"After Harvey took over the Castro operation he ran it as one aspect of ZRRIFLE; however, he personally handled the Castro operation and did not use any of the assets being developed in ZRRIFLE. He says that he soon came to think of the Castro operation and ZRRIFLE as being synonymous. The over-all Executive Action program came to be treated in his mind as being synonymous with QJWIN, the agent working on the over-all program. He says that when he wrote of ZRRIFLE/QJWIN the reference was to Executive Action Capability; when he used the cryptonym ZRRIFLE alone, he was referring to Castro. He said that his correspondence would disclose this distinction. We reviewed the correspondence and found it for the most part unrevealing."

D. CIA Organization

Counterintelligence: Created/restructured by Dulles in 1954. Headed by Angleton from 1954-1975. Seven branches: CI/RA; CI/OPS; CI/IC; CI/SIG; CI/IP; CI/LS; CI/SOG (Israel).

Under Angleton: “The staff consisted of an administrative group of about six people who handled finance, logistics and personnel - and included the deputy chief, several budge officers and two or three secretaries. Under this management team, Angleton established seven branches: Research and Analysis; Operations; International Communism and Front Organisations; Special Investigation Group; International Police; Liaison to Other US Departments and Agencies; and Special Operations Group (Israel).

“Each of these branches was headed by a senior officer and deputy who reported to Angleton. These sections were staffed with various combinations of nearly two hundred officers, analysts, research assistants, translators and secretary/clerks (about one for every five officers).

“By far the largest of the seven branches were Research and Analysis (which oversaw the file archives) and Operations (which handled cases and confronted suspected agents in foreign services). Together they comprised about two thirds of the Counterintelligence Staff’s total personnel. The other branches had about a dozen people or less in them; in the International Communism Branch, for instance, a staff of about ten officers provided liaison with foreign intelligence services from countries where strong Communist parties operated.”⁵²

Colby’s opinion: “As far as I was concerned, the role of the Counterintelligence Staff was basically to secure penetrations into the Russian intelligence services and to debrief defectors. . . . As far as this business of *finding* Soviet penetrations within the CIA, well, we have the whole Office of Security to protect us. That is their job.”⁵³

During 1960s CI had its own financial accounts and was not audited from the outside.⁵⁴

Office of Security OS “had official jurisdiction over two counterintelligence-related functions: guarding the CIA’s buildings and facilities worldwide; and investigating all CIA personnel (conducting background checks and polygraphs) to ensure their loyalty, and do root out any potential risks or traitors. . . . Often, on specific security cases involving suspected espionage, there was a considerable overlap in the responsibilities of the counterintelligence Staff and Office of Security because of the grey line between their respective areas of jurisdiction and authority.”⁵⁵

“The Office of Security is responsible, on a world-wide basis, for ensuring proper security of CIA facilities, operations and personnel. The protection of classified material from unauthorized disclosure is prominent among the responsibilities of the Office. . . . Occasionally it has investigated persons with no connection with the Agency, for various reasons related to the protection of classified material. . . . In the course of conducting investigations, the Office has, on infrequent occasions, engaged in wiretaps, buggings, surreptitious entries and other improper conduct.”⁵⁶

OS “Security files are maintained on applicants for employment, Agency employees, former Agency employees, independent contractors doing business with the Agency, persons supplying the Agency with positive intelligence information, consultants, non-Agency employees who work on Agency premises, and other individuals and business entities whose relationship with the Agency gives them access to classified information.”⁵⁷

“The most secret component of Angleton’s empire was a short distance down the hallway to the left of his office. Little is known of it to this day. Formally designated as the Special Investigation Group -- or SIG -- it was a small, elite unit consisting of eight of Angleton’s most trusted and close-mouthed people. The unit included a chief, deputy, two officers and a small support staff of assistants and secretaries.” It was established “in order to investigate possibilities that the CIA itself might have been penetrated by the KGB.”⁵⁸

“The SIG was so secret that many members of the Counterintelligence Staff didn’t even know it existed, and nearly everyone was denied access to it.”⁵⁹

“As part of its brief after 1965, the SIG handled the acquisition, analysis and dissemination of the material stolen by the national Security Agency from the plant’s ether.” The information was analyzed for, *inter alia*, counterintelligence information.⁶⁰

“The Soviet Division was the CIA’s Marine Corps, up front and ‘belly to belly,’ as the jargon had it, with Soviet intelligence. In 1964, the Soviet Division was the largest CIA division, some nine hundred strong, with two hundred and fifty officers based in Washington and the rest stationed overseas. About half of its employees were native US citizens; the other half had European or Soviet backgrounds, with the concomitant linguistic skills and geographical savvy to operate under hostile conditions. Soviet Division officers were as close as it gets to the traditional spies of fiction. The division’s primary job, according to William Colby, is to recruit Soviet agents and deliver the red meat of military, political and economic information for the agency’s analysts.”⁶¹
