Re: Response/Talking Points on Draft Definition Guidance Criticism

I drafted some quick talking points that could be used if the Internet criticism had been something we had to respond to in the press. I would be interested in your thoughts, at your convenience.

- 1. The President John F. Kennedy Assassination Records Collection Act which created the Review Board was carefully crafted and passed by the Congress with bi-partisan support, following extensive committee hearings.
- 2. The law was signed by a Republican President and Board members were appointed by a Democratic President.
- 3. Nominations were made by the President after considering recommendations by nationally renowned historian, archivist and bar associations, as provided by the Act.
- 4. The Board members were unanimously confirmed by the United States Senate.

- 5. The Board intends to follow the clear mandate of the law to provide a full record of the assassination, open and accessible to the American public at the National Archives.
- 6. The definition guidance is only a draft, openly published for interested parties to offer input. It is a fair and responsible working draft.
- 7. The Board members intends to handle their obligations in a responsible manner, based on the law, and their collective experiences as professionals.
- 8. The Board will not be deterred by criticism from parties with self-interests which come at the expense of the American public's right to full disclosure, as clearly articulated by this law.
