Title: John F. Kennedy Records Collection

Act of 1992 (the Act)

Synopsis: The JFK Task Force requests each Field Office to conduct a new indices search for any additional information related to President John F. Kennedy's assassination that may have been placed on record since the previous search, and to search their offices, storage areas, or archived files for any documents or information related to President John F. Kennedy's assassination. Dallas, Chicago, New Orleans and Miami are requested to include RAs in their search for records.

Details: In 1992, Congress signed the Act mandating federal agencies to release all documents concerning the presidential assassination or information related by conspiracy theory to the assassination. The Act narrowly defined the types of information that agencies could still protect by postponement until the year 2017. The Act also established the Assassination Records Review Board (the Board) as a separate entity to oversee the release of material from the federal agencies to the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA). Beyond the Board's oversight responsibilities, the Act charged the Board with the duties of reviewing agencies' proposed postponements with their evidence for approval or denial and researching additional areas of information for new material related to the assassination. The FBI has been working with the Board since its inception to meet the requirements of the Act.

On November 29, 1996, the Board wrote a letter to the FBI setting forth a formal compliance program. The letter requested the FBI's cooperation with the Board "in discharging its responsibility of assuring Congress and the American people that the goals of the JFK Act will be accomplished to the greatest reasonable extent." The compliance program is the Board's answer to demonstrating "to the American public that a thorough, good-faith, and diligent effort have been made to locate and release all remaining assassination-related records within the control of the United States Government (and that the

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Government is not hiding any such materials from public disclosure)." With this philosophy in mind, the JFK Task Force met with the Board's FBI staff researchers on January 15, 1997, to clarify the Board's expectations of the FBI.

At this meeting the Board explained that part of their mission is to provide a thorough explanation of the FBI's records system, indices, definitions of documents, searches requested, and responses of the searches. The FBI wrote and sent an initial compliance letter in June 1997 that defined the FBI's records system and all the tasks performed to date. Even with this letter, the Board believes that although the FBI searched the Central Records System (CRS) and requested the field offices to search their indices for documents related to the assassination, that a presumption exists that some documents may be found only in tickler files and field office archives. Also, additional assassination related information may have been placed on record since previous searches of field office indices were conducted.
