1. On 26 November 1956 DEP and COS invited Francisco DEL RIO Canndo, Mexican Ambassador to the Dominican Republic, to lunch to discuss the tendency of the Dominican Republic's Motion Picture Censorship Board to declare Mexican films as unfit for public consumption. Present at lunch was Mr. Bruce TILLOTSON of Mississippi who is Columbia Pictures representative in the Dominican Republic and who handles many Mexican films.

2. From the conversation above it was learned that approximately 35% of Mexican films were being banned by the Dominican Government whereas films from the United States, Italy, Spain, etc., were generally getting by without difficulty. DEP and COS claimed that many of the French and Italian films were far more liberal than the Mexican films.

3. Francisco DEL RIO stated that there were groups in existence which had a vested interest in painting the Dominican Government as being pro-Communist. COS asked what groups these were. DEL RIO stated that COS knew very well who these were. He indicated that some American business men (mentioning VANCE L. FAMILY and Harry GOLDWYN) were very active in spreading information about Mexico. He stated that he and his wife became the Mexican Government was very sympathetic, however, that he and most Mexicans could not understand the lack of appreciation of some of the United States' actions in Mexico. He thus felt he lacked our heavily biased information and offered that for the United States to consider the situation truly and correctly so as to eradicate the Communists from the world as a danger of democracy and to call for the strongest possible action by the United Nations.

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against Britain and France in order to establish among the world that the United States would not stand by them. He also argued that the United States had become so alien from alliance with Mexico so necessarily, spiritually, and financially bankrupt.

4. At this point ESENIN lost patience with DEL RIO's language and began to question severely DEL RIO's judgment and reasoning. DEL RIO made an abrupt retreat and switched back to the subject of the Mexican Government's and US continuing friendship for and cooperation with the United States.

5. When the conversation got back to Mexican files, DEL RIO stated that he could see no reason whatsoever for such tight censorship. He felt that multilateral international procedure should be placed on the Dominicans to force them to run a fairer and less discriminatory censorship. However, he objected to having Mexican files highlighted as the major victim. He did see the Mexican to be singled out as the chief protester.

6. To date nothing has been done, to COS' knowledge, about Mexican files.

7. COS comments again that his observation of practices DEL RIO condones leads him to believe that this man consistently speaks on morality, justice, democracy, etc., but uses this jargon to his own personal advantage without meaning a word of what he says. Perhaps DEL RIO might be one of the most unjust, immoral, and undemocratic characters in the local diplomatic corps.
