at the time he left the U. S. for Russia in 1959; and his five brothers live on Long Island.

Vladimir ELOBODA is currently of interest to Security in view of his assignment (prior to his defection to the Soviet Union, via East Germany, on 3 August 1960) to the 513th Military Intelligence Group in Frankfurt, Germany, (EGIS Center). Here he had contact with at least one representative of CIA and was in a position to have learned the identities of CIA personnel at the EGIS Center.

William A. MORGAN has been of interest to Security in that on 27 March 1959, CI/OA requested a check on him, in connection with his contemplated use by the Cuban Desk/WH for purposes of contact and debriefing. However, WH cancelled its request as of 5 May 1959.

Edward NIXON, on 6 September 1960, approached a CIA agent in Freddy's Bar in Damascus and engaged him in conversation, following which our agent found himself under surveillance. The surveillance continued for two days, after which our agent was approached in Freddy's Bar by an unknown G-2 officer who asked him about NIXON; and thereafter the surveillance ceased. (The owner of Freddy's Bar had reported NIXON to G-2, as he said he was ruining his business.)

While defectors to Cuba and the UAR may not technically be defectors to Soviet Satellite countries, it seems a close thing, and the names of such known defectors in the past eighteen months have been included in this memorandum.
