The Assassination Records Review Board is seeking interns for summer 1996.

The Assassination Records Review Board is an independent federal agency created to oversee the identification and release of records related to the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

The Review Board was established by The President John F. Kennedy Assassination Records Collection Act of 1992 (PL 102-526), and was signed into law by President George Bush. The five members of the Board were appointed by President Clinton, confirmed by the United States Senate, and sworn in on April 11, 1994. The law gives the Board the mandate and authority to identify, secure, and make available all records related to the assassination of President Kennedy.

Summer interns may work on one or more of the following categories of projects for the professional staff:

- research projects on the following types of subjects: medical evidence, forensics evidence (ballistics), organized crime, New Orleans, Cuba, Mexico City, Dallas, Soviet Defectors, and extremist groups;
- review of unclassified Federal agency records on the assassination;
- projects for the General Counsel in the broad areas of administrative law, information law, privacy law, and national security law.
