"Zapruder film intrigues assassination buff"Rik HaymanThe Saginaw News Martin R. Shackelford of Saginaw has waited for years for ahigh-quality copy of Abraham Zapruder's home movie of President John F.Kennedy's Nov. 22, 1963 assassination. He bought two copies Friday for \$19.95 each from Sun Coast MotionPicture Co. in Saginaw Township's Fashion Square Mall. The store received 20 copies of the videotape about 10 a.m. By 7p.m., they had sold five--two of them to Shackelford, said store managerAngela Pignatelli. The digitally enhanced film includes a 40-minute preamble and sixseparate showings of the president's skull shattering. Shackelford, 50, who lives on North Webster near Court, has collected information about the assassination since it occurred nearly 35 years ago. In 1974, he started taking a look at photographic evidence, including Zapruder's home movie of the Dallas motorcade. Like most Americans, Shackelford had seen the 26-second clip of the assassination before. But he wanted a closer look to develop his own theory of whokilled Kennedy, never buying the official version that Lee Harvey Oswaldacted alone. "The whole idea is to find out what happened," he said. "If Ithought there was a lone gunman, I wouldn't be doing this. What would bethe point?" He obtained an 8mm bootleg copy of the Zapruder film in 1975, and later got his hands on a full set of film slides. He jumped at the chance to get a copy of the video when MPI HomeVideo of Orland Park, Ill., began distributing the film. Shackelford popped his new copy of the film into the videocassetterecorder as soon as he got home. "This is far better than anything that's ever been availablebefore," he said.COMMENTS: Overall, I liked the article, and not just because the reportershaved a year off my age. His description of the video is misleading,unfortunately, and I'm not developing my own theory--and I got my firstbootleg in 1974, not 1975.

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
