MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

SUBJECT: "American Defectors to the USSR"

- l. The attached material was part of a soft file entitled "American Defectors to the USSR", which was set up by SR/6 (Support) around 1960 and maintained by various SR components until ca. 1963. The compilations were derived from a variety of sources, and contain both classified and overt data.
- 2. In the fall of 1966, the files were turned over to CI Staff. In most instances, basic information was then abstracted for the US Defector Machine Program. In all instances in which the material was unique, or represented a valuable collation effort, it has been incorporated into the appropriate 201 file, along with a copy of this memorandum.
- 3. It is suggested that any dissemination of this data should be coordinated with SB Division and with CI Staff (CI/MRO), in view of the frequently inadequate sourcing and of the fact that disseminations have already been made through the US Defector Machine Program.

All entries through May 1962 come from 201 unless otherwise noted.

Circa 6-lk March 1959. He made preliminary trip to Moscow in connection with planning the Mand exhibit for next summer's U.S. fair.

Circa 3 May - late June 1959. Second trip to Moscow to help set up the Rand exhibit. Went steady with Vera PD TONOVA, married, hostess at Hotel Ukraina/corrector for a Soviet correspondence school's English language department/English teacher at Medical Institute. She always met him outside so that colleagues would not know she dating American, but somebody knew because she usually had to request permission to take evening off - and she always got it. Always had the taxi leave her near but not at her home, and allowed nothing more than one kiss, at end of evening. He told her his wife didn't understand him, etc., and that he would come back to Moscow and marry her. Her name also reported as Vera evanovna IVCHENKO, probably her maidenname. The night possibly be identical with Vera PLOTNIKOVA, reported in OO-B-3,140,059 of 24 Mept 1859 (SR/OS/BIO) as a 20-year old elevator eperator at the Ukraina; she became very friendly with the source's wife (Aussian-speaking) but asked her not to show friendliness in public, met her elsewhere to takk, snared confidences, spoke poor to fair English.

3 July 1959. His third trip to the UCCR. he had about six pieces of luggare, crammed with hylon hose, Ella Fitzgerald records, copies of U.S. magazines, etc., and several boxes of books, but "he did not take heavy clothing because he felt this might look suspicious" iii He had no trouble whatsoever with Coviet customs, and he went out with Vera on his first night back.

Circa 11 July 1959. He joined two high Poviet exhibit officials at their restaurant table at the fair and told then he wanted to defect. They arranged meeting few days later with government representatives POPOV and SHISHKIN - for dinner at Praga [a favorite AGB hangout]. 3/2 CF

Circa 15 July 1959. Under influence of vodka and food at Praga, wrote letter to tuprese doviet requesting stay as Soviet citizen. P.POV said not to tell anyone, since answer might take a while. Gave him questionnaire to take back to hotel and fill out: biog plus reasons for defection.

14 August 1959. Sent his wife a telegram saying had sold 100 units, which untrue.

Awast 1959. More meetings in private rooms at nico restaurants. The coviets impressed on him that if he stayed he could never leave. Questioning included debricfing by two chemists to see if he really could make the spray gun (for plastic coating jobs) demonstrated at Rand exhibit; jokes about but ing him instead of gun.

Late August 1959. Wife cabled him asking if he coming back. She wanted to know so that she could decide whether to put the children into usual school (if he coming home) or move to her parents! home and get them in school there (if he not). He cabled to go shead and out them into usual school.

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2 tendence 1950. POTOV met him at etropol routeurant and told him he had been accepted. This was just after closing of fair and three days before Rand group to leave for home. Plasked where he would like to work and when we said Hoscow informed him it would be teningrad. (W later told in Rand and Consul Unyder that he had been offered work in many cities.) It requested a vacation; graded. Reeting with POPOV and CHICHTE on subway steps: arrangements for W to get away from Rand group without being noticed.

10 September 1959. Sent to Leningrad with interpreter Volodya [see also Ricciardelli case]. Siven 1000 old rubles and provided more. Let by Aleksey of Inturist in Leningrad. Bept changing hotels so that Name provided get him. Had left note saying planned travel around USCR before returning, but they smelled a rat and were trying to locate him anymay. Volodya stayed there with him; went sightseeing, applied for job at Leningrad Scientific Research Institute. He was allowed to call Vera, who came right up and brought the rest of his baggage; affair began.

Circa mid-Uctober 1959. Returned to Moscow.

16 October 1959. MFA called US Embassy to say that W had assumed Soviet citizenship.

17 October 1959. Confrontation meeting at Moscow OVIR, with Hand and Snyder present. Newspaper report said it was enotional scene at Ambassy and that with said he had not yet received Soviet passport, but this probably wrong. True story seems be that will ned expatriation form, kept his U.S. passport nevertheless (on pretext that he didn't have it with him, which he really did), and followed Doviet instructions in telling Snyder that he had received Doviet passport on 21 September (which he hadn't), had defected for political reasons (which he didn't), etc. According to information in CI/DIG files, Snyder said that the only discrepancy between his story and Imbassy's facts was that he seemed horsely it normant of two phone calls he supposedly made to Hand office in Assow. We said he might have authorized them to be made in his name. Note that both calls purportedly received by Kund's Soviet emologee Galina Ivanovna REDMIKIANA while she alone in office.

October 1959. A Mashington Post article of 21 May 1962 said that he changed his mind after only three months in the USCR and went to the Embassy for a S... reentry permit, but that it was turned down and he had to wait a year to reapply. [In the light of other reports, this seems thoroughly garbled and to be disregarded.]

Circa 18 October 1959. Irrediately or shortly after the confrontation meeting, he and Vera took off for a vacation in Sochi.

11: November 1959. The new York Times wrote that he had written his parents he was planning to marry a poviet girl.

Circa 18 Extendental November 1959. After a month in Sochi, he and Vera returned to settle in Feningrad. Vera was his assistant and translator, and according to Rand (how would be know ?) she got about 2000 mibles a month. He was assigned to make the spray gun, at a salary of 2 00 a nonth plus semi-annual bomus of 500-600 mibles, this was equal to the salary of the chief of Lab #5 where he worked. Late December 1959 or early warrany 1960. Received Soviet internal passport.

27 Jamuary 1960. Received 6 Lecember letter from his father telling him his mother now in mental hospital because of his defection and reminding him of responsibility for his children, etc. He decided go how but told no one.

3 March 1960. He wrote father asking help to return home and asking why his father hadn't replied to his 5 February letter (which the father had never gotten).

13 and 16 harch 1960. He wrote his father that the family should come visit him in the UCR. About this time hand advised the father to get Wis phone number so that they could talk to him.

1 April 1960. Rand reported receiving a wire from W giving his phone in Leningrad as G-23705. This was phone at lab, where father called him 2 Apr.

5 April 1960. We wrote his father that he would be in boscow for the May ba, celebrations and would call at the ampassy. He full certain of returning to the i... and told father not to come visit him after all.

24 April 1:60. Rand telephoned to who confirmed desire return U.S.

The Mar 1960. Volodya had arran ed invitation for W and Vera to Moscow parade. Ade. Went. No mention Powers.

him 1760. He visited U.S. Dessy, were not challenged by foriet guards leaves of American appearance. Cayder told him how go about getting exit visa. 73 March 1967. Cleveland Plain Lealer article said that when he last wrote Rankly he had job in mostov-on-lon, also write Lept xxixxixxxxx aides said in again; ton today that this is the first case of its kind in which the aussians have granted an exit visa. This inaccurate: he was never even in Roctov-on-lon so far as is known, and Oswald for one had already been granted an exit permit. (CI/CIG)

24 March 1962. Quit work, thinking about to leave.

May 1962. He was met by no one upon arrival in Moscow. Remained to small hotel where presented note from Vera asking for cheap room. He had not learned any Russian.

18 May 1962. Traded woviet internal passport for exit passport, at OVIR. Meanwhile ran out of money. Were sent him some from meningrad.

Later in May. Received money and plane ticket from father. Seturned Vera's loan plus extra, via LP correspondent.

20 May 1962. Arrived in U.S. under alien quota. Extensively debriefed by CIA, FOI, etc. Psych assessment that he unemotional, not the type to learn from experience, thou, htless of many others' feelings, might be bought off by Soviets if in need.
