SYNOPSIS OF FACTS: <p style="text-align: center;">MORSCHCHILSKY and Mrs. LARIN registered Plaza Hotel, Laredo, Texas, June 3, 1941, occupying separate rooms. MORSCHCHILSKY contacted U. S. Immigration Service for name of Immigration Inspector in Charge at Corpus Christi. Obtained Mexican Visa at Laredo on June 5, 1941 and proceeded to Mexico with Mrs. LARIN in latter's 1941 Chrysler Convertible Coupe, N.Y. License # 2B 9937. Baggage searched by U. S. Customs, Laredo prior to departure from U. S. but nothing of subversive nature found.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">- L. A. The letter went on to relate that exposed films were found and that other investigation was being made by Mr. CLEMENTS of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

On June 3, 1941, Mexican Consul JAVIER OSORRIO and Vice Consul S. M. PEREIRA, informed that the consulate had issued that day to MOHRENSCHILDT as GEORGE SERGIUS VON MOHRENSCHILDT, a Mexican Visa # 167. MOHRENSCHILDT had presented a Polish Passport and a Re-entry permit to the United States. He stated he was going to Mexico to produce a travelogue for Facts Film Inc., New York City and he gave as a reference Lic. MIGUEL YARZA, Calle Tiber # 6, Mexico City. He expected to be in Mexico six months.

At approximately 1:40 P.M., June 3, 1941, Subject and Mrs. LARIN arrived at the International Bridge enroute to Mexico. In accordance with arrangements made with WILLIAM A. PETTY, Chief Inspector of U. S. Customs, they were stopped by Customs Inspector H. G. SONNELL and requested to bring all their baggage into the Customs Inspection station which they did. They were traveling in a 1941, grey, Chrysler Convertible Coupe, motor number 80137, serial number 7936296, 1941 New York license number 5 H 9937. This car belonged to Mr. LARIN, according to papers in her possession.

The baggage was personally inspected by Mr. PETTY in Agent's presence and papers or documents found by Mr. PETTY were handed to Agent for examination. Mrs. LARIN carried a large, black purse, the contents of which were examined by the matron. The purse contained about five thousand dollars worth of jewelry, a small sum of money, Mrs. LARIN'S passport and car papers.

The search was concluded about 2:20 P.M.. Nothing of a subversive nature was found. No trouble was experienced during the search. However, during the latter part of the search, MOHRENSCHILDT, at Mrs. LARIN'S suggestion asked for Agent's name and official position as well as that of Mr. PETTY'S. This information was immediately given them. Just before subject and Mrs. LARIN left, Mrs. LARIN returned to the inspection station and asked for SONNELL'S name and position.
