I think version 4 uses more of the language the Agency itself will use to describe the various possible types of "backchannels" and thus is more specific and limiting. Is there a reason we need to describe them as backchannel "written" communications? Is something that comes in electronically and is printed out necessarily characterized as a written communication? Finally. the administrative, senior staff, and restricted access communications are not necessarily "memos." They can be any type of communication from a few lines, to a person to person note, or a brief operational order. Memos, to me, implies something formal or official and thus less likely to be put in a backchannel. Those are my suggestions for what they are worth.
