ASSASSINATION RECORDS REVIEW BOARD TO RELEASE AMATEUR FILM FROM DAY OF JFK ASSASSINATION, THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 21ST, 9:00 AM

The Assassination Records Review Board will release to the media an amateur film taken by an aide to President John F. Kennedy the day he was assassinated. Copies of the film will be made available to the media at the Review Board offices on Thursday, November 21, 1996 at 9:00 a.m.

The three minute amateur film, taken by former presidential aide Dave Powers, chronicles President Kennedy's trip to Texas on November 21-22, 1963 and has never been seen publicly. It consists of a series of short sequences of the President and Mrs. Kennedy. The film does not show the assassination of the President. Powers, who was riding in a Secret Service car directly behind the presidential limousine during the Dallas motorcade, ran out of film minutes before the motorcade entered Dealey Plaza where the shots were fired that killed the President.

The film will eventually become part of the JFK Collection at the National Archives, but is not available there yet. Videotape copies of the film are only being made available to the media by the Assassination Records Review Board at this time.

One VHS videotape copy of the Powers film will be made available to each media outlet for a fee of \$4.00 to cover the reproduction costs incurred by the Review Board.

The Assassination Records Review Board was established by The President John F. Kennedy Assassination Records Collection Act, which was signed into law by President George Bush. The five members of the Board were appointed by President Clinton, confirmed by the U.S. Senate, and sworn in on April 11, 1994. The law gives the Review Board the mandate and the authority to identify, secure, and make available all records related to the assassination of President Kennedy. It is the responsibility of the Board to determine which records are to be made public immediately and which ones will have postponed release dates.
