Subject: Part Two of Goodpasture Deposition

As you requested, I read the Anne Goodpasture deposition from December 16, 1995, in preparation for completing her deposition. It seems that we were not able to address one significant section from our deposition outline, as well as three less time-consuming sections. The significant section relates to standard operating procedures at the Mexico City Station, which runs from pages 13 to 20 in the outline. The three minor sections are Day of Assassination and Immediate Aftermath on pages 24-26, Subsequent CIA Activities/Investigation on page 27, and Miscellaneous Section on page 28. With respect to the first minor section, we did touch on some of the subjects during the first half of the deposition. Specifically, we still need to address the following issues: Sylvia Duran's arrests and interrogations, the Alvarado story, the monitoring of flights, the DFS role in the investigation, and Manuel Calvillo's role. I believe the remainder of this section was covered.

In terms of follow-up questions for Anne Goodpasture, I suggest we address the following areas:

- AG discusses the two different surveillance teams, referring to them by their crypts, with respect to the Soviet and Cuban Embassies. From her testimony, it is unclear whether or not she was involved in any Cuban surveillance. I think that we need to clarify this issue in order to understand exactly how she operated in her day-to-day activities. I suggest that before the second part of her deposition I review the files in the CIA microfilim collection that concern these surveillance operations. I might be able to gather some evidence that illustrates AG's responsibilities. [p.26]
- AG asserts that she does not recall any specific tasking after the assassination that involved investigating Oswald's visit. I find this statement incredibly difficult to believe, because I know for certain that she assisted Win Scott in locating the "Oswald" transcripts for headquarters after the assassination. I suggest that we probe this area a bit further, possibly by asking some questions about specific requests from headquarters, e.g., Sylvia Duran handwriting samples and flight manifests. [p.27]
- The Mexico City Station history was addressed, but not discussed in great detail. Bearing in mind your review of the station history, we need to follow-up on AG's description of
