- 1. On 4 March 1955 Emilio MMEZ Portuondo, Cuban Ambassador to the United Nations, wrote a personal letter to Outavio MARMENA, Panamanian Minister of Foreign Relations. The writer stated that after seven months in the Ministry of Labor, during which tire he met and solved many problems, President RATISIA and offered him his choice of any Ministry, the Embassy in Washington, or continuation as the Cuban Ambassador to the United Nations. NUMEZ said that he chose the latter post and that it was in that capacity that he was writing to PARAGEA.
- 2. He then recalled that in the U. M. General Assembly of last year Onla and aspired to a seat on the Security Joinell and had the promise of the support of Panama in this matter. However, Cuba had bowed out at this time when Peru claimed precedence in its right to a seat on the Security Council. At this time Guba announced its desire for the seat on the Security Council in the General Assembly scheduled to meet in November 1955.
- 3. NUMEZ then said that Cuba, through its diplomatic representatives, is seliciting support in this matter and that because at the present there is no other Latin American member of the y. N. with similiar aspirations he does not anticipate any conflicts of interest. He stated that to date their request for support had been replied to affirmatively by Chile, Argentina, Honduras, Haiti, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, El Salvador, and Peru.
- 4. NUNEZ then asked FARREGA to reply favorably as quickly as possible to the Cuban request for support in this matter and added that, because of the excellent relations which they have always maintained, if he becomes a nember of the Security Council, PARREDA may consider that he will represent Penara as well as Cuba. NUMEZ continued by raminding FADRIMA that due to recommendations made by NUMEZ Cuba voted in the General Assembly for Ricardo/AIFARO, Panararian jurist, for a position on the International Court of Justice as well as a position on the International Law Corrission when this was requested by the Pararanian Government.
