On February 21, 1975, FABIAN went to Newark and while under FBI physical surveillance, participated in a meeting held by Cuban exiles. On February 23, 1975, he returned to Miami. FABIAN said the bombing of the Red Chinese Building was called off because of FBI security measures. He said that for further military operations MIM would issue press releases under the name of The Commandos of the 13th of March.

On March 14, 1975, FABIAN said he planned to operate a training camp in Central Florida and recruited 10 men to be trained in the use of explosives.

On March 25, 1975, a fire was started at the Colombian Consulate, Washington, D.C., and on March 28, 1975, MIM claimed responsibility, although there was no corroborating evidence and other exile organizations doubted the MIM claim.

On April 2, 1975, FABIAN was interviewed by Special Agents of the FBI, wherein he claimed his organization had 13 members in Miami, five in New Jersey and disclaimed any knowledge of bombing or terrorist plans by his group.

HECTOR DURAN (u)

HECTOR DURAN is the Cultural Attache assigned to the Chilean Embassy in Washington, D.C., and in May, 1975, began meeting with Cuban exiles in Miami. He stated his purpose was to organize Cuban exiles in cells to operate in assassinations and bombings against government of Cuba diplomats and embassies. He also told Cuban exiles that he is a colonel in the government of Chile Intelligence Service.

On May 22, 1975, a detective of the Dade County Public Safety Department, Miami, reported that DURAN had a meeting on that day wherein he suggested that Cuban exiles form into a group known as the Cuban Anti-Communist League (LAAC). They also discussed plans for military activities against the government of Cuba. Among the independent Cuban exile action leaders who attended were RAMIRO DE LATE, HIRAM GONZALEZ, JAVIER CEVERA and JOSE ALEMAN.

At a meeting held in Miami on May 27, 1975, the group decided that a naval action against the government of

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
