- A. Cable dated 1/22/64 pertaining to a meeting of the Interdepartmental Committee 1/19/64. Information (S) in this cable pertained to an agreement regarding the sale of wheat to Yugoslavia. (S)
- B. Cable dated[1/23/64.] This cable pertained to an Interdepartmental Committee meeting during which agreement was reached to provide Yugoslavia with U.S. surpluses. (S)
- C. Cable dated 1/27/64. Cable containing information (s) regarding instructions forwarded by the USDS to the U.S. (s) Embassy, Belgrade, authorizing end instructing the U.S. Embassy to commence negotiations regarding the sale to Yugoslavia of agricultural surpluses under PL 480. (S)
- D. Cable dated 1/27/64. This cable contains (S) information pertaining to a meeting between representatives of the various departments, agencies and White House interested in an improvement in the PL 480 program. (S)

While present in the office (S) informant discreetly attempted to observe the activities of STEVOVIC and observed that he was receiving a large sum of (S) money. In the informant's presence STEVOVIC was observed (S)

Regarding the recent incident in Chicago involving an attack on VENCESLAV VUROVIC, Secretary, and threats to NIEGLA REAJIBOVIC, informant advised that ERAJIBOVIC is currently in Washington, D.C., in fear of his life. KEAJIBOVIC came to Washington, D.C., to inform regarding the situation in Chicago and expects that semeone will attempt to kill him upon his return. (5)

According to Soviet information, President JOHNSON had personally exerted his influence in the sale of wheat to the USER and the question of the most favored nation. It was noted also that the U.S. is more realistic in its outlook on the world today.
