On February 28, 1964, T-1, who has furnished reliable information in the past, stated that a check of the Mexican Immigration records maintained by the Mexican Ministry of the Interior (Gobernacion), Mexico, D. F., disclosed file #4/351.0"60"/29224 concerning GEORGE DE MOHRENSCHILDT and his wife, JEANNE DE MOHRENSCHILDT, both United States citizens. According to this file, GEORGE DE MOHRENSCHILDT, a petroleum geologist and engineer, had directed a communication from 139-40 Republic National Bank Building, Dallas, Texas, on June 6, 1960, to the Secretary of Gobernacion, asking for permission for he and his wife, JEANNE, to enter Mexico for a period of eleven months in order to do research in the fields of art, archaeology and geology while traveling through Mexico from the United States border to Central America and Panama,

According to this file, the MOHRENSCHILDTs planned to do most of their work in the State of Chiapas, Mexico. MOHRENSCHILDT indicated that his work would be published in "Life Magazine" and the "National Geographic Magazine" and indicated that he was a friend of ANTONIO GARCIA ROJAS, Director of Mexican Petroleum Exploration.
