Note to Review Board Members --FBI Requests for Reconsideration on Records 124-10250-10054, 124-10256-10013

Both of these records concern reports by a "Potential Security Informant" on two public lectures (in August and September 1964) given by Mark Lane in New York City. At the July 9-10 meeting, the Review Board accepted the staff recommendation to open these records in full. Since that staff recommendation was framed, the FBI has provided evidence that this informant, who was born in 1940, is still alive and residing in the New York City area. This identification is verified by name and date of birth.

Staff research has not disclosed any connection between this informant and the assassination, other than his reporting on these public lectures. The staff believes that postponing the informant's name and the "informant-specific" part of his informant file number is consistent with the policies established by the Review Board, and recommends that the request for reconsideration be granted and the original determinations modified to postpone release of the informant's name and the "informant-specific" part of the file number for ten years.
