1. Since the referenced meeting, we have had both business and social contacts with [REDACTED]. In an effort to help him get started in his new agency activities in Copenhagen, we have introduced him to a number of our friends and friends around the town. From these it is hoped that [REDACTED] will be able to widen his circle of friends and establish his patterns of activity in the shortest possible time. Among others, we have introduced him to one of the chief editors of the Frederiksberg Højskole, for whom he may have the opportunity to write some articles and also to establish contacts within local journalistic circles. He is also widening the circle of his own friends and acquaintances, some of whom might be interesting when more is known about them. They are in the field of literature or are students preparing for careers in the Danish Foreign Service.

2. [REDACTED] is still ineffective as a letdown and his flat, reportedly reported, cannot be considered presently useful as a safe house. So far, however, he is looking around for a permanent flat for the remainder of the year. We do believe on the type of flat which would be most useful operationally. No discussion on the subject of SECRET consideration for such a flat has been initiated. Unless N/I runs short of funds or his flat is used quite extensively to his considerable inconvenience, we feel at this point that it is an unnecessary expenditure. He will naturally absorb all his operating expenses, as well as to occasionally give him a little liquor, which we are quite certain will be most appreciated.

3. [REDACTED] is planning to enroll formally in the University next summer. This is strongly encouraged as student membership in various campus organizations and activities is then open to him. In fact the better [REDACTED] is the student milieu in Copenhagen the more he regrets not getting to Copenhagen earlier and enrolling in the Graduate School during the beginning of the year. He began to talk about staying an extra year in Copenhagen (at Harvard) for a study grant to Harvard for next year does not occur to us. Considering his SECRET residence, then we feel it is doubly important for N/I to remain in the University. We say this because it has been our observation that even the most erudite students have tend to become bored with the city in a comparatively short time, unless they can carry their life style and academic studies elsewhere. As we have indicated in other correspondence, [REDACTED] is already beginning to manifest itself in some of the bullock's eye signs. We shall make an effort to see that this does not infect [REDACTED]. Our suggestion is to give N/I access to certain information on the Institute of Mathematics of the University of Copenhagen. If you will recall in [REDACTED] up from [REDACTED], we suggested to do this last year with [REDACTED], one of which were less than satisfactory. [REDACTED] has done well, and, after introducing himself to some of the students there, is in a position to provide him with other contacts in addition to the Institute of Mathematics. It is to all means of the chief of staff to keep [REDACTED] in close contact with [REDACTED], and to provide a situation of the [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] to [REDACTED].

4. Visiting the Institute for the first time, [REDACTED] last night informed [REDACTED] (the Director of the Institute of Mathematics) that he had been invited to [REDACTED] for a meeting on [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] on [REDACTED].

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KUMLER is said to be a good student and has been in the Soviet Union for about 10 years. He is said to be a member of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union. He is said to be a good student and is not interested in politics.

KUMLER, whose parents are both from St. Petersburg, Russia, was born in St. Petersburg, Russia, in 1907, and died in the beginning of 1930. He is said to be about 30 years old now, but he came to Copenhagen in the summer of that year and remained there for about a year. At that time his wife, Anna, was about to give birth to their first child, and he left the Soviet Union to go to Copenhagen in the fall of 1930. During 1930 (or) 1931 he lived with an uncle in Paris, France, where he studied the French language and culture. From Paris he went to Berlin, Germany, and after taking his examinations in Berlin quite well and after taking his examinations in Berlin, he would like to continue his studies or go back to the United States to teach the language. His wife still resides in April 1941, and after that money will be a problem. He stated that he likes Russian literature, but not the Soviet writers because they are compelled to write to conform to the Party line of socialist realism.

(2) Above biographical information on KUMLER was obtained from an initial talk between [redacted] and KUMLER. Before we checked our station files, KUMLER told us a good project. He still should not be ruled out. Not knowing about the material in the files, we told [redacted] at our meeting on the 23rd to go ahead and cultivate KUMLER. We gave him a good briefing on that information he should elicit and how he should pursue this target. [redacted] has arranged a dinner for evening, 29 November, with KUMLER and should be able to provide a much better assessment of him at our next meeting. [redacted] initial assessment, which is likely to be given to pursue this lead, is that KUMLER is a technically inclined person, but not educated up to his potential. He is inclined to be a communist and a bit lonely. He is not too refined in his mannerisms. [redacted] said that KUMLER had some American friends in Copenhagen, but they were not "regular students." [redacted] then explained to us the type of environment from which KUMLER came (and with whom he is familiar) and said that it was his opinion that this could very well account for the impression of himself which KUMLER gave to others.

3. After our next meeting with [redacted] in which we should get a much clearer picture of KUMLER, we should be able to tell whether this lead is fully viable, and if it looks promising, complete traces will be requested from Copenhagen. After the engineer's contact with KUMLER, [redacted] has been instructed to keep up the contact but not to pursue it aggressively, until he has further instructions. Regardless of how this lead turns out, it will be valuable practice and experience for [redacted], which is, we believe, worth while.
