This letter is to follow up on our telephone conversation this morning concerning the possibility that an ONI report relating to President Kennedy's assassination was destroyed at some time in the early 1970s. I understand you know of someone who saw the report in the course of official duties, and who was later told the report had been destroyed.

As we discussed this morning, the Review Board is crucially interested in identifying ALL records related to President Kennedy's assassination, whether those records are in federal, state, local or private hands. The legislation which created the Review Board, Public Law 102-526, (44 United States Code section 2107 (1992) (as amended)) in fact mandates that all assassination records be located and turned over to the National Archives for inclusion in the JFK Assassination Records Collection. As we further discussed, Congress gave the Review Board the power to issue subpoenas and to grant immunity in order for the Review Board to be fully able to meet the task of identifying and locating the myriad of assassination records.

Because the search for assassination records is so complex, the Review Board has been in contact with a number of interested individuals whose assistance in locating these records has been invaluable.
