Info from AMMOG-1 on AGENTS

The difference between a Cuban and a foreign agent (of the DGI) is as follows.

Recruitment of foreigners consists for the most part, of agreement with the organizations to which they belong. Foreign agents can also be recruited in the schools in Cuba where they are receiving guerrilla training.

Once recruited as possible agents, they are separated from the others and placed in DGI houses, where they receive instruction as agents. . . .

Ordinarily an attempt is made to keep them from contact w/ anyone in government circles so as to avoid indiscretions.

Any agent recruited in a foreign country is brought to Cuba and arrangements are made so that he has no contacts w/ persons in Cuba from his own country or any other. Once his training is

completed, his departure from Cuba is not made known to anyone attached to him.

2. Q. How does (a DSI agent) get to Cuba?
What cover story does he use?

A. He may travel by any means either via Mexico or via Prague. He may travel in true name or alias. I do not know what cover story he uses in his country or on the trip, except that he always appears as a student. He does not leave for Cuba until there is a course for persons from his country and organization in which he can be included.

An agent recruited directly (not from a guerrilla school) for illegal work may be recruited on the recommendation of the DSE, or the personal recommendation of a DSI officer.

DSI officers are charged w/ expediting the granting of visas of agents of the DSI. Such agents on appearing at the Consulate use a special phrase to indicate their relationship w/ DSI. (Source does not know the particular phrase used in every case. He does know that agents from El Salvador in requesting visas always made mention of the name "Mauricio.") The DSI

officers at a Consulate interview
visa applicants to find out if
they are agents. If the visa
applicant does not use one of
the indicated phrases, the PSI
officer, instead of granting the
visa immediately tell the
applicant to return in a few
days. The officer then notifies
Habana and requests authority
for the visa.

1. A/I describes Armstrong as intelligent hard working security conscious case officer whose ultra serious demeanor makes him butt of many jokes by other DSI officers. However, A/I believes Armstrong not likely to be alienated as he takes practical jokes in stride and does not become upset.
2. Further info from A/I on Armstrong:
A. Married. 2 children, speaks French. 40-50 years old, mulatto, natty dresser. Attended Univ. of Habana where he was contact of AMTHUS/1 when latter returned to ~~Mexi~~ Cuba from Mexi.
B. During 63-64 as DSI Haiti Desk officer, Armstrong attempted recruit some Haitian nationals residing Habana for Guerrilla training. Extent of success not known. Prior to holding present DSI position probably served in unknown slot in Uruguay and later a commercial attach in Mexi.
