's by theReview Board in the last month.? These military records on U.S. policy toward Vietnam add important depthto the historical record because they are from both before and after theassassination of President Kennedy,? said Dr. Kermit L. Hall, a member of the Review Board. ? At the time of President Kennedy?s death, Vietnam was increasingly becoming a matter of foreign policy concern. Any records that add substance to our understanding of the impact that the assassination hadon U.S. policy in Vietnam are a welcomed addition to the JFK Collection atthe National Archives and Records Administration.? The mandate of the Review Board is to make the record surrounding theassassination of President Kennedy as complete as possible. The Board hasbeen aggressive in its pursuit of records on U.S. foreign policy that putthe assassination into its historical context. Last month the Review Boardreleased previously classified military records related to U.S. policytoward Cuba in the early 1960's. As with the November release of military records on Cuba, the Review Boardworked cooperatively with representatives from the Department of Defense(DOD) and the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) to locaterecords stored at NARA that met the definition of being ?assassinationrelated.? The documents being released today are from the files of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.The records have been transferred to NARA for inclusion in the JFKCollection, which is housed at the NARA facility in College Park, Maryland. These documents are now available to researchers. The Assassination Records Review Board was established by the JFK Act, which was signed into law by President George Bush. The five members of the Board were appointed by President Clinton, confirmed by the U.S. Senate, and sworn inon April 11, 1994. The law gives the Review Board the mandate and the authority toidentify, secure, and make available all records related to

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
