SUBJECT: Contact Report - Antonio VECTANA Blanche

1. (C) Two members of USACOD (using assumed names) met with Antonio PECIANA on 22 January. The purpose of the meeting was primarily to gather the alls ones boat, used by his organization, which had been confiscated by U.S. Customs. In addition, Vociana was queried on the capabilities and mission of his group, his cole in it, and what assistance be felt.

22. (C) VECTANA is a buban refugee, resident in Miama, and a consulted public accountant by profession. He is currently associated with which account Second Front of the Espanoray of the commany middles and possibly as treasurer. He said that these bases are manned by small promps of men with military experience (ite., experience in demolitions, radio, and boat operation, etc.). He identified Gutierres NENOTO as a military chief. He stated they had assets in tuba, some of whom they could contact y radio communication. He mentioned that they maintain communication between an operations case, and kiami and querto-cure VECIANA stated they maintain "headcuarters" in Sap Juan, Miami, and New York and plan to establish other offices in Washington, Chicago and Los Angeles to facilitate the raising of funds.

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- stated that they already have four boats, and enough small arms and ammunition (including explosives) to equip 400-500 men. Their need, (in addition to personnel) is for boats, food (and related subsistence) items), and radios. These boats, costing about \$2000 andece, will have fiberglass hulls and be used for sabotage rands and for establishing small guerrilla teams in Cuba. The radios will establish their communication with the boats and guerrilla craws. VECIANA envisions purchase of moderate price transceiver equipment. VECIANA hopes they will be prepared for 20 25 raids against Cuba within 6 weeks. (Note: This is substance of detailed information contained in ANTGB 103, DAIN 8274, dated 16 January 1963.)
- 6. (C) VECTANA provided copies of the correspondence with the Bureau of Customs regarding seizure of the boat. (See attachments). VECTANA stated that the boat was owned by a Cuban-American fisherman in Miami who is not a member of their organization. He said that the boat was worth about \$2000. The supplies and equipment aboard consisted of approximately 10 N-1 rifles with ammunition, food, fuel, ten watches, and a 1 kW generator. He said the total value of the boat and equipment, was about \$3,000. The boat was in the Miami River at the time of capture.
- 7. (C) VECIANA requested assistance in releasing the boat and equipment, he made a plea for funds (\$10,000), and stated that the U.S. Covernment could assist the group most by allowing them freedom of movement.
