INTRODUCTION

The personal papers of Roger Hilsman, Assistant Secretary of State for Far Eastern Affairs, were donated to the John F. Kennedy Library in 1964.

It is the donor's wish that the materials be made available for research use as soon as possible and to the fullest extent possible. Documents in the Hilsman papers prepared by officials or employees of the United States as part of their official duties are in the public domain. Under the provisions of the United States Copyright Law, copyright in any writing created before January 1, 1978, and not in the public domain, rests with the author and his heirs for the period of the life of the author plus 50 years or for 100 years from the date the item was created if the author's date of death in unknown. Users of these materials are advised to determine the copyright status of any document from which they plan to publish.

The file first became available for research use in January of 1979. Material which contains information or statements that might be used to embarrass, damage, or harass any living person has been removed and placed under seal. Also removed and placed under seal are materials which are security classified pursuant to law or executive order or which contain information the public release of which would adversely affect the security of the United States of America. Document withdrawal slips have been inserted in the file where items have been removed. The library will review this closed material upon request for the purpose of opening items which no longer require restriction.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The personal papers of Roger Hilsman cover the time period of January 1961 to March 1964.

Roger Hilsman was the Director of the Bureau of Intelligence and Research [INR] at the Department of State from 1961 to 1963. He was the Assistant Secretary of State for Far Eastern Affairs [FE] from 1963 to March of 1964. As Director of INR Hilsman was responsible for the development and implementation of a program of research and analysis for use in the department and by other federal agencies and he was in charge of all the intelligence gathering operations for the Department of State. In this position he often worked with the CIA and Department of Defense, as well as with members of the White House staff.

As Assistant Secretary of State for Far Eastern Affairs, Hilsman was responsible for the conduct of foreign relations in that particular area of the-world. The bureau itself is divided into the Office of East Asian Affairs, Office of Southeast Asian Affairs and the Office of Southwest Pacific Affairs.

While at INR and FE Hilsman's files show that the major concerns of his office were Vietnam, Laos and the administration of the INR.

The papers are arranged in seven series as they were received: Countries file, Subject files Chronological file, Memoranda of Conversations, Memoranda of Telephone Conversations, Daily Diaries and Appointment Books. The two series, Memoranda of Conversations and Memoranda of Telephone Calls have been closed. These transcripts, summaries and stenographic notes will be reviewed as part of the Kennedy Library's general systematic review of national security classified material under agency guidelines under the provisions of Executive Order 12065. Until that time none of these files may be made available for research use.

The researcher may also be interested in looking at the James C. Thomson papers as well as Hilsman's oral history interview, both of which are located in the Kennedy Library.

SERIES DESCRIPTION

Box Nos. Series

1-4 Countries file, 1/61-3/64. 4 boxes.

This series reflects Hilsman's policy making role while he was at the State Department. The largest amount of material deals with Vietnam and Laos. Subseries that do not deal with the Far East are Cuba, Ghana and the USSR. The series is arranged in alphabetical order by country chronologically within each country. National security classified documents have been withdrawn and withdrawal slips placed in the folders.

Subject series, 1/61-3/64. 1.5 boxes.

The Subject series reflects the purely administrative aspect of Hilsman's job as opposed to the policy making role reflected in the Countries series. The Administrative subseries deals with tenure as head of INR and concentrates on budgets and the reorganization proposal of 1963. The subseries Intelligence deals with many of the things that are in the Administrative subseries. The subseries General deals with many different and unrelated topics, from the Attorney General's Far East Trip to the Test Ban Treaty. The subseries Speeches are either speeches Hilsman delivered or speeches he did background work on. The series is arranged alphabetically by subject. National security classified documents have withdrawn and withdrawal slips placed in the folders.
