1. Reference is made to the report of Special Agent Scott F. GELELILING, dated 30 November 1963, Field office File Somber: DALLAS (89-43), Subject Let MARVEY US-ALD; Assaumation of a resident JOHN FITZGERALD EUNNEBY, 11/22/03, Dallas, Texas. This communication reported an interview by your office of a rageorge. A. Bullit on 23 November 1703 in which & r. EUlik referred to a Lydia Ulk TRUF of Fort Sorth, Texas, who allegedly had associated with Marina N. COWALD.

2. The files of this Agency contain the following pertinent information on one Lydia DYM ITAUK who may be identical with the Lydia DIM YTRUK referred to above:

a. Lydia (nee BERDYANSKAYA and BERJANSKAYA) DYNITRUK

was born on 3 April 1725 in Kortey, "Kin. the renained in Rostoy

with her parents until one was 10, when she was departed by the

Germans to a work camp in Germany. Then the war ended she entered

a camp for displaced persons in Dresseldorf, Germany, where she

met and married one Farel Lodwijk VZRHELST, a Belgian citizen.

With her busband she entered Belgium at an unknown date and resided
in Antwerp. Reportedly she was a member of the Union of Soviet

latriots in Belgium from 1948 to 1952. Sometime in early 1952,

while still married to VERHELST, Lydia began living with Vasiliy

Gavrilovich (aka lavel) AUSTENAU in Brussels. A Belgian Folice

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t kist Saves set tricks Arrests Februites investigation of her relationship with PQ Tabilic resulted in her being fined for adultery in the temper 1952. The was divorced by VLANELST in November 1953 and continued living with non-Tabilica, apparently as common-law wife, until late 1954 or 1955.

[Vasilly Cavrilovich (ala navel) ... 5715kd, allegedly born on 5 september 1/22 in 1.12, Jun, served in the soviet Army in World War II before juicing the Vianeuv forces in fighting against the 'ovicts. 'fter the war no lived in Cernany and lielgium and was active in several anti-Communist nussian en ire or amantions inclose, the ! ational .abor 'lliance (i-la). In 1955 r. USI 5 Ni. 3 was identified as a soviet agent in claudestine contact with the Soviet Lr. cassy in Prussels. He was expelled from the NTS in February . 757 and on 20 August 1)57 he left Brussels for k.oscow. In a radio oroadcast from : ast Berlin on 17 Leptember .757 sponsored by the poviet Cummittee for Return to the itometand, r. \$1 above bitterly attacked nussian entire organizations in the Fest. I rior to leaving Belgium. for the USER BUILLIAND reportedly revealed that he had worked for Soviet intelligence since . 342 and that he was trained in the Soviet Union for intelligence work and disjatched to the west as a Soviet agent.]

- b. On 27 June 1956, in Ixelles, a suburb of Brussels, 1 ydia married havel DYN.ITRUN who was born 2r February 1924 in Stariye-Dorohi, USAR [Stariye-Dorogi, Belorussian SSH], and who was described as a Belorussian student at the university of Louvain in Belgium. At an unknown date, possibly before his narriage to Lydia, Favel DYMITRUN immigrated to the United States. It was reported that is July 1957 he returned to Evigium to attempt to expedite a visa for Lydia to join him in the United States. As of August 1957, DYMITRUM's U.S. residence was listed as 159 Last Division Street, Focklord, Lichigan.
- c. In an interview in February 1357 in Antwerp, Belgium, concerning her application for a visa to the United States, Lydia DYMITRUK disclosed tast:
 - (1) Her father managed a maceroni factory in Rostov-Don during the war and did not serve in the army. In 1945 he was arrested by the RKVD and held for five or six months on a

/charge concerning his

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charge concerning his activities during the war (Lydiz claimed that she was unaware of the exact charges made against her father). He was also removed from his position as n anager of the macaroni factory.

- (2) She wrote to her mother often and occasionally received correspondence from her. Her mother is glad that Lydia is in the West.
- (3) She had been associated with the Union of Soviet Fatriots for about two years but denied knowing that the Union of Soviet Fatriots was politically motivated or was in contact with the Communist Fatty of Eelgium.
- (4) Her visa application, which she submitted on 27 July 1956, was drawn up for her by her husband, I avel DYN.ITRUK. In filling out the application form her husband had indicated a negative response to a question concerning association with a Communist Farty or an organization affiliated with a Communist Farty because she had not been "an actual member" of the Union of Soviet Fatriots, and furthermore, it was her husband's belief that she was not a Communist.
- (5) She arrived in Brussels from Antwerp in February 1952 and lived with her sister, Annia BCUCHAT, for several months. Her sister was in contact with one (Inu) & ARKACHUK, an officer with the Soviet Repatriation Mission in Brussels who had been attempting to have the sister repatriate to the Soviet Union. Shortly after her arrival at her sister's, a woman from Liege (not further identified), gave her an address to go to for aid in resettling in Brussels. Lydia went to this address and was surprised to find that it was the Soviet Repatriation Mission. There she met MARKACHUK who tried to persuade her to return to the USSR. As a result, she and her sister wrote to their mother for her opinion on the matter and the mother advised them to stay in the Wesi.

/(6) She lived with

- 3. The file of this Agency on Lydis DYL ITRUE has no entries beyond 1957 when she was still living in Eruszels.
- 4. This agancy has furnished the foregoing information to the President's Con mission on the Assassination of resident John F. Kennedy.
