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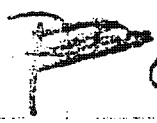

" Agency field reps in the NY, LA, State and the Miami base worked closely with the local FBI representatives keeping the latter continually apprised of all information pertaining to the investigation - as it became available. The NY, LA, State + Miami base were able to respond immediately to requirements levied by the local FBI representative. The field reported to HQ on all information passed into the field to the FBI or received from the FBI rep. so that HQ could make a formal decision to the appropriate government agency or dept. in Washington.

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- 2) On 3 June 1962 Mrs. Oswald entered the Netherlands via Oldenzaal Station presumably accompanied by her husband and daughter June.

... "The fact is that the WC considered the possibility of Cuban or Soviet involvement, but could not find evidence of it. Were it known at the time of the WC, it would have been reported and dealt with then; that it was not is a simple reflection of the fact that it did not exist at that time in the mind of Americans knowledgeable on the subject. To hold differently would be to accept essentially a social paranoia often prevalent today, which would hold that a significant number of good samples could engage in such a well-disciplined conspiracy to suppress evidence.

It is appropriate at this point to observe the general reaction to be expected from such a communication. Without any leads, other than those arising from Oswald's identification, the requirements to field stations were necessarily general. General reporting can be stimulated by general requests, if there is something to report, and this is what was undertaken. In addition, in any event, intelligence assets and liaison service overseas are quick to realize the significance of important information and will report it on their own initiative. It is significant, in ~~the~~ light of these considerations, that there has been the most limited reporting on the subject. Were there relevant or significant information on the subject it would have been reported either in response to the expression of general interest, or spontaneously, if such information was known to Agency sources."

Requesting Information on

1. The Doublet Collectors Division (DCD) (DCD) has an inactive file on William George Gaudet, former editor and publisher of The Latin American Report. The file shows that Gaudet was a source of the New Orleans DCD Resident Office from 1948 to 1955 during which period he provided fragmentary intelligence information on Latin American political and economic conditions resulting from his extensive travel in South and Central America in pursuit of journalistic interests. The file further indicates that Gaudet was a casual contact of the New Orleans Office between 1955 and 1961 when, at various times, he furnished fragmentary intelligence and tried unsuccessfully to obtain financial loans from the Agency, through DCD, to support his publication. There is no correspondence in the DCD file on Gaudet after 1961.
