Portrait Report

Pursuant to critic publications and specific statements by former CIA employee James Wilcott that LHO was a CIA agent, Staff Investigator Harold D. Reap, interviewed the following CIA personnel to determine if there was collaboration for the Wilcott statements and personal knowledge relating to the Oswald agent issue.

1. [redacted] Position, with CIA, was Deputy Chief of Station [redacted], June to Sept 67. Interviewed at CIA Hdqs 4-13-78. Subject is retired.

2. [redacted] Position with CIA for the period ~~May 54 to July 64~~ was Chief of Counter Intelligence, SE Branch, [redacted]. Interviewed CIA Hdqs 4-10-78. Subject is retired.

3. [redacted] Subject presently employed at CIA Hdqs [redacted] position with the CIA in 1963 [redacted] was Intelligence assistant for the SE Section. Interviewed at CIA Hdqs on 4-7-78.

4. Frederick C. Randall, [redacted] Presently employed by CIA Hdqs. Randall position with the CIA in Sept 61 to Aug 63 was Chief of Registry at the [redacted] Station. Interviewed at CIA Hdqs on [redacted].

The above individuals were selected for interview because of the position they held ~~at the time~~ ~~with the CIA~~ at the [redacted] State during the time ~~period~~ ~~from~~ 1959 to 1964.

James M. Wilcott made some testimony in a closed hearing before the SC 4 that a CIA case officer ~~had been~~ ~~related~~ in [redacted] told him that LHO

was a CIA agent and ~~was~~ ~~being~~ mentioned LHO's cryptos ~~signature~~. ~~The person was~~ ~~him~~ ~~that~~ took place in the [redacted] station shortly after the word of the JFK assassination was received on 23 Nov 63. Wilcott ~~also~~

~~stated~~ that could not recall the name of the case officer or the cryptos ~~signature~~. Wilcott also advised that considerable conversation took place among CIA employees ~~at the time~~ concerning the Oswald-CIA agent issue.

The basic question asked of the CIA employees selected was as follows

- (a) Have you ever seen written documents, which may indicate that LHO was a ~~CIA~~ ^{intelligible} agent or a source of information?
- (b) ~~When~~ you ever heard advised orally that LHO was a agent?
- (c) Have you ever heard conversation on board, ~~conversations~~ that LHO was a CIA agent or intelligence source for any government ~~service~~?
- (d) Were you in a position to know if LHO was recruited as a CIA agent during his tour of duty with the military in Japan.

- (e) When was the first time you ever heard the allegation that LHO ~~was~~ ^{may have been} a CIA agent.
- (f) Did you know James & Edie Wilcott

~~None of the~~ ~~above~~ all individuals interviewed stated they never saw any documents nor heard any information that LHO was a CIA agent while stationed in . Only after ~~their departure~~ the critic publication and the Garrison investigation in the late 60s were they ~~so~~ ~~now~~ aware of the ~~past~~ allegations.

Subjects 2, 7 & 8 expressed belief that LHO ~~would~~ ^{may} have been recruited by the KGB during his tour of duty in Japan. They based their belief on the fact that during the period of time that LHO was in Japan, the CIA had identified a KGB program specifically ~~described~~ ^{designed} designed to recruit U.S. military personnel in Tokyo. However they had no information that the recruitment of LHO by the KGB did in fact take place.

Subject Jerome E. Fox was ~~supposedly~~ one person who Wilcox could remember ~~that~~ ^{with who} he had conversation ~~with~~ concerning the speculation that LHO was an agent for the CIA. The conversation supposedly took place [redacted] after the information ^{was received} that LHO was the assassin of JFK. Fox advised investigator Leap that he was in the U.S. at the time of assassination on 23 Nov 63. Fox's CIA personnel reflects he was transferred from the [redacted] station to the U.S. in 1962.

Subjects 2, 7, 8, 9 and 11 all thought they would have known if LHO had been ~~re~~ recruited as a CIA agent while he was in Japan. All the subjects worked within the SR Branch of the [redacted] station and theoretically ~~would have~~ one of them would have handled or had knowledge of the recruitment. All thought if Oswald had been recruited without their knowledge it would have been a rare exception to the working policy and guidelines of the station.
