CUBAN REVOLUTIONARY ACTIVITIES We now enclose for your information a brief account The two persons believed to be of some arms in the Cayman Islands. Cubans, who arrived in Cayman on 26 October originally gave their names as Alberto BLANCO and Antonio GUZMAN (correspondence resting with your memorandum 12613 dated 10 November, 1958 refers). [Since the of the attached report we have learnt that their correct names are Alberto Crescendo de la Crus Menendez and Oswaldo antonio Castell y The name of the third person in the plane is said to be alberto, but no other particulars Sout him are known. I'r. Stanley of he United States Customs in Miami already has details of this affair. On the 12 November Nr. Stanley accompanied the Head of Jamaica Special Rranch to Cayman to interview Charles HORNEL. HOWEL was referred to in the enclosure to your memorandum 12624 dated 21 November, 1958. NOV 28 1958:

on 26th October, 1958 a private Beech-craft plant arrived in Cayman piloted by an American, Charles William NONIEL. He said that he was an a flight from Tampa to the Caicos Islands and he was accompanied by three other people, HOMMEL left the following day, leaving two of his passangers in Cayman without their luggage or passports, the excuse being that his plans was everweight. The two persons left behind in Cayman were Alberto Luis MENNIEZ who said he was a Gustamalan lawyer and lived at 1920 Hichigan Avenue, Mismi and Antonio Gusman VALDEZ, a citizen of the Republic of Hommers and an importer and exporter living at 1918 S.V. Third Avenue, Mismi. It is now believed that these two men are in fact Cubans. While in Cayman, they are known to have been in centact with Luis NOOALES of 212 S.V. 18 Court, Mismi and Domingo POETELD of 950 S.V. Second Street, Apartment 1, Mismi. The name of the third passenger who left with HOMMEL, on 27th October is not known.

- 2. On let November, 1958, one, Roberto Bismerk Martines GUZMAN, who denied any relationship with Antonio GuZMAN VALVEZ, arrived in the Cayman Islands by a schooluled LACSA flight from Miami. He gave MENEROEZ and VALUEZ money, telling them he had been sent by HORMEL. Roberto Bismark Martines GUZMAN left Cayman the same day for Missai.
 - 3. On 5th Movember a quantity of error, including an antitank rifle and sub machine guns were discovered near the air strip in Cayman. The previous day MENENDEZ and VALDEZ had been served with deportation orders. When the arms were discovered they were interrogated and said that when they had arrived on 26th October, they had unloaded the arms from the plane which HORIEL was piloting, hidden them and intended to move them on to Cuba. It is suspected, although there is no evidence to support it so far, that these two men intended to seize the Cayman Brac Airways twin-engine aircraft from the hanger at Cayman Airport and fly it to Cuba.

On 9th November MORMAL returned to Coyman from Florida in a chartered aircraft, in spite of the fact that he was en bail for a violation of the United States Customs law.
