

ITEM: Organizational planning of Dissident Communist Party of Greece

At Consul's Office (21 July 1972) File No. MIA 4234



1. As of mid-July 1972, the Dissident Communist Party of Greece (DKPS) was attempting to reorganize itself by establishing a new leadership in Greece. An effort will be made to hold a conference of party cadres within the next few months to determine if new leaders can be chosen from among cadre living in Greece legally. If so, the DKPS leaders living abroad will resign and the party will run from within Greece. At that time, DKPS cadre living in Greece illegally will leave the country. (Source Comment: Although the DKPS will thus be directed by legal residents, their activities on behalf of the DKPS will be illegal according to Greek law and the members could be subject to arrest.)

2. Leonidas Tsafronis, former EME Central Committee member and leading DKPS member living illegally in Greece, described his plan for the reorganization as follows:

a. Political Committee - to consist of five or six people with responsibility for establishing the party's political goals, formulating party policy regarding Greek political developments and issuing statements in the name of the DKPS.

b. Organizational Committee - to try to reactivate the former leaders of the party who now "refuse to get involved". Because of the political situation in Greece, there will be no effort made to gain mass recruitments into the party. There will be no contact between members of the Organizational and Political Committees.

c. Committee Abroad - to have its headquarters in a West European capital and to represent DKPS interests with other

3. Tzefrakis will coordinate party activities abroad and work closely for the party. (Source Cormont: Tsourelakis did not indicate his exact position he planned for the leader of two organizations.) Tsourelakis hopes to present his plan to the party leadership "in the months" and believes it will be accepted by Greeks and abroad. Tsourelakis Kyrizos is former EAM/EEAF member and former member of the United Democratic Left (UDL) Executive Committee, and Tsourelakis Hoffelidakis the former member of the old Governing Council and syndicalist, agrees with Tsourelakis plan but would prefer to wait for January 1968 before accepting it fully since Kyrizos and Tsourelakis believe they should have time to work on reorganization party, change organization, which officials will believe the party looks strong, support.

4. Kyrizos and Tsourelakis said one of their major problems is the replacement of former high and medium level party cadre to become better leaders of the DSE. These former leaders will not work with any group that wants to disperse just so long as Antonios Arvanitis is still there. Arvanitis holds leading articles in the DSEH. They agreed that if Antonios Arvanitis leaves the DSEH or goes back to Greece, Kyrizos and Tsourelakis would be able to find a suitable replacement. Kyrizos said Kostas Karamanlis (former Minister of Defense) is a man they have referred to when asked who can replace Arvanitis.

5. Tsourelakis said that imprisoned party members Dimitris Pavlou and Ilias Karayannidis and Evangelos Karayannidis (Elias) Pavlou and Karayannidis (Elias) were released from their prison cells insisting that Karamanlis and Karayannidis resign for the good of the party. Karamanlis and Karayannidis have agreed to resign when no replacements are available but until orders to leave, it appears they quit of their own volition rather than that they were adopted by the party. (Source Cormont: Tsourelakis said he believes Karamanlis and Karayannidis will put the welfare of the party ahead of their personal feelings and will resign their offices. He said that perhaps he and Karamanlis returned to Greece, they had told Karamanlis and Karayannidis of their opposition to them and had voiced their intention to express their criticism of the two office holders while in Greece. Cormont said he did not specify what his own future in the DSEH will be, but he would leave Greece when the reorganization is completed.)

6. Karamanlis said there are not more than five or six active agents of the Patriotic Antidictatorship Front (PAP) in Athens and he would lead the united resistance of the DSEH and PAP combined. Tsourelakis, a former Communist member of the ENKE who had been an Greek illegal until 1958, went word to Greece that he had failed in his submarine, through a series of conversations in Paris, to get the President of the French Republic to return a PAP member. Therefore he renounced his willingness to discuss cooperation on the basis of which the ENKE refused because it does not agree with the French who are the spear for "Yugoslav resistance". Since the day Skanderbeg died, been instructing his own people to look after him along the borders to protect and noted that the ENKE has been doing the same. Karamanlis said his followers from his past liaison in 1957 with the ENK would go to Greece to propose a candidate to replace Tsourelakis and suggested they consider Greek actress Anna Spyridon as a possible replacement. (Source Cormont: It is highly unlikely that a leftist would accept such a post.)

7. Karamanlis stayed in Athens. Sent to form Patrias Solidarity.

1. Following, for your information only, is a summary of a recent report received from the Bureau [redacted]

When requesting renewal of his passport in November 1952, [redacted] stated that it was necessary for him to return [redacted] because of business affairs. He said he wished to sell his printing plant [redacted] until September 1952, which was being operated [redacted] under a partnership agreement [redacted].

The Bureau's report also furnished information from another government agency (not identified) dated December 1951 indicating that [redacted] plant had done considerable work for the US. According to this report, [redacted] had received a [redacted] dated 17 December 1951 [redacted] director of his firm [redacted] stating that there was a possibility of a great deal of work [redacted] if [redacted] could return [redacted] to get the presses in operation.

In addition, the Bureau reported that [redacted] passport [redacted] was renewed on 9 February 1953 validated for four months only, i.e., until 8 June 1953, and limited [redacted]

1st: Wrote to Searcher, see RPA-100

2nd: Gave a dinner party for Mr. and Mrs. van Grunen (head of National Parks) and their friends. In entertaining, the custom here is to mix outsiders with "easy people, and I am following custom.

3rd: Drove to Johannesburg to lunch with the Bruce Crawfords. While there, I met Captain Johnson, representative of the USA-AEC. Stayed over for dinner, which I provided. Scotch is practically unobtainable here for non-easy people, and the local liquor is definitely sub-standard. Anyone carrying a bottle of Scotch for emergencies is voted as the man most likely to succeed.

5th: Had Seaman and wife to dinner.

7th: Drove to Johannesburg to meet William Potts (Director of Tsetse Research in Tanganyika) and R. Murphy of the Kenya Administration. Took them and the children to the Criterion night-club (sic). Potts and Murphy are on their way to French West Africa for a conference. Arranged to meet them on their way back.

8th: Mr. and Mrs. Davidge were staying with us for a day to meet a number of medical appointments which my wife had been able to arrange for them.

12th: Searcher came to Pretoria for the day. [redacted] will hope of using him. Too old now. (See RPA-100.)

13th: In the evening I called on Mrs. Grieve at her apartment but found she already had a visitor, the sub-editor of the Pretoria News. Chatted a while, then left.

14th: Gave a luncheon party at the Patriotic Club for the mining fraternity. Guests: Mr. Johnson of the U.S. Consul, Mr. L. M. Miller of the S.A. Geological Dept., Mr. Proctor, Mr. Stant, Mr. Gutstein, S.A. Geological Dept., Mr. Smith, Department of Mines, Mr. Doucet, Department of Mines, Mr. Bothma, Department of Mines, Mr. Cronje, Minister of Mines, Mr. J. H. Vosloo, S.A.R. A.S.C., Mr. Finch, Commercial Attaché, Mr. Pristic, Mineral Attaché.

Not being a member of the Pretoria club, I had to give the lunch through Birch, who is.

15th: Give a cocktail-supper party for as many as the house would hold.

18th: Picked up William Pettis and his son at the Paarlfontein Airport (fifty miles from Pretoria) at 1 A.M. Put them up for the night.

19th: Took them back to the airport. Niemanns said he had no intention of settling in Kenya after his retirement. Too much agitation among the Kikuyu natives -- too many Indians crowding the place. More and more people are saying that they see no future in Africa for the European.

22nd: Attended a big cocktail party at the Steyns (Senior). My wife met and charmed a Mr. Stoker whose husband is in charge of training the police for the rööje of South Africa. I've been wanting to cultivate police circles for some time, and this may prove to be the opening wedge. Mr. Coert Steenberg, noted sculptor; also Aubrey Roseman, painter and architect.

23rd: Had dinner with Dr. Stoker's. Met Mrs. Tregg (?) widow of a former S.A. Minister. Her and Mrs. Ferguson (?) from S.A. diplomatic service. Stoker monopolized the conversation with stiff Afrikaner views on apartheid. Restrictions on political arguments apparently don't apply to Afrikaner homes.

24th: (Sunday) Spent the day with:

25th: Picked up Sedative and gave her a bottle of Scotch and she asked me to come to her apartment and help her drink it. I will. I must find out if she is tactless or just naturally dumb. If a few drinks doesn't loosen her tongue, I'll cross her off my list.

Mrs. Roseman called and invited me and mine to a birthday party she is giving for her husband. There is something about this artistic circle that isn't altogether normal. I intend to get a more intimate acquaintance with it. Viola, (I mean Mrs. Roseman) wanted an extra girl for the party but she wouldn't have Sedative.

26th: Seamy is back from Cape Town. He seemed surprised when I told him I was now doing mineral work. He said no word had been received from Washington regarding this matter. I said no word was needed. I was keeping it in working priority on minerals and there was no reason for asking Washington's approval. With that, he brightened and said perhaps I was right, so that's the way it is. He showed me the cable sent to him March 30, which departs somewhat from yours of about the same time. His cable read in part "no objection to X existing in mineral work until Friisbie's arrival at which time he can devote full time to primary mission with cover well established." Our liaison officer might point out to the Department that covers must be maintained as well as established.

27th: Attended a cocktail party given by Major Morgan to welcome the military group just returned from Germany. Met, and talked with: Brig. First, British Military Liaison Officer; Captain Glass, Asst't British Military Advisor; Commodity Dean, who figured prominently in the recent U.S. military reshuffle; Douglas Culinan, son of Sir Thomas Culinan of diamond fame, and very wealthy in his own right. Glass and Culinan seemed interested in furthering the acquaintanceship. Will do.

28th: Visited Sedative in her apartment from 3 P.M. until 6 P.M. A scotch and soda, even though she sipped it with surprising moderation, seemed to relax her inhibitions. It untied her tongue but not to the point of loquacity. I learned something of her background: a Bohemian circle, frequently centering around her, broke up as the artist members married one by one. I sensed a bitterness, a disillusionment and many unspoken reproaches against herself as well as against others. She now has a 'fiance' but he does not seem to loom very large on the landscape. Before leaving I led the conversation to myself. She said she hadn't seen him for some time, then added that she would get in touch with him, presumably to do more probing in the buff.

29th: Attended a party at Aubrey Roseman's. When, at 2:30 A.M., the harder-guests prepared to make a night of it, we left. The group, artistically inclined, was settling down for a reading of quaint, erotic tales.

30th: Drove to Johannesburg to pick up Mr. and Mrs. Angus Collie, then to Germistown to attend the races with the Alex Wise's. In the evening Wise gave a party, following which we drove back to Johannesburg and spent the night with the Collie's.

I would like to describe the last two days in greater completeness but the pouch exists.
