Reference is made to my communication dated April 2, 1963.

On April 2, 1963, two officials of the 30th of November Revolutionary Movement, an anti-Castro organization, furnished the following information in this matter: (U)

On February 9, 1963, the "Wasp," a boat belonging to the 30th of November Revolutionary Movement, left Miami, Florida, en route to Elbow Key, Bahamas. The following individuals were aboard this boat: (U)

- Jorge Santana
- Sergio Sanchez
- Jesus Fernandez Hernandez
- Eleno Oviedo Alvarez
- Emelio Viera Mollineda
- Juan Reyes Morales

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The "Wasp" arrived near Elbow Key on February 10, 1963. In the distance two boats were seen but it was not known whether these boats were from Miami or from Cuba but they appeared to be Sigma-type fishing vessels. No contact was had between the "Wasp" and these boats. Also encountered was a large commercial fishing vessel identified as the "Second White Star of Caibarien." This boat was in the area fishing and when approached the crew identified themselves as being from Miami and Cuban exiles. Sometime later two large American commercial fishing vessels with American crews arrived and loaned the "Second White Star of Caibarien" some gasoline. Thereafter the two American boats departed. The "Wasp" had made no previous arrangements to meet any of these boats and their being there was incidental to the "Wasp's" being at Elbow Key.

The "Wasp" then put ashore on Elbow Key, Oviado Alvarez, Viera Mollineda, and Reyes Morales, along with arms and equipment. These three individuals were to guard the arms which had been buried and hidden there until the "Wasp" could go to Miami and return with another small launch. The launch that the "Wasp" originally brought was to be used to infiltrate these three individuals into Cuba. However, the launch was damaged and sunk off Elbow Key and the plan to use it was abandoned. With the exception of the three individuals left on Elbow Key the entire crew of the "Wasp" returned aboard that vessel to Miami. (U)

About February 20, 1963, the Cuban press reported that the three persons left on Elbow Key along with five other individuals not known to the 30th of November Revolutionary Movement were captured by the Cuban Government. With the exception of the three individuals that were left on the island, the 30th of November Revolutionary Movement believes that the other five persons captured were fishermen and had no knowledge or anything to do with the infiltration plan. (U)

On February 25, 1963, several members of the 30th of November Revolutionary Movement rented a plane and visited Elbow Key in an effort to find evidence of what happened to their three members. They ascertained that all of the arms and ammunition previously buried there were still there except for three pistols, a rifle, a portable radio receiver and some pots and pans. (U)

After the news of the capture of the eight individuals was received Roy Hargraves, an American adventurer and mercenary and close friend of Oviado Alvarez, came to the office of the 30th of November Revolutionary Movement and sought details of the capture along with pictures of the individuals and other evidence so that he could engender publicity which would facilitate the collection of money to be used to free those captured. The 30th of November Revolutionary Movement declined Hargraves offer and put him out of the office. Neither Hargraves nor his associates, soldier of fortune and mercenary Gerald Patrick Hemming, or Miami attorney Charles R. Ashmann, had any previous knowledge of the infiltration plan, did not participate in it and had no connection with it. According to the above-mentioned officials, Ashmann's announcements to the press and television are completely untrue. (U)

On April 2, 1963, the captain of a fishing vessel which is the sister ship of the "Second White Star of Caibarien" was interviewed. He advised he personally knew each member of the crew of the "Second White Star of Caibarien" and identified five of them whose pictures appeared in the Cuban press among the eight captured as crew members of this vessel. He did not know the other three members reported captured by the Cubans who were identified above as members of the 30th of November Revolutionary Movement. ~~(S)~~ (u)

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
