The report referred to in [redacted] is summarized in the following paragraphs.

Joseph Henri VINCENT was born in Belgium on 21 February 1901. He has of Belgian nationality and resided at rue de Campine 22, Liège, having established residence in France on 12 August 1942. His wife, Marie Thérèse BIRAN, was born in Wallonia, Belgium, on 15 January 1901. She is a Belgian national. [redacted] received the information in this report was prepared from [redacted] documents. He also received a report from Francis Marcel NUY referring to the divorce of Joseph VINCENT, having divorced Jeanne GUYFFLET in the court of Liège on 23 August 1946 in Liège, France. BIRAN gave birth to a son, [redacted] on 18 October 1948 (to the date of marriage) and to another, Jean, on 18 October 1949.

1. The first record of VINCENT's participation in business is his registration with the Registre de Commerce in Liège on 1 June 1923 as a businessman engaged in the sale of electrical material. At his home, then located at 107 rue de Famy in Montegnée. After its marriage to BIRAN, VINCENT transferred his business to 81 rue Noyaux, Liège, where he established a shop for optical and chrome plating. On 1 April 1926 he withdrew his commercial registration in Liège. He was declared bankrupt on 1 June 1928. Following a judgment for the separation of the marital community, BIRAN took over her husband's commercial registration on 1 March 1929. The registration at the time was modified to show that BIRAN was engaged in the purchase and sale of ferrous and non-ferrous metals, electrical material, ferrous metals and the assembly of electrical equipment for the [redacted] at present his [redacted] business at Quai St. Lambert, Liège.

Insofar as VINCENT's official records [redacted] [redacted] [redacted]

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- a. Since 1952 he has been suspected by Belgian authorities in Liège of trafficking with iron curtain countries in strategic materials.
  - b. In 1952 he was implicated in an affair involving the theft of nickel in Herstal.
  - c. In 1953 he was suspected by the authorities of having dealt in the smuggling of demonetized pieces of local currency.
  - d. In January 1954 he received a court summons involving a charge by the frauds section of the Parquet de Liège that he was implicated in a fraudulent transaction which concerned a shipment of cast iron instead of ordered nickel to an Advert firm. He was sentenced on this charge by the Correctional Court of Liège on 22 October 1954 to a suspended prison term of four months and a fine of 100 Belgian francs.
  - e. On 23 March 1954 VINCENT was arrested in Luxembourg on the charge of having participated with Jose Marie HANGEL and Jan HAAGLOREN in the fraudulent exportation of nickel. (Luxembourg ODACID reported in July 1954 that the arrestees were released on bail in June 1954. [CFRA-1759] indicates that HAAGLOREN succeeded in fleeing to Switzerland on 22 15 November 1954. The result of the case as far as VINCENT was concerned has not been reported.)

5. The [REDACTED] post in Liège has reported that BARRA is aware of her husband's business activities and approves of them. However, neither VINCENT nor BARRA is known to that post as a member of any extremist organization or as assisting any such group.
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6. It is regretted that the [REDACTED] report does not permit [REDACTED] to provide a more definitive analysis of the veracity of NYI's original story. We shall, however, report any further information which tends either to confirm or refute his claim. [REDACTED] files, as noted in [REDACTED] 151, that Luxembourg ODACID, which reported the NYI story originally, should be requested by ODACID to provide an evaluation of NYI and otherwise contribute to determining whether or not the story has any basis in fact.
